Greenwood takes national ball title

The Canadian Armed Forces national slo pitch championship was held in Borden September 6 through 10. The Atlantic region was represented by the 14 Wing Greenwood Bombers.

Expectations were very high, as, since the regional win, the team put in many hours practicing and felt ready to compete.

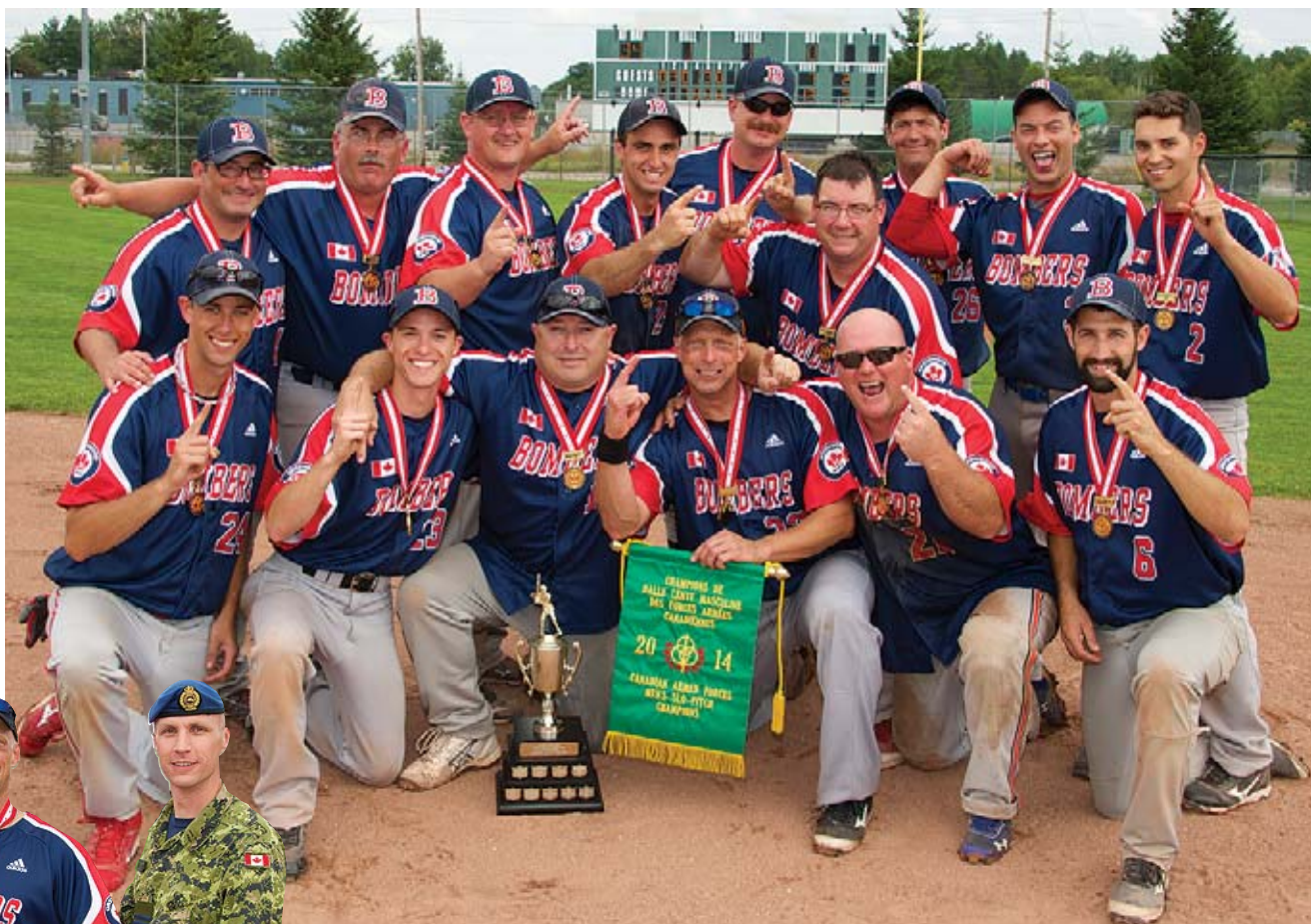
From the start of the national tournament, the Bombers put on a defensive clinic, finishing the round robin 4-0 and only allowing 29 runs. Knowing finishing first overall in the round robin doesn't always lead to a championship, the team doubled its efforts and took a hard fought 15-11 win in the semis over the Pacific region. The only team

left in the way of Greenwood's chances to successfully hoist its second championship in the last three years would be CFB Petawawa. In the final,

Chalifoux. A tournament MVP honour was also given to Chalifoux.

Team camaraderie, sportsmanship and hard work was seen throughout the entire season, from every individual, and it served the Bombers well in bringing home the national championship.

Auroras enhance capability at RIMPAC 2014

A Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) CP140M Aurora Long Range Patrol aircraft descends stealthily toward its unsuspecting target, an enemy submarine on patrol just beneath the moonlit surface of the Pacific Ocean near Hawaii. "Sonobuoy away," advises the tactical navigator, as the night's anti-submarine warfare (ASW) prosecution begins.

This could be the opening sequence of a Tom Clancy novel; in fact, it was the type of scenario RCAF and coalition aircraft operating from Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay, flew 24 hours a day for three weeks as part of Rim of the Pacific (RIMPAC) 2014, the world's premiere combined and joint maritime exercise. This year's iteration took place around the Hawaiian Islands and in San Diego June 26 to August 1. More than 1,000 Canadian airmen, airwomen, sailors and soldiers participated.

"Missions vary depending on the phase of the exercise," said Major Filip Bohac, RIMPAC 2014 long range patrol detachment commander. "In the earlier phases, most missions are scripted and about five hours long but, in the final 'free play' phase, the objectives become more strategic and flexible so missions tend to be longer, and we fly around the clock."

RIMPAC provided the RCAF with an opportunity to test a number of upgrades to the systems that have been integrated into the Block III Aurora, and use the training garnered from the exercise to enhance capabilities. A variety of technical trials and tactical development is also underway. This year's scenario featured a humanitarian assistance/disaster relief event. This

component facilitates training and certification for expeditionary forces to respond to foreign disasters.

"As our understanding of the new and improved capabilities of the Block III increases, we need to develop the tactics, techniques and procedures to optimally employ these new capabilities," Bohac said. "Our contribution to RIMPAC is always a balance between cost, value of training and what other operations are ongoing that impact aircraft and crew availability. RIMPAC is an ideal opportunity for us to train in a demanding coalition environment. We always try to maximize our contribution."

All units of the RCAF's long range patrol (LRP) fleet were

represented at RIMPAC 2014: 404 Long Range Patrol and Training Squadron, 405 (LRP) Squadron and the Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit from 14 Wing Greenwood; and

407 (LRP) Squadron from 19 Wing Comox. 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston served as the Deputy Commander Combined Task Force 172. The LRP detachment, part of the RCAF's RIMPAC Air Task Force, comprised more than 100 headquarters, aircrew, maintenance and mission support personnel.

This year's Rim of the Pacific (RIMPAC), the 24th in the series that began in 1971, involved 22 nations, 49 surface ships, six submarines, more than 200 aircraft and 25,000 personnel.

combine for the final half. There will be a wide array of music presented, ranging from jazz, military marches, vocal and instrumental features, film music and original British concert band music. The concert will also include a few appearances by 14 Wing pipers, playing with the ensemble.

The evening should include something musical for everyone to enjoy. Admission, open to the general public, is by freewill donation, with proceeds in support of the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum's aircraft preservation fund. The fund ensures all of the museum's air park aircraft remain in top condition, including paint and glass work, and any repairs due to environmental exposure.

# Sky work | SAR crews train for success

Master Corporal Jared Tozer wishes he had planned all the “fun stuff” he wanted to do as the organizer of the day’s “jump school” schedule for 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron search and rescue technicians.

“But, there are a bunch of things we have to hit: tandem masters, freefalling, new configurations of gear, confined landings,” Tozer said September 9. “There are a bunch of guys really mad at me, because this is harder on a body to do all the technical stuff.

“But, it’s a really beautiful way to work!”

Squadron Hercules flight crews spent the week flying circles above Greenwood, and then dropping SAR-Techs with their bright orange parachutes to markers below. On day one, 60 jumps were landed.

“Twenty is what each guy should get through the week – that’s phenomenal,” Tozer says.

All the activity is captured by Wing Imaging for daily review. The SAR-Techs see the good, the bad and the ugly (the just-landed SAR-Techs on the side of the airfield seem to

have lots of chatter for “hot” landings as their squadron-mates come in). Daily briefings also give the flight crews the opportunity to train “to get us out nice and quick,” Sergeant Paul Jackman said. “The biggest thing is saturation. We’re looking for accuracy, configuration and equipment checks.”

SAR-Techs were jumping with personal, inflatable life rafts attached to their back; a new, lighter kit, newer helmets and changed on-aircraft protocols. While some changes relate to technological and design advancements, almost everything relates to flight safety.

“The young SAR-Techs and the older ones? We have one guy with us maybe 20 minutes, and another 17 years in the trade,” Jackman says. “Both are easy to train: the older fel-

lows are keen to learn the new gear, and the younger fellows are focused on going out as quick as they can.”

Master Warrant Officer Darcy St. Laurent would be one of those “older” fellows Jackman was referring to, with 17 years as a SAR-Tech. His “awesome” job comes with a lot of challenge, but also responsibility.

“There’s not much more fulfilling than this: we show up, and it’s good news. A search can be the best moment of your life and, at the same time, the worst because of the tragedies. There’s never, never a mission that’s the same.”

He has a lot of respect for the younger SAR-Techs he’s now working with, and the job the training school does selecting and preparing them.

“They’re motivated, dedicated and physically fit. We do scenarios in training, and I always try and use things I may have experienced. In the debrief, I may explain what worked and didn’t work in the real thing – but there’s no right answer. If you have enough misses, you learn to take aspects from all of them and *make* it work.

“It’s a can-do attitude. We make it happen.”

## Veterans' visit: stories, memories, sharing

Many of us have seen the movies and played the video games. We understand the tragedy and comprehend the magnitude. However, nothing compares when you look our elderly veterans in the eye and they tell you firsthand of their experiences.

A contingent of 14 Wing Greenwood personnel and Royal Canadian Legion Branch 098 members volunteered to travel to Halifax's Camp Hill Veterans Hospital September 6. The visit was eventful, and meaningful for all who participated.

"We picked up enough memories to last a lifetime," said veteran Reid Byron My-

ers. "I could hear the drone of the engines first."

Myers was a member of the 4th Canadian Armoured Division. He landed in France shortly after D-Day to participate in the closing of the Falaise Gap.

"The sky was darkened from horizon to horizon... with bomber planes. When they came back... some still just

hanging on!

"That's enough of that now," he finished with a raspy voice.

Myers came to Camp Hill over a year ago.

"It took a lot of adjusting, but life still goes on." He described some of the hardships: "what the nurses have to deal with here... how difficult and hard it is." His right hand reached up to the left of his

chest: "they deserve a medal right here!" he said, an astonishing acknowledgement from a man who has seen and done so much in his own lifetime.

A variety of characters reside at Camp Hill: Annie the dancer, who spent her time on the afternoon's dance floor with not just one but five dance partners; Mr. MacDonald, whose blazer was decorated

with multiple medals and pins that each came with a story that could keep you entertained for hours. A skilful and lively game of bocce was accompanied by witty banter and solid sportsmanship. Despite their own generosity of time and memories, veterans' gratitude for 14 Wing personnel's modest presence was most humbling.

"I heard they were coming to Halifax, so I called the UFC and told them about the military support of their sport — would they be interested in doing something with us? The base here gave me the

go-ahead to follow-up with the UFC on some ideas."

Working with the UFC since, 14 Wing's Lieutenant-Colonel Pierre Hache represented Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston at a press launch in Halifax, as the UFC announced 225 free tickets for military members in the province through its Community Works Program.

A number of those tickets have made their way to 14 Wing and are being used as pre-event prizes at the Mess, leading up to the October 4 Halifax card.

The October 3 Mess finale is a local first.

"They're coming here to answer audience questions and provide some UFC updates, and then they'll head down to the floor from the stage and do a mixed martial arts demo: some kickboxing and judo; then they'll do some autographing," Collins says.

Access is free with a donation to the local food bank, and the wider community is welcome.

The UFC is the premier mixed martial arts organization and largest pay-per-view event provider in the world. The UFC organization's fight card for the Halifax Metro Centre will feature a five-round main event pitting two of the best welterweights against one another. Second-ranked Rory "Ares" MacDonald takes on ninth-ranked Tarec "The Sponge" Saffiedine in a bout that could determine the division's next title contender. 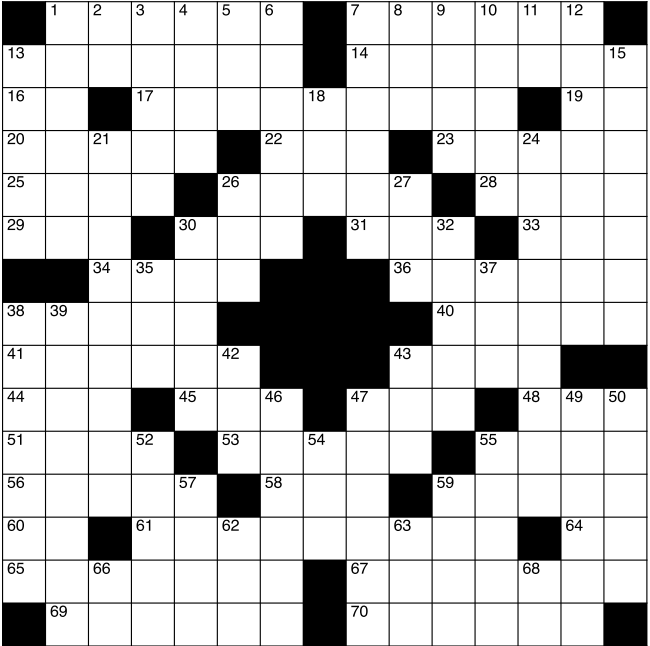
