Queen's jubilee chance to honour **Greenwood service** members

Over 300 people were in attendance December 6 as 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine presented Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medals to 136 military personnel at the Annapolis Mess.

"I don't think I've seen so many people for a medals parade – this is fantastic," Irvine said as proceedings got underway. It is quite a thing for Chief Warrant Officer (Pierrot) Jette and I to be here to congratulate so many of you today. This is a great day."

Medals were handed out to Regular and Reserve Force members: five privates, 23 corporals, 22 master corporals, 29 sergeants, 18 warrant officers, 12 master warrant officers, four chief warrant officers, one lieutenant, 10 captains and 11 majors. Irvine and Jette had previously received medals from Royal Canadian Air Force Commander Lieutenant-General Yvan Blondin on his recent visit to Greenwood.

The medal marks 2012 celebrations of the 60th anniversary of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's accession to the throne. During the year, 60 000 deserving Canadians will be recognized. A total of 11,000 medals were allocated to the Canadian Forces: approximately one in 10 CF members will be recognized. Special consideration was given to CF members who have performed in a fashion that far exceeds what is expected from their rank, trade or experience and whose actions have reflected well on the CF through innovation, community involvement and/ or volunteer work.

Irvine also credited recipients' families in their ability to perform for the Canadian Forces, and in their communities.

"It's extremely important to have your support at home for our service members - a big round of applause is in order for



base or leaving that requires cargo build-up, or unloading, we do," says Master Corporal Ken Lenihan. "We show up with a baggage cart – what we call a mule, we use our K-50 to move it around, and we'd work with other base sections as needed."

That would include the air traffic control crew in the runway tower, "involved to get Santa here and on the ground;" Wing Operations, who look after wildlife control on the runway – they need to know reindeer are coming in for a pit stop; and transport, if any kind of vehicles are required for Santa's local calls. Throughout the year, the AMU does the occasional shipment of boxes containing naughty and nice lists to Santa, on flights through Trenton and the Alert, the closest Canadian

Forces' landing strip to the North Pole.

Generally, though, Lenihan says, Santa uses Greenwood for a rest stop.

"He comes in, he's greeted, he may hang out for a halfhour or so – we always have milk and cookies. We get the reindeer situated with carrots and water, hydrated for the night, and then he's off. We're behind the scenes, and we don't want a lot of credit: we leave that to the big guy."

Crook says a quick flight check of the sleigh never really finds any problems: "Santa's magic keeps the sleigh in tiptop condition, so there's never any trouble with it."

Canadian eyes spy southern drug runners

Crewmembers aboard the Coast Guard Cutter Tampa offloaded more than 5,000 pounds of cocaine, worth an estimated \$55 million, at Port Canaveral Cruise Terminal 3, December 5.

The Tampa recovered more than 75 bales of cocaine from the water after suspected drug smugglers jettisoned the contraband in an attempt to flee law enforcement. Tampa received an alert from a Canadian Maritime Patrol Aircraft operating in the area. Once in range, the Tampa launched its embarked helicopter crew from the Coast Guard Helicopter Interdiction Tactical Squadron, based in Jacksonville, Fla., to pursue and stop the vessel. The vessel eluded law enforcement, but Tampa crewmembers were able to locate and recover the contraband.

"The entire operation ran like clockwork," said Commander Susan Polizzotto, commanding officer of the Coast Guard Cutter Tampa, "The cutter and helicopter crews did exceptionally well on this important mission and we recognize the vital support of international partners that enables us to keep dangerous drugs off our streets."

This interdiction was carried out as part of Operation Martillo, one component in the United States government's whole-of-government approach to countering the use of the Central American littorals as transhipment routes for illicit drugs, weapons and cash. The international operation focuses on sharing information and bringing together air, land and maritime assets from the U.S. Department of Defense, the Department of Homeland Security and Western Hemisphere and European partner nation agencies.

MacKay announces \$2.8 million project for 14 Wing

Peter MacKay, Minister of National Defence, December 13 announced a funding commitment of approximately \$2.8 million towards the replacement of the intrusion alarms and monitoring system at 14 Wing Greenwood.

The contract was awarded earlier this fall to Reliance Protectron Incorporated for \$1.6 million. The project includes the replacement of intrusion alarms and the monitoring system for 14 Wing in order to meet national standards. The overall value of the project, which includes this contract, is set at approximately \$2.8 million and is expected to be completed in April.

Aldershot honours commemorate Queen's jubilee

Camp Aldershot hosted a joint ceremony December 8, recognizing the dedication, service and exceptional abilities of 26 of its personnel.

Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medals were presented to eight staff of Land Force Atlantic Area Training Camp Aldershot. and to 18 West Nova Scotia Regiment members. Attending the presentations were Colonel James Camsell, commader 36 Brigade Group; Brigadier-General C.C. Thurrott, commander Land Force Atlantic; and Brigadier-General (Retired) Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia J.J. Grant.

"It's always a pleasure for me to be back in Aldershot – I spent a fair bit of time here over the years," Grant said.

The single biggest allotment

of medals has been set aside for the Canadian Forces, the proverbial defenders of the realm. "Each of you has made a significant contribution to life in your province, and country. Each of you epitomizes the best of what it means to be Canadian."

Thurrott added a special commendation for recipients' families, many in attendance for the event.

Also included are dozens of handmade cards with well wishes from Valley students participating in a special connecting with the troops project. Last year, the MFRC sent 172 boxes to deployed CF members. This year, packages are headed to Alert, Afghanistan, Egypt and Italy.

New DND formation: the Canadian Forces Shared Services Group

August 4, 2011, the government of Canada, by an Order in Council, created a new department called Shared Services Canada (SSC). SSC was established to consolidate, streamline and improve Information Technology (IT) infrastructure services across the federal government using an enterprise-wide approach to email, networks and data centre services.

In order for SSC to fulfill its mandate, approximately 6,300 civilian IT employees were transferred from 43 federal departments to SSC following another Order in Council in November 2011. This resulted in approximately 550 civilian IT employees being transferred from DND. CF members who will provide designated IT services on behalf of SSC, however, could not be transferred since they must remain under a CF military chain of command in accordance with the National Defence Act. A new military formation, the Canadian Forces Shared Services Group (CFSSG), was created in May to address this complexity.

The CFSSG headquarters is based in Ottawa, and is commanded by Colonel Martin Girard. There are four regional Shared Services Units (SSUs) across Canada. The CF personnel currently involved in the delivery of email, data centre and network services at CF bases, wings and garrisons were placed under their respective SSU.

The roles of the CFSSG and SSUs are to execute CF command and administration of the SSC assigned CF personnel, be the departmental lead for IT service management in support of the SSC transition, support transformation efforts for DND/ SSC IT

How to keep safe while drinking

If you choose to drink, here are a few tips to reduce the risk and help keep yourself safe.

Always assign a designated driver.

Try to limit yourself to one alcoholic beverage per hour. This will help keep you from getting too drunk too fast. Also remember alcohol will dehydrate, so alternate with water or another non alcoholic beverage. Better yet, set a limit before you start to reduce the risk of overdrinking.

Ultimately, the safest thing to do is to not drink at all. Barring that, you should stay within the low-risk drinking guidelines. This means no more than two standard drinks a day, a maximum of sants, sleeping aids, anxiolytics 10 standard drinks per week for (anxiety-reducing medications women; and no more than three like Zoloft) and any narcotics standard drinks a day, a maximum of 15 standard drinks per week for men. 




