

What's old is new again

The only thing new on 405 Squadron's colours is a bilingual record of its battle honours.

That's just fine, says Major Luc Vachon.

"This is one of the most prized possessions of the squadron," he said, following the presentation of the new bright blue silk and coloured tasselled standard.

"It had been exposed for 40 years, since 1970, and it was showing wear. We want to make sure it looks its best."

The flag contains the battle honours earned by the squadron during the Second World War. The squadron parades the colours at ceremonies and keeps what it represents in mind through day-today work.

"We talk about our mission and role domestic and abroad with new members, and we look at what we've done in history at special events," Vachon said. "We keep information all our exercises and operations, and we're looking to submit new battle honours to add to the colours.'

As hundreds of military personnel, veterans, family members and community members stood under sunny skies through two minutes' memorial silence, children's laughter from a nearby playground carried over the assembled parade.

Exactly as it should be, if 12 years' work, sacrifice, tears and grief experienced by Canadian Armed Forces members, their families and international partners in Afghanistan to accomplish the same safe community and opportunity in that country are to be remembered.

I left home in January 2011 for work up training, and deployed to Kabul in April. I departed there in March 2012 to finally come home. There are so many things that transpired in this time it is hard to keep my mind on any one thing to talk and messages. These, too, about. Thus, I have chosen to speak on camaraderie and the support from those of you here at home, and in various communities across Canada.

I worked with Americans, Britons, Bulgarians, the French and Turks, but mostly with Americans. We mourned our losses; we shared our two Thanksgivings, Christmas and the Stanley Cup playoffs Vancouver (because of the effects of their experience. boys from Boston, I find myself secretly cheering for the bumble bees - when they are not playing against my team, of course). I have kept in touch with many I served with, and we now share our normal daily interests.

When the day's work was done, Sergeant Connell and I

take for granted here we did not have there, simple things like just a stool to stand or sit on. We called ourselves CCR, for Connell and Cowell Renovations.

The campground "campers' club" is Halverson's sounding board for improvements, additions, rate changes, special events and more. He and the paid staff work side by side a committed team of volunteers to make Lake Pleasant a great family getaway.

This season, campers can look forward to a new washroom/ shower block, stairs on the banks leading to the 10 rental cabins' shoreline fire pits and a range of smaller improvements. It will all add to the sandy beach, boat launch and docks; the cabin rentals, tenting sites and RV spaces; the playgrounds and sports courts, canteen and main lodge hall on the 75-acre site.

All the regular fun will start up as seasonal and visiting campers return: Saturday morning kids' crafts, kayak and canoe rentals, family games nights and dances, BBQs, wagon rides and more. The long weekend in August is a highlight, with bouncers, BBQs and special activities planned.

"It's all for fun, everything at the campground is supposed to be fun. You could have 200 or 300 people in here on a normal weekend, maybe 500 at busy times. It's a great family atmosphere."

Halverson also values the connections the campground community makes beyond Lake Pleasant: 14 Wing support services are often available with infrastructure improvements, part of personnel training; the base Messes host family events and, last year, sponsored prizes for the children's fishing derby, and there's the annual summer pancake breakfast at the lodge hall, a fundraiser for the Springfield Fire Department. Enough money has been raised in just the past couple of years, the department has been able to buy an oxygen tank refilling system. A local church also comes in on breakfast day with a bake sale, which has been known to raise hundreds of dollars from the donated goodies!

"We want you to feel like this is your place," Halverson says. "People come out, they rent a cabin and never knew what was here – then they come back. We see a lot of repeat campers."




