







IMPACT force departs 14 Wing

Leading Seaman Eduardo Jorge, 14 Wing Imaging

Members of the Canadian Armed Forces from various parts of the country departed 14 Wing Greenwood in support of Operation IMPACT October 21. Crews from 14 Wing's Logistics and Engineering, traffic technicians and 8 Wing Trenton personnel worked hand-in hand-loading equipment and supplies into transport aircraft.

CAF personnel, including ground crew, logistic support and air crew; will join allies in the Middle East on one specific mission: to degrade the capability of the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant. Canada's Air Task Force contribution to coalition operations against ISIL includes six CF188 Hornet fighter aircraft from 4 Wing Cold Lake, one CC150T Polaris aerial refueller from 8 Wing Trenton, two CP140 Aurora surveillance aircraft from 14 Wing Greenwood, providing reconnaissance capabilities; a CC130J Hercules tactical airlifter and CC177 Globemaster III strategic airlifter from 8 Wing Trenton and approximately 600 personnel from various elements.

Operation IMPACT is Canada's response to ISIL. CAF members will be working with allies, providing assistance to Iraqi security forces for up to six months.

"In coordination with our allies, Canada is taking action with the Government of Iraq to counter ISIL's barbaric activities and expansionist agenda, which are further destabilizing the region and posing a very real threat to global security," Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper has said. "The air support we are providing will ensure security forces on the ground have the weapons they need to defend innocent Iraqi civilians against these terrorists."

Master Warrant Officer Keith Mitchell is the civil air search and Rescue Non-Commissioned Member for the National and Atlantic Region of Canada, based at 14 Wing Greenwood. He has served in the Canadian Armed Forces for 34 years and has acquired numerous recognitions, including the Cross of Valour in 1998 and the Order of Military Merit in 2012.

Mitchell was born in La-Salle. Québec and was raised in a military family. His father served in the Royal Canadian Navy as a stoker onboard the HMCS Bonaventure, and his uncle served with the 173rd Airborne Brigade in the United States Military. In 1980, two months after his 17th birthday, Mitchell joined the Canadian Armed Forces as a combat engineer; 12 years later, he decided to pursue a career in search and rescue.

The Canadian Armed Forces' search and rescue technicians (SAR-Techs) are elite members that provide on-scene medical aid and evacuation within Canada. SAR-Techs answer

the call in some of the worst of Valour from the Governor weather conditions and over the most rugged terrain.

In 1996. Mitchell and Chief Warrant Officer Brian Pierce went on a rescue mission in the Arctic, off Baffin Island, They parachuted into the ocean and drifted for 30 minutes before being picked up by a life boat that took them to a nearby fishing vessel, where they administered life-saving medical attention to a stricken fisherman. They faced 50 knots wind and 10-foot waves. For this

It is estimated, in 2014, 23,600 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer; 4,000 men will die from prostate cancer. On average, 65 Canadian men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer every day.

Aircraft fire, rescue training takes on reality

"We have a downed CP140 on the button, with 33,000 pounds of fuel and two souls on board...."

Rolling into action on 14 Wing Greenwood's airfield would be fire response crews from 14 Wing Fire and Emergency Services, who have used this scenario in training.

FES has all 14 Wing firefighters up to speed on aircraft fire and rescue response, with a summer's worth of training time on the new MAFT - Mobile Aircraft Fire Trainer - sit-

This is the Royal Canadian Air Force's first propane-fuelled aircraft firefighting simulator, having arrived at 14 Wing late in the spring. The 48-foot metal body tube, with a stylized cockpit, cargo and seating area, exits and a working cargo ramp; can be adjusted to simulate one of the RCAF's cargo or fighter aircraft. The whole thing sits on an 18-wheeler flatbed.

this is it would arrive here in Greenwood, stay here for local training, and then travel to Bagotville and Shearwater, and then come back again."

As 14 Wing can store the MAFT indoors during the winter, the equipment's home base will be here in Greenwood. A late summer start on installation and training means the MAFT will stay here until next spring, when it will indeed become mobile.

In the meantime, firefighters are making good use of the simulator's variable com-

ting in its training compound. Bruce Paradis. "The plan with scenarios. The exercise simulator can remotely ignite or extinguish propane feeds to several burn boxes on the aircraft body to mimic engine, cargo, cockpit, wheel and other fires. It can even simulate "3D" fires, meant to represent fire from pressurized fuel lines. Responders can use vehicle equipment, hand lines and breathing apparatus gear to tackle what they find at the training scene.

> "For safety, if anyone is in or near the simulator and things go wrong, the operator can kill the propane - it's instantaneous," Paradis says.

Responders are evaluated any fire, extract flight crews on their approach to the scene, and also contain damage and including how they establish details for future flight safety a "rescue path" and fight investigations.



charge of all flight functions, including aircraft navigation and survivor spotting, allowing his aircraft commander to concentrate on managing crew resources while flying in the abysmal conditions. Aircraft commander Pellerin placed the helicopter in a 20-metre hover in order for his crew to investigate the life raft, and subsequently moved the aircraft to the sailboat to effect the rescue. Flight engineer Lewis, previously injured during hoist operations, identified an unconventional method to keep the helicopter in position over the vessel, which proved instrumental in the safe completion of the mission. As replacement flight engineer following Lewis' injury, Mar immediately stepped in to operate the safe hoist by placing the SAR technicians on board the raft and sailing vessel, and safely recovering five persons. The crew of Rescue 908 demonstrated exemplary team work, bringing great honour to themselves and to the Canadian Armed Forces.






