Each November, over 13 million poppies blossom in Canada, on the jackets, dresses and hats of nearly half the Canadian population. The poppy is the symbol that individuals use to show they remember those who were killed in the wars and peacekeeping operations Canada has been involved in. 

# Camp life details Great War connections

The cycle of war - enlistment, training, battle; effects on the home front and dealing with losses – is repeated through history. Camp Aldershot, just north of Kentville, is an integral part of the Annapolis Valley, Nova Scotia and Canada's role in those major events.

"A Soldier's Story," the current feature exhibit at the Kings County Museum in Kentville, looks at Camp Aldershot's involvement in the Great War, the First World War, on the centennial of the start of four years of world conflict. Photographs, period equipment, medals and more are surrounded by the personal stories of several soldiers who decamped from the "tent city" that sprung up during these war vears.

Museum curator Bria

for the First World War centennial, with special events and exhibits developed representing the impact on surrounding communities.

"For us, the logical tie in was Camp Aldershot, as the major training centre for young men going overseas," she says. "Our exhibit is not so much about the war and Canada's involvement, but the experience of life and work in the camp. A lot of people brought their own horses for the cavalry, they were all living in tents through the summer and fall seasons – it wasn't a permanent facility; and there were many married men who actually lived there with their families. There were 7,000 people there through 1914 to 1918 – and they all really were training for something they didn't know much about until they got into it."

# Memorial on the mountain

The sun is shining and I'm walking with Morgan, our black Lab. It's quiet on the North Mountain this morning; not a soul in sight as we head for the monument - our half-way mark.

I sought this sheltered spot one day when the wind was fierce and the snow blinding. It has since become a special place, where I stretch my muscles and count my blessings. Today, the scent of pine needles stirs my senses and helps me forget about my thumping heart and aching limbs.

Erected in 1996 by 107 (V) Wing, Royal Canadian Air Force Association, this memorial, near Centreville, honours six members of the RCAF who died and one who survived the crash of a Lancaster Bomber April 20, 1953. The Lancaster was returning to its base at Greenwood after searching for a private plane missing with four people aboard on a flight from Gander, Newfoundland to Ottawa.

Tangled grass intertwined with faded poppies cover the railing where I sit and visit with the men memorialized here: Chances are you flew overhead in the Lanc when I was a teenager biking around Chatham,

My husband was a navy pilot, I tell them. In the seventies and eighties, he, too, worked with search and rescue flying helicopters. Back in the fifties and sixties, he flew Trackers off Her Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) Bonaventure, Canada's last aircraft carrier. During the Cold War, a number of our friends lost their lives flying off the Bonnie. As they say in the navy, "They departed the Delta, that holding pattern in the sky, for the last time." My husband had one close call when the Bonnie's arresting wire failed upon landing. His Tracker ended up hanging over the bow of the ship.

Quite the life, wasn't it? We enjoy telling our grandchildren stories from those long ago military days. They especially love hearing about interesting people like Father Dugan, a chaplain who served on two aircraft carriers, the Bonnie and HMCS Magnificent. I first met Father in the early sixties. He was known as the little priest

A more serious story about Father Dugan is one that is historically documented in the book, Hands to Flying Stations, by naval historian Stu Soward. It tells of Father's part in an event aboard HMCS Magnificent September 23, 1953. At the time, Canada was involved in a North Atlantic Treaty Organization exercise in the Atlantic, Exercise Mariner, that involved hundreds of ships and aircraft and half a million men from nine countries, including the United States, with two of its United States Navy (USN) Essex Class aircraft carriers; and Canada's carrier, HMCS Magnificent. Fifty-two planes were launched from the three aircraft carriers that day when, suddenly, the weather closed in. Visibility zero. Ten aircraft managed to land on United States Ship (USS) Bennington, but the remaining 42 aircraft, running out of fuel, were preparing to ditch into the Atlantic. Aboard Magnificent, the implications of the impending disaster were felt throughout the ship. What little could be done had been done. The ship's boats and cutters were manned, blankets and equipment were assigned and emergency sick

bays were organized. As the NATO task force commander sent distress signals out to the world, a steady stream of personnel headed to the chapel. While Father and his fellow chaplain, Padre Todd, lead everyone in prayer, an opening miraculously appeared in the fog and the 42 aircraft were ordered to head for the nearest carrier. Minutes later, just after the last aircraft was safely aboard, the fog closed in for the remainder of the night.

Morgan yips and barks now, and gives me her let's-get-tothe-pond-stare. But I linger. Lost in thought, I place my hands respectfully on the monument and think of other folks who may have paused here. Folks who stayed long enough to reminisce and, like me, found comfort as they embraced the power of men whose prayers and dreams were tossed aside so long ago.

With gratitude, I whisper "thank you" to flying officers Erle T. Lewis, Douglas A. Hamilton and John D. Curzon; Sergeant Neil McCarrol, Leading Aircraftman William Fifield and Aircraftman First Class (AC1) G. Shoul who lost their lives, and to Flying Officer Kenneth Benson, who survived.

We have not forgotten you.



## Sharing, saving history drives man's collection

Almont Baltzer is a history buff with a self-admitted problem: he can't get enough, and he can't stop.

"I was born for this," he says, manning a display table at the Greenwood Mall October 24 and 25 covered in First and Second world war memorabilia, and more current pictures, aircraft specs, medal displays and books....

"Museums are great, but mobility is the way to fly: I can put all this in my little car and go anywhere and share."

He's determined to record the past, and have it accessible to anyone interested. He's set up in public venues before, and made presentations to local Lions Clubs and Legions.

"I could go on for three days on this - and I'm only allowed to talk for 20 minutes!"

But, seriously: "I realize the past has to be recorded, or it will die. You learn from history – you're supposed to learn from history, or it's all for nothing. This was not all for nothing."

## From nothing to a new start

"We came as immigrants the Canadians encouraged us."

Jan Speelman described the start of his family's new life in 1948 to an audience gathered for a Remembrance Day service November 3 at West Kings high school.

"When I tell my story, it's over a period of five years. When the war started, I was eight years old and I lived in a small town (in Holland). What I have seen in the war is not for every person to hear. I tell vou like it is."

Speelman spoke movingly of his family's experiences, and how Holland suffered. when the Germans invaded in May 1940: destruction and death, living in fear of the enemy – and Dutch traitors, his father in hiding with the Lament. underground for years, and the endless hunger.

"We ate a lot of carrots, the winter carrots with the yellow hearts. Breakfast, dinner, supper – and it was more than others had. Nothing means nothing, and that is hard to understand. You never asked questions, there was no information, people traded gold rings for food, there were warnings and control of all the people. There is nothing in war.

"Nothing."

He described searches from house to house for radios, Jews and young men; how a home with the slightest hint of candles would be machined gunned until the lights disappeared, and how the Germans, going to and from the front, grew meaner and meaner as their losses mounted.

"Some people thought the world had come to an end."

Instead, after five long vears, the Canadians came.





The Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) Sports Awards Ceremony honoured the past year's outstanding CAF athletic achievements October 24 at the Hampton Inn Conference Centre in Ottawa.

Through this annual ceremony, the CAF recognizes the accomplishments of its elite athletes and sports supporters. The ceremony features awards for athlete, coach, official and team of the year. Outstanding sports careers are also recognized with inductions into the Canadian Armed Forces Sports Honour Roll and the Canadian Armed Forces Sports Hall of Fame, the evening's highest honour.

General Tom Lawson, Chief of the Defence Staff, paid tribute to the important role sports play in the lives of military personnel.

"It's important for leadership at all levels to recognize the tremendous benefit of making regular physical activity the norm for everyone in uniform. Many of those same attributes we wish

the same as those developed on the field of play: discipline, commitment, leadership, teamwork, perseverance... and that intangible quality, the warrior spirit."

Helwer is a Reservist, law student and world-ranked fencer from provincials and the Canadian University Championships. She
