Air Show Atlantic takes to Dieppe skies in August

The Atlantic Canada International Air Show (Air Show Atlantic) will be holding its 2014 Air Show in Dieppe August 23 and 24 at the Greater Moncton International Airport.

Plans include a dynamic weekend of family entertainment, featuring a variety of static aircraft and the Royal Canadian Air Force's Snowbirds, CF18 Hornet Demo Team, CH124 Sea King, CP140 Aurora, the CC130 Hercules, the CH149 Cormorant and the CH146 Griffon; the Canadian Army SkyHawks Parachute Demonstration Team and civilian performers Team Rocket, a two-plane, high-performance aerobatic display; Dan Buchanan's inspiring hang-glider performance, Gary Ward's "extreme" aerobatics in his MX2 aircraft, Manfred Radius' silent and graceful Salto sailplane manoeuvres and the dynamic, low-level, historic



war bird aerobatics of Bill Leff in his T6 Texan.

This will be the first major air show at the site in over four decades. A special Friday evening "teaser" show, the only portion of the weekend free to the public, will have air-

craft start their flying at twilight and then into the darkness for an amazing set of night performances, including both single and multi-aircraft displays.

Air Show Atlantic is the largest event of its kind in Atlantic Canada and is one of the top air shows in the country each year. The organization has produced shows in all three Maritime provinces since 1981. Radiation safety lead by wing team

Radiation is all around us and, although we cannot see, smell, taste or hear it, we are exposed to low levels of radiation everyday. The effects of this low exposure over prolonged periods of time are still not entirely known.

The 14 Wing Radiation Safety Program manages this uncertainty by ensuring all employees, contractors and the general public have minimal exposure to radiation in the workplace. In particular, the program is designed to protect those who may be exposed to levels above that of the general public, such

as radiation and emergency workers, by ensuring workers who use radioactive materials or radiation devices are trained in their hazards and safe use.

The aim of the 14 Wing Radiation Safety Program is to at least equal the successful record of the Canadian civilian nuclear program by minimizing human exposure to ionizing radiation and protecting the environment, incorporating proven safety principles and providing oversight, at all organizational levels of all nuclear activities, including nuclear non-proliferation matters; and safeguards

concerning nuclear weapons and nuclear explosive devices by appropriately trained and qualified persons.

Programme de radioprotection piloté par l'équipe de l'escadre

Les rayonnements sont omniprésents dans notre environnement. Même si nous ne pouvons pas les voir, les sentir, les goûter et les entendre, nous sommes quotidiennement exposés à un faible niveau de rayonnement. Les effets de cette faible exposition sur des périodes prolongées ne sont pas encore entièrement connus.

Le programme de radioprotection de la 14e Escadre gère cette incertitude en veillant à ce que, dans le milieu de travail, les employés, les entrepreneurs et le grand public soient exposés le moins possible aux rayonnements. En particulier, le

programme vise à protéger les personnes susceptibles d'être exposées à des niveaux de radiation supérieurs à ceux auxquels est exposé le grand public, notamment les travailleurs sous rayonnements et le personnel des services d'urgence, en veillant à ce que les travailleurs qui utilisent des substances radioactives et des appareils à rayonnement reçoivent une formation sur les dangers de ces substances et l'utilisation sécuritaire de ces appareils.

Le programme de radioprotection de la 14e Escadre vise à évaluer au moins l'excellent dossier du programme nucléaire

civil canadien, en minimisant l'exposition des personnes au rayonnement ionisant tout en protégeant l'environnement, en intégrant les principes éprouvés en matière de sécurité tout en assurant la surveillance à tous les niveaux organisationnels de toutes les activités nucléaires, y compris les questions liées à la non-prolifération nucléaire, et à garantir la protection des armes nucléaires et des dispositifs nucléaires explosifs par des personnes qualifiées ayant reçu la formation adéquate.

Ideas, activities and partnerships excite new rec worker

If you can't keep track of Kelly Aucoin, rest easy: she's now come "home" to a new job at the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre.

Aucoin, a military spouse, has been found working around the base over the past two years, as a deployment support coordinator at the Military Family Resource Centre and, most recently, as a term counsellor with SISIP Financial Services. When the position of community recreation coordinator opened with the departure in January of Eric MacKenzie for a national recreation posting, Aucoin was the successful applicant.

"My background is in recreation – I crossed paths with Jill Jackson (her new boss, recreation director) in university, and I worked with her years ago on the Valley recreation coordinators' committee."

Her first job was as a life-guard at Greenwood's outdoor pool, and her boss then actually sat in the office she's taking over now.

"But, if you're married to a military guy... away you go!"

Aucoin connected with the MFRC in Moose Jaw and developed a range of partnerships and programs there

among youth, families and the recreation department: "all good, a real team." When her family returned to Greenwood two years ago, she was lucky

– and pleased – to find the deployment support position with the MFRC. The SISIP experience was yet another opportunity to help people, "with such concrete results – you're giving people a plan for their future."

Her new job in recreation is really a return to her old favourites: getting kids active, encouraging families to join activities and lining up programs for all interests and ages.

"We have four boys, and it's always been sports and recreation programs for our family," Aucoin says. "I have so many ideas...!"

Aucoin is keen to build partnerships within the base's support program providers, as there are many special events that happen with a history of teamwork.

"Are there new voices? New ideas? What about more volunteers?" she wonders.

"What about some 'learn to' programs – wrestling, volleyball, badminton; a walking club, Zumba.... Not clubs, but just programming and a

busy gym!"

Aucoin is responsible for community recreation programs and the special events work, but also looks after hiring summer staff and overseeing summer programs, the community centre's evening staff and youth worker.

"I'm a coordinator – coordinating with all kinds of people, organizations, agencies on

base and programs. I have a million ideas, all written in red in a little notepad that goes with me home and work."

MPs, firefighters recognized for extra effort

Emergency services personnel at 14 Wing Greenwood were recognized by Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston February 13 for going "over and above" the expected response as they came to the aid of a stricken military member and his family.

September 2, 2013, 14 Wing Fire & Emergency Services Blue Platoon and 31 Military Police Flight Bravo Squadron were both called to assist in a medical emergency in the Residential Housing Units neighbourhood. While firefighters took over CPR from the victim's wife and daughter, Military Police coordinated further emergency response; crews then assisted in getting family on the road, behind Emergency Health Services crews as

they transported the victim to hospital.

"Both groups of first responders saved the life of one of our military members, and supported the family," Huddleston said. "They showed incredible focus and the impact of what really were small efforts in a short period of time had a huge impact - and will be remembered forever by that family."

Military Police officers included in the recognition were Master Corporal Yuill, Leading Seaman Gillis and Corporal Mackay. Firefighters included Warrant Officer Ferrar, Sergeant Page, Master Corporal Jones, Corporal Ullrich, Corporal Arsenualt and Corporal (retired) Holmes.

Wing extends range of 'pats on the back' to talented team members

February 13 was a significant day for 13 recipients of honours and awards at 14 Wing Greenwood's quarterly presentation ceremony.

"It's a busy day - but welcome," said Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston. "Honours and awards ceremonies are incredibly important: our chance to recognize - even in small way - the efforts of individuals and teams. Without that, something is lost in our military ethos and community. Honours and awards - even the pat on the back - impress upon me leaders on the wing are taking the time to recognize their people."

Corporal Ryan Poole, a 14 Wing firefighter, received the General Campaign Star - South-West Asia 2nd Rotation Star. His time in the Afghanistan theatre now totals over 390 days through three deployments.

Chief Warrant Officer Ian Smith, 404 Squadron, received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal and the Canadian Forces' Decoration 2nd Clasp.

Captain Dave Hunter was awarded Flight Safety for Professionalism honours in recognition of his attention to detail monitoring a series of touch-and-go landings by one of the wing's Hercules aircraft in October 2012. He noticed smoke from the plane's left rear tire, alerted air and ground crews and prevented what could have been a significant in-flight fire.

Chief Warrant Officer Lise Ward, Wing Administration, received her appointment, signed by the minister of national defence under the authority of the Governor General of Canada, effective September 26, 2013.

Huddleston presented several Wing Commander's Commendation certificates:

leading several key projects, including beyond-the-line-of-sight and blended e-learning. "I'm looking for more in the future," Huddleston told Guay.

Lieutenant Gillian Kelland, Wing Logistics and Engineering/ Wing Replenishment, was commended for her leadership of the wing's 2013 Nijmegen marching team, which represented the Canadian Armed Forces in the international challenge.

Warrant Officer Derek Inman, 404 Squadron, showed leadership and initiative during development of the AESOP leadership training program: "The key aspect of moving forward is focus and training of the AESOP trade," Huddleston said.

Captain Barrie Ransome, 405 Squadron, was recognized for reinvigorating the squadron's flight safety program, clearing investigations, incorporating first line maintenance and instigating peer training.

Civilian Member of the Quarter honours were presented to Craig Fanning, a worker at 14 Air Maintenance Squadron. During a decreased manning period, Fanning committed himself to ensuring the avionics lab and FTAS/ IAT shops remained fully capable.

Service Member of the Quarter was Sergeant Brian Jackson from 404 Squadron, a creative and proactive technical trainer: he even included apprentices in aircrew-focused activities such as wet ditch training.

Art + youth = community message

Greenwood youth will have the chance March 1 to define community.

An afternoon art event is taking a unique look at what community means to youth, and those youth want the rest of the community to see them. Cape Breton University community studies student Ashley Parsons of Kingston is working on community intervention in the final course of her distance education degree, and this event is part of her research.

"There are six of us from

all over the Maritimes in my group, and we're coming up with problems in our communities, and interventions. That can be a sad way to describe it, but we've realized a lot of our communities have the same issues."

Along with housing and poverty challenges, all the students keyed in on one common theme: disengaged youth.

"A lot of us are older, and we remember when, after school, we would go hang out with friends. Now, it seems very much different."

Technology, social media and not needing to be face-

to-face to "hang out" could be having an impact on youths' connections with community. The CBU students didn't want to be even more disengaging, so they are using art to attract youth to a discussion session, and come up with some solutions. Parsons has an artist friend lined up for the Greenwood event, three hours on a Saturday afternoon at the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre, to help bring out some great ideas. Youth ages 12 to 18 are welcome, but even those as young as nine years of age who are regular community centre visitors are welcome.

"We want to do a large piece of art and hang it on the wall of the community centre, something the youth can look at and remember that they did it. I want them to have as much input as possible. Art has positive effects on peoples' moods, and we want to get youth out, engage them - and keep them being involved."

The art will stay in Greenwood, and hopefully set a foundation for some new youth programs and interests. Parsons will take her findings - pictures, documents and the youths' feedback - home to build into her groups' final presentation

Modern vets eligible for Last Post funeral, burial program

Last Post Fund National President Honorary Colonel Daniel O'Connor expressed relief and satisfaction with the February 11 federal budget.

Finance Minister Jim Flaherty announced \$108.2 million over three years, starting

in 2013-2014, to expand eligibility for modern-day veterans of modest means to have access to a dignified funeral and burial.

"The Last Post Fund has been pressing for this recognition for more than a decade, and now all Canadian


veterans are eligible for this important program for the estates of veterans who die with limited financial resources. From fulfilling our mission in recent years for ineligible veterans, our donation funds had been virtually exhausted."

Since 1909, the Last Post Fund has had as its prime mission the assurance of a dignified funeral and burial for all Canadian veterans who pass away with very limited or no financial resources. In 1922, the Canada first recognized its obligation to provide

funding to meet this need. However, in recent decades, regulations have stipulated only Second World War and Korean veterans, and those in receipt of disability compensation, were eligible, leaving out most of the more than 600,000 modern-day veter-

ans who have also served their country.

The Last Post Fund is grateful for the support of all Canadian veterans' organizations that have unanimously supported this demand, particularly the Royal Canadian Legion.
