Radiation safety lead by wing team

and, although we cannot see, smell, taste or hear it, we are exposed to low levels of radiation everyday. The effects of this low exposure over prolonged periods of time are still not entirely known.

The 14 Wing Radiation Safety Program manages this uncertainty by ensuring all employees, contractors and the general public have minimal exposure to radiation in the workplace. In particular, the program is designed to protect those who may be exposed to levels above that of the general public, such

Radiation is all around us as radiation and emergency concerning nuclear weapons workers, by ensuring workers who use radioactive materials or radiation devices are trained in their hazards and safe use.

> The aim of the 14 Wing Radiation Safety Program is to at least equal the successful record of the Canadian civilian nuclear program by minimizing human exposure to ionizing radiation and protecting the environment, incorporating proven safety principles and providing oversight, at all organizational levels of all nuclear activities, including nuclear non-proliferation matters; and safeguards

Coordinating community Ideas, activities and partnerships excite new rec worker

If you can't keep track of Kelly Aucoin, rest easy: she's now come "home" to a new job at the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre.

Aucoin, a military spouse, has been found working around the base over the past two years, as a deployment support coordinator at the Military Family Resource Centre and, most recently, as a term counsellor with SISIP Financial Services. When the position of community recreation coordinator opened with the departure in January of Eric MacKenzie for a national recreation posting, Aucoin was the successful applicant.

MPs, firefighters recognized for extra effort

Emergency services personnel at 14 Wing they transported the victom to hospital. Greenwood were recognized by Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston February 13 for going "over and above" the expected response as they came to the aid of a stricken military member and his family.

September 2, 2013, 14 Wing Fire & Emergency Services Blue Platoon and 31 Military Police Flight Bravo Squadron were both called to assist in a medical emergency in the Residential Housing Units neighbourhood. While firefighters took over CPR from the victim's wife and daughter, Military Police coordinated further emergency response; crews then assisted in getting family on the road, behind Emergency Health Services crews as

Both groups of first responders saved the life of one of our military members, and supported the family," Huddleston said. "They showed incredible focus and the impact of what really were small efforts in a short period of time had a huge impact - and will be remembered forever by that family."

Military Police officers included in the recognition were Master Corporal Yuill, Leading Seaman Gillis and Corporal Mackay. Firefighters included Warrant Officer Ferrar, Sergeant Page, Master Corporal Jones, Corporal Ullrich, Corporal Arsenualt and Corporal (retired) Holmes.

"It's a busy day - but welcome," said Commander Colonel lain Huddleston. "Honours and awards ceremonies are incredibly important: our chance to recognize - even in small way - the efforts of individuals and teams. Without that, something is lost in our military ethos and community. Honours and awards – even the pat on the back - impress upon me leaders on the wing are taking the time to recognize their people."

Corporal Ryan Poole, a 14 Wing firefighter, received the General Campaign Star - South-West Asia 2nd Rotation Star. His time in the Afghanistan theatre now totals over 390 days through three deployments.

Chief Warrant Officer Ian Smith, 404 Squadron, received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal and the Canadian Forces' Decoration 2nd Clasp.

Captain Dave Hunter was awarded Flight Safety for Professionalism honours in recognition of his attention to detail monitoring a series of touch-and-go landings by one of the wing's Hercules aircraft in October 2012. He noticed smoke from the plane's left rear tire, alerted air and ground in-flight fire.

Chief Warrant Officer Lise Ward, Wing Administration, received her appointment. signed by the minister of national defence under the authority of the Governor General of Canada, effective September 26, 2013.


