Electrical know-how behind museum's **Argus lighting project**

The Argus Tactical Crew Procedures Trainer (TCPT) featured in the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum is one of a kind - the only one ever built.

Situated at RCAF Station/ CFB Greenwood in 6 Hangar from 1958 to 1981, the trainer was used by Argus crews to gain and maintain their competency in all aspects of antisubmarine warfare, surveillance, communications, etc. The detailed restoration of this training aid creates a realistic atmosphere and gives the walk-through visitor a feel for what aircrew experienced in flight, with actual background crew conversations and the noise and a slight floor vibration simulating the feel of the four massive Wright R-3350 Argus engines.



many consoles' gauges and push buttons, as they would have looked when activated on an actual Argus mission. To accomplish this, the 28 volt incandescent lights will be replaced with cooler, longer-life and energy-efficient 3-volt LED bulbs. LED bulb replacements are available: at \$7 PER BULB! Already, Blumenthal has just about completed the first console containing some five dozen lights - red, green and yellow - and the results are spectacular!

years ago, when he replaced the incandescent light on his doorbell button at home with an LED - just to see if he could do it. Hi's technique is a sixstep process for each bulb, starting with gently heating the incandescent bulb base to the old bulb, then dissolving the remaining glue to clean the base. The new LED bulbs have a rim around the bottom which has to be buffed off to allow it to fit snugly into the base. Final assembly includes microsoldering the small wires on

## Watch for winter hazards

It may seem strange to have your local fire service reminding you to use caution during winter conditions but, for those who may not realize it, National Defence's fire service is the first responder for all medical calls on military property. Firefighters offer the following tips to stay safe and healthy this year.

From a vehicle: Watch your step as you exit from your vehicle when the weather is cold. You may have safely driven over icy highways and snow-clogged streets to reach your destina-

A night on the town: A fancy tion, but you could be seriously night on the town could turn into injured if you have parked beside a patch of ice.

On tire tracks: It's easy to get into a rut anytime, but especially in winter. Frozen ruts and ridges in the snow add just one more tripping and falling hazard to a time of year already filled with pitfalls.

Walking a beat: There is one menace delivery persons hope to avoid about as much as angry dogs: ice. People who walk a de-

livery route should wear non-slip footwear. Homeowners should keep walks and steps free of ice, snow and tripping hazards.

Into a building: You're not safe from winter hazards just because you have arrived indoors. Entrances and walkways in offices and plants can be treacherous if ice, snow or mud is tracked inside. Watch your step in these danger zones, and do your part to keep floors clean and dry.

# 'No regrets'

# Veteran RCAF airman put men, experiences, camaraderie first

Veteran airman Frank Honey has a wide array of accomplishments, citations and experiences in his career: one thing that never concerned him too much was rank.

"I turned down a chance for a commission twice - I wanted to work with my men," the retired aircraft maintainer says now, looking back at age 91 on a 37-year career with the Royal Canadian Air Force that began with Second World War Spitfires and Tomahawks.

"The first time they asked, I wasn't even tempted - not at all. Some people are too rank-conscious, and that would always get to me. I was honoured to be asked, but I liked working with the men. I got along great with them - I'm still in con-

tact with some of them, and they still call me 'chief."

Honey saw his first plane at age 16, walking a railway line through a field with his father in the British Columbia interior. He'd always been interested in motors and engines, but the sight of this small plane with floats for landing gear hooked him.

"Well, I went home, and all I talked about was that plane. Mom and Dad said they'd send me on a course."

He took a nine-month course in aircraft maintenance after high school at Sea Island, then just a small airport. He applied for a job at Boeing but, while he was waiting to hear back, walked into an RCAF recruiting unit to join up. The air force called back first.

"We didn't know what it was for - it was a big secret, but we did what we were told."

The planes had been over France in the days before, but "were getting all shot up and flew back to England.

"We were a mobile unit, and they told us there was an airport ready for us: all it was was a cabbage field with coconut matting and wire mesh laid over it. We went over to get it all set up for the planes, and then they came back. The British warships off the coast were shooting 14-inch shells over our airport. We could see the flames from the ships guns, and the

Honey spent the rest of the war working his way deeper into Europe, through France,

Belgium, Holland and, finally, finished with the deepest RCAF unit within Germany.

Following the war, back in Canada, Honey remained in the air force and became a flight engineer, then a technical instructor, examiner and aircraft maintenance supervisor. He qualified, by the end of his career, on 28 different types of aircraft, and was posted all over Canada, including Greenwood (twice, for 18 years in total). He was on the first Argus course at Greenwood, which stands

out in his mind as a career highlight - but admits pulling mach 2 as a Starfighter passenger was something "not too many guys can say they've done.'

"I was promoted to chief warrant officer and stayed here in Greenwood and, a couple of years later, they came and said I'd been selected for Air Command chief warrant officer and would have to move

to Winnipeg," Honey says. "Well, I said they'd have to move Winnipeg here, and I turned it down. So, my tour finished as a chief warrant officer.

"I've been on an aircraft carrier, I've been in a submarine – I liked the planes. "I don't regret what I done one bit."
