# Dak weaves, dodges way to museum home

"I like it when a plan comes together," Major Bob Johnson said under his breath, as he watched crews manoeuvre a Greenwood airfield hangar, across multiple roadways, around a myriad of encroaching obstacles and into place at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum.

All without flying. And no wings. Or tail piece.

The museum's latest outdoor addition to the airpark is now in place, a 1943 CC129 for the United States Army Air Dakota. It took a team of 405 Squadron air maintenance organization personnel – and anxious museum volunteers most of the morning May 26 to actually move the plane and

its tail, and another morning May 27 to collect and reattach its wings.

A half-dozen volunteers have been restoring the Dak since its arrival in Greenwood in 2006. The plane is a perfull size plane from a 14 Wing manent loan from the national aviation museum in Ottawa. which has an indoor display of the Dak and had kept this aircraft outdoors.

> "You should have seen what she looked like originally!" Johnson said. "Now, this will become one of the aircraft we actually run tours through. It adds more to the museum."

time in Canada in transportation and communications work, including moving VIPs. In 1964, the plane was transferred to the instructor school to be used as a training aid, and then moved to the Ottawa museum.

Greenwood museum volunteers replaced the wing box, the biggest job, and then have spent numerous hours on cosmetic work, rebuilding and repainting many features, inside and out.

"This is the only Dak in the world painted in full search and rescue markings, because of the base we're at," Johnson said. "103 Rescue Squadron was here from 1946 to the mid '60s.'

As far as the move from Hangar 9 to the museum airpark, Johnson says volunteers "did their homework and made sure it would all work."

Moving team lead Sergeant Craig MacLellan of 405 Squadron said the team went with the museum's plan: "They had it all measured out for us - we had a 24 foot wide plane, minus the wings, stub to stub; and we had 25-anda-half feet at the narrowest point (through the main base gates). We knew we had a bit. We used a mule tow tractor and a tow bar, and lots of eyes and hands."

The Greenwood Military Aviation Museum Air Park the venerable Douglas C47 of the famous DC3), arguably one of the most reliable aircraft ever built; indeed, more than 70 years!



# Rescue remembered Former army man jumped right in

John Ellis lives simply: his cat, a guitar, a couple outings a week. But, when company comes, he answers the door in a three-piece suit.

When he does something, he does it right.

That's exactly what he did in 1979, jumping into a rising tide in Bear River to rescue three men trapped in a crashed car.

"I said, 'Boys, get out of the way - I'm going in!" he remembers from his basement apartment home in Greenwood. "I knew all the people inside – it was hard to take.'

Ellis had been living in his parents' old home in Bear River, working at CFB Cornwallis in the public service after a short stint in the army. He was walking through the village that January day when he heard people calling out about the crash.

"The guy on the passenger side was dead, and I got the guy out of the back of the car. I got them both out, but the diver was trapped. I kept holding him up out of the water – I was on the roof when the fire department and police arrived. They asked, 'Is anyone dead?" and I said, 'This one soon will be!" Another two minutes and he'd have been underwater.'

Ellis credits a lifetime of hard help people.'

work, challenge and physical activity for his actions that night. He left home at age 14 and went west to work, before joining the army as an infantryman in 1961. He was 19. He boxed, lifeguarded and dove off the high board. In 1962, he was in a diving competition when his head struck the board. His injuries meant a new job in the military, as an intelligence and police man. He stuck with it for another year, but left the forces as a corporal to return home to Nova Scotia and the CFB Cornwallis job. He's now lived in Greenwood for 15 years, playing his guitar at church and small shows and taking his cat for drives in the car.

Right next to his armchair, though, are memories from that long-ago rescue: a framed newspaper clipping describing the presentation of a Canada 125 medal "in recognition of his significant contribution to compatriots, community and to Canada;" a picture of himself in his army uniform, and the Canada 125 medal itself affixed to his chest in that picture.

"I'm glad I did what I did, but hope I never have to do it again," Ellis says. "Most people don't do it, unless they have the proper training. It wasn't hard for me - I'm just that type of person. I'm good-hearted and
