Labrador **SAREX** tests readiness

The Royal Canadian Air Force and rescue aircraft. hosted its national search and rescue exercise (SAREX) September 15 to 20 in Newfoundland and Labrador.

Organized by 9 Wing Gander, and held at 5 Wing Goose Bay, SAREX included about 250 participants from the Canadian Armed Forces, the Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA), the Canadian Coast Guard and the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary. Primary search and rescue air assets include CH146 Griffon and CH149 Cormorant helicopters, CC130H Hercules and CC115 Buffalo aircraft and four CASARA search

Realistic training scenarios on land, in the air and on the water were set to enhance interoperability and decisionmaking among the SAR community. Participants were tested on search techniques, parachute accuracy, mountaineering, water rescue and emergency medical response.

"The national search and rescue exercise gives our Canadian Armed Forces' SAR professionals and our partners the opportunity to exchange ideas on best practices and lessons learned," said

down in a lake, with no injuries to the passengers. Hercules' flares attracted the downed pilot's attention, as their communications were out. A radio was parachuted in, then SAR-Techs, who actually parachuted into the lake and swam ashore, as the terrain was mountainous and it was dark. The following Cormorant picked up the two SAR-Techs and plane passengers and transported them to hospital in Sept-Îles. The Hercules and Cormorant returned to Greenwood late in the morning of October 3.

"We have provisions for the operation of our aircraft because it's life and limb," Norris said, referring to the Hercules crew's now 16 hours on calls and the Cormorant crew's 17.5 hours out.

In Greenwood October 3, a call around 2 p.m. from the JRCC tasked a Hercules to head north to Cape Dorset in a further extended call. A group of 22 hunters, including nine children, had been trapped at a camp by weather for several days, and couldn't leave in the canoes they'd travelled in. They were running low on supplies and had contacted Nunavut EMO for assistance. 14 Wing crews packed a three-day supply of military rations and camp fuel, and prepared the incoming night crew for a 5 p.m. departure.

"Our night crew from the day before had returned so late in the day, and our day crew had already been on the job for the better part of a shift – and this was something we could do some preplanning for," Norris said. "It wasn't life and limb, but we did expect the crew to be out a number of hours, with a night drop of the supplies."

14 Wing small arms trainer up and running

As part of the Defence Renewal announcement back in October 2013, 14 Wing Greenwood has adopted some new training initiatives; the new Royal Canadian Air Force small arms training system is just one example.

October 3, Lieutenant-Colonel Scott Latter and Chief Warrant Officer Fred Stanley cut the ribbon to officially open the wing's new SAT. Latter and Stanley were the first to fire a round down
