

Aerospace telecommunication information system techs (ATIS) make sure electronic eyes are seeing clearly.

The purpose of the ATIS techs' flight check is to make sure the Precision Approach Radar (PAR) is properly calibrated. This is extremely important, as the PAR's purpose is to provide guidance for aircraft attempting to land in either extreme weather or in some type of distress, such as smoke in the cockpit. Any time the pilot's visual approach is compromised, the PAR gives the air traffic controllers (ATC) the information they need to ATCs essentially become of the eyes of the pilot.

check is when the ATIS techs take care of aligning the Theodolite out on the tarmac. Once aligned, the ATCs step in and begin to observe the approach angle of the incoming aircraft through the Theodolite. As the aircraft approaches, the ATC will radio commands to the aircraft to guide it onto the ideal slope and centerline approach. As the aircraft is guided to the perfect angle of approach, the ATC will radio "on glide path." Every time the ATC radios that response to his colleagues back in the ATC control room, they will observe if the information the PAR is displaying on their screen matches the information being relaved to them from the tarmac. If enough matching information is collected, the PAR can then be confirmed to be calibrated guide the aircraft in safely: the properly. RCAF takes part in Peru disaster relief exercise

Canadian Air Force (RCAF) deployed to Peru to take part in Exercise Cooperación III, a key Latin American multinational exercise. The exercise focused on disaster relief, running from April 19 to May 2.

This deployment highlights two milestones for the RCAF: it is the first time a CH149 Cormorant has been transported by a CC177 Globemaster III, and it is the first time a Cormorant has been deployed outside of North

demonstrated time and again that they can help those in need at home and, through this exercise, Canadians can be proud to know that we are demonstrating our ability to help those in need abroad," said Colonel Jim Benninger, commander of the RCAF Air Task Force

The exercise tested the air-transportability of the helicopter in an expeditionary setting to simulate response to an international crisis. In addition, the RCAF conducted air expeditionary training, search and rescue, and humanitarian aid delivery training.

The Globemaster is from 429 Transport Squadron at 8 Wing Trenton, and the Cormorant is from 413 Transport

Aircrews from the Royal and Rescue Squadron at 14 Wing Greenwood. Also participating in the exercise is a CC130J Hercules from 426 Transport Training Squadron at 8 Wing, as well as crews from 9 Wing Gander and 19 Wing Comox.

As part of Canada's Global Engagement Strategy, the CAF is working toward a more prosperous, secure and democratic hemisphere through participation in exercises like Cooperación III. The RCAF plays a significant role in this commitment as a member of the System "Cormorant crews have of Cooperation among the Air Forces of the Americas, known in Spanish as the Sistema de Cooperación entre las Fuerzas Aéreas Americanas (SICOFAA).

> "This exercise highlights the importance of partnerships and interoperability within SICOFAA nations,' said Lieutenant-General Yvan Blondin, commander of the RCAF. "By conducting air expeditionary training, and practicing our humanitarian aid delivery and search and rescue capabilities in this region, the RCAF will be even better prepared should we ever be called upon to assist in the event of a natural disaster."

African Nova Scotians at war

The Army Museum Halifax Citadel, The Road to Vimy and Beyond

African Nova Scotians were every bit as eager as their white brethren to fight for their country during the First World War. Sadly, they had another battle to overcome before they were allowed to don the king's uniform: the one against racial prejudice.

Overcome it they did, and hundreds went on to serve honourably with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in Europe as members of No. 2 Construction Battalion. Raised in Nova Scotia, this outfit was the only predominantly black unit in our nation's mili-

tary history, and the only one to have served Canada in the First World War.

The contribution made by the No. 2 Construction Battalion to Canada's 1914-1918 war

largest exhibition ever to be

Halifax Citadel. The exhibition, "The Road to Vimy and Beyond," runs from May until November 2018, and honours the role Canada, especially Nova Scotia, played in the Allied victory in 1918. The event will be second only in size to that planned by the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa. In addition, the Army Museum Halifax Citadel will upgrade its Second World War displays to commemorate the 75th anniversary of that conflict.

When Canada entered the First World War, there was no official policy on admitting African Canadians into the Army. The decision was left to each unit's commanding officer and, while some units - like the 106th Battalion, Nova

formation of a black construction battalion to be headquartered in Nova Scotia, home of Canada's largest black community. Command was given to Lieutenant-Colonel D.H. The No. 2 Construction Battalion was never intended to be an actual combat unit because mounted by the Army Museum Militia Council authorized the the nation's black population

wasn't large enough to sustain an infantry battalion. Instead, the volunteers' duties would revolve around logging, milling, repairing infrastructures such as roads, and ensuring water supplies were maintained.

More than 500 members of the Nova Scotia's black community stepped forward to serve with No 2 Construction Battalion, along with 165 African American volunteers. The unit assembled in Pictou, but then transferred to Truro because there was more barrack space there. Early in 1917, tively small size, the battalion

New Brunswick to help lift rails from the Grand Trunk Railroad so they could be shipped to the Western Front battlefields in Europe. Here again, the No. 2 Construction Battalion made history as the only volunteer unit to engage in war-work, before actually shipping overseas.

The battalion, with 19 officers and 605 men, finally sailed for England in March 1917 and, some weeks after arrival, it was sent on to France. Because of its rela-

the men were dispatched to was downgraded to company status in May 1917, and attached to the Canadian Forestry Corps. The volunteers found themselves harvesting trees in order to create the boardwalks, trench shoring, crates and countless other wooden items needed by the Allied armies at the front. Even though it wasn't involved directly in combat, some volunteers were killed and others wounded by artillery fire, poison gas and construction accidents.

Hostilities in Europe ended in November 1918, and the No. 2 Construction Battalion returned to Canada several months later. The unit was officially disbanded in September. 1919.

In 1992, the Government of Canada designated the No. 2 Construction Battalion an event of national historic significance and, the following year, a commemorative plaque marking this honour was placed in Pictou. In its day, the No. 2 Construction Battalion was a testament to the determination of African Canadians to serve. Its creation made history, although not necessarily for the right reasons, given that it was the first - and last - segregated black Canadian Army unit. In August 1917, Ottawa introduced conscription. From then on, it didn't matter what your race, creed or colour; if you were of age and in good health, you were obliged to don the king's uniform. By the end of the First World War, in addition to No 2 Construction Battalion, more than 2,000 African Canadians served their country proudly.
