

Potable well #9 back in service

Potable Well #9, providing drinking water to the Residential Housing Units, Morfee Centre, Morfee Annex and the Annapolis Mess Hall will return to service after its filtering system was repaired and tested weekly over the past year.

When 14 Wing Greenwood changes the water flow from the county source to Potable Well #9 April 13, at or around 1 a.m.; although there will be no disruption to the service, occupants may notice a slight discolouration in the water. This will dissipate quickly. This is non-toxic and is only the sediment stirred up in the pipes as the flow direction changes.



Flight Lieutenant James **Chrystall Wernham (Jimmy)**

Wernham was born in 1917 in Scotland, but moved with his family to Winnipeg as a youngster. His father worked for the railway, and Wernham was working for John Deere when he joined the air force in 1940. He graduated as an air observer in 1941, was commissioned and sent to England in July. By October, with the Royal



Air Force's 77 Squadron, he had carried out 16 raids. He transferred to the Royal Canadian Air Force's 405 Squadron and, in his first operation May 30, 1942, he and his crewmates made international headlines as part of the famous "thousand bomber raid on Cologne."

Just one week later, after a raid on Essen, Wernham's Halifax bomber was shot down and he was captured in Holland. He arrived at Stalag Luft III in the summer of 1942.

On the night of the great escape, Wernham was part of the "Woodmill Leave Party," a group of a dozen escapees who assembled in the woods. They travelled by train to Hirschberg, where Wernham and another fellow split from the group to buy tickets to a town on the Czech border. They were refused, but posed as French workers at another train station. Tickets in hand, they were questioned and arrested shortly after boarding the train.

Recaptured escapees of the Woodmill Leave Party were gathered at the Hirschberg Kripo station, interrogated and marched to the local jail. Wernham was shot by the Gestapo March 30 outside of Hirschberg, along with two Polish and one Greek airman.

Six Canadian airmen were among 50 prisoners shot after being recaptured by the Germans, having escaped through a 300-foot tunnel under Stalag Luft III, March 24, 1944. Dozens of Allied airmen

months on three tunnels, seeand disrupt German operations however they could. Ingenious tunnel bracing, air circulation, lighting and even dirt dispersal from special "socks" as prisoners walked the camp's grounds allowed one of the tunnels to be put to use that night. Two hundred prisoners were set to break out: unfortunately, the tunnel ended just 30 feet short of the protection of a forest, and guards caught sight of the 76th escapee as he ran for cover. Over the next few days, 73 of the men were recaptured. Adolf Hitler, Führer of the Third Reich in Germany, was so angry, he ordered them shot. Fifty were executed, including Wernham.

"They took it seriously, their responsibility to escape," Adamson said, upon his return to 14 Wing Greenwood, the home of the modern 405 Squadron. "People had tried, in ones and twos, but it was the audacity of this effort: two years of tunnel digging, getting rid of dirt, making air pumps - it was a testament to their ingenuity.

"They expected to get caught, but the goal was to get as many people as possible after them. It's estimated one million people were diverted from the German war effort to find them, so they had an effect '

> "In 32 years of service, this was the cherry on top for me: who doesn't know about 'The Great Escape?" Roussel said, referring to the 1960s Hollywood movie version with Steve McQueen. "The honour and the privilege of being there to witness this anniversary - you're standing there in the rain, the cold and the train whistle sounding as it goes by during the ceremony. That's all the same as it was 70 years ago. It is almost surreal. You don't realize you're there until you breathe the same air and walk the same ground. It was very humbling to be there."

> Adamson and Roussel laid a wreath at the camp memorial site in honour of Wernham and "the 50."

> "405 Squadron has a very distinguished wartime service record, and any opportunity we get to commemorate that and link with that heritage is just awesome," Adamson said, adding an opportunity as he arrived at 405 Squadron himself almost two years ago to represent the squadron at an event in Belgium "nicely bookends" his experience as the squadron commander.



Two teams bowl it out for regional title


The Greenwood Bowling Centre was the venue, as 14 Wing Greenwood hosted the Atlantic Regional Bowling Championship March 27 and 28.






