Building virtual connections

Forces families to one another, shares valuable information and provides a networking vehicle - all from the comfort of their computer. It provides convenient and enhanced access to programs and services for all CAF families, regardless of their geographic location.

Virtual programs have been used for the last four years in Europe, benefiting more than 600 CAF families living in 16 countries. Programs have included employment and scholarship workshops, weight wellness, a virtual book club, and open forum discussion groups.

Adapting a live program to a virtual audience requires creativity, patience, expertise and understanding of participant learning styles. Presenters must have an understanding of the importance of creating engaging sessions that enhance collaboration and input during informative workshops. Each presenter works with a producer who helps to navigate the technological aspects of virtual outreach in order to alleviate natural fears that some participants may have in joining a virtual workshop for the first time. When done properly, virtual programs are fun, enticing and interactive.

In the spring of 2014, Military Family Services Europe partnered with Military Family Resource Centre - National Capital Region to host training sessions on how to tailor a live program to a virtual audience. This pilot session included participants from Military Family Resource Centres across the country and around the world. Based on its success, we decided to combine the lessons learned and are now ready to offer this Virtual Outreach training to all Military Family Resource Centres over the next 18 months.



West: belief in uniform, excellence and people

If the chief of Canada's defence system has operational excellence as one his top four priorities - if not the most important, he could see no better example of it than here at 14 Wing Greenwood.

Chief Warrant Officer Kevin West, chief warrant officer of the Canadian Armed Forces and CDS General Tom Lawson's right hand man, visited 14 Wing October 30, and gathered several hundred personnel for an afternoon town hall session at the Annapolis Mess.

"Thank you – for everything you do, day in and day out," West said. "I know we're short of people and cash, but we do it. Ten days to get Operation

Impact out? Unbelievable."

West arrived just days after 14 Wing added two CP140M Aurora aircraft and 60 personnel to the international effort to subdue Islamic State of Irag and the Levant aggression in Iraq. Across Canada and here at 14 Wing, military wheels were in high motion to deploy 600 CAF personnel and equipment from the Thanksgiving weekend to October 24's Aurora departure from Greenwood.

And the home base's Wing Chief Warrant Officer Pierrot Jetté echoed that thanks.

"All of you who stepped up to the plate and got our folks out the door – that was a hectic two weeks," Jetté said. "And, thanks to those here behind, picking up the work while

missed a beat."

West said operational excellence "is what we do," above

"Almost everyone in this room is touching that deployment, or a search and rescue mission.... It's a full-team effort."

Responding to the loss of two team members on Canadian soil earlier in October -Warrant Officer Patrice Vincent in Saint-Jean-sur-Richelieu, Quebec, and Corporal Nathan Cirillo in Ottawa, West said the entire CAF – and Canada – has had a tough time. Opinions about force protection measures, security and whether military uniforms should be worn off base by members have been non-stop since.

the threat," West said. "We're just us: it's our neighbours, still protecting Canadians – it's the people at the bus stop what we're paid to do – and, if with us....

"Canadian society believes in this uniform and, everywhere we go in uniform, it's operational excellence that gets us there."

West's own priorities align with the CDs', and also include the education and leadership development of those who bear arms and represent Canada at home and abroad, developing the non-commissioner members' ranks, communication and support for military veterans, injured members and their families. He spoke about the demand to change attitudes around mental health and suicide, and the CAF programs in place available to help. He also highlighted the importance of life-long fitness – physical and mental - in his role on the CAF pension advisory committee.





MPEU's McDonald wins Northern **Lights Government Award**

The Northern Lights Awards were established to honour women who make a significant contribution to aviation or aerospace in Canada. Recently, 14 Wing's own Sandy McDonald, a contractor at Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit, won one of just six such awards for 2014.

McDonald won in the gov-





# Work behind the museum scenes

#### Malcolm Uhlman, **Greenwood Military Aviation Museum Society**

If you are a frequent visitor to the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum, you have no doubt noticed several areas of volunteer activity, including in the air park and around interior displays. There are more ongoing projects you might not have been aware of, all being tackled by aircraft and historical aficionado volunteers.

In the museum's workshop, the nose section of the Bolingbroke is nearing completion. Most of the cockpit has been restored, with a flare gun installed and a new pilot's seat cushion manufactured. All windows are now in place, a manufactured forward escape hatch is in position and a recently-upholstered navigator's seat sits atop a new woodpanelled floor. A bomb sight

Is attached to the table and an Aldis signal lamp sits in a holder beneath. Also, the navigator's forward instrument panel is being constructed. Work on the centre wing box continues, with all top panels replaced; and the repaired inner flaps can now be installed. Next, the landing gear and engine cowlings will be completed, finishing off the wing box before engine installation. Fabric covering of the remanufactured skeletons of the rudder, both ailerons and both elevators will soon com-

have arrived

The Piasecki H44 helicopter restoration continues, as the duplicate US Army rear fuselage has been stripped of needed parts, including the rear bottom fairing, for use on the RCAF 592 fuselage. The messy work of cleaning and

paint stripping these parts has begun. Paint stripping of the 592 blue and red fuselage is proving a challenge, as several layers of paint have to be laboriously removed using an eco-friendly stripper. Significant corrosion has been found in some areas, necessitating anti-corrosion measures or the removal and replacement of some panels.


The Dakota internal restoration is now nearing comple-

mence, as the fabric materials tion, as work continues on refurbishing the cargo area. When completed, this will allow visitors to see both the outside and the inside of this beautiful aircraft

> You will notice the Neptune in the air park is being scuffed and given a fresh coat of paint. The environmental elements in this area are very harsh, requiring special treatment to aircraft exteriors and interiors. To assist in the longevity of paint, clear coats - like that on the unmounted T33 - will become the norm in future and, to prevent mildew and mould, all aircraft will contain moisture-expelling systems.

> The Lancaster reconfiguration project will see the entire aircraft cleaned, primed and repainted in Second World War camouflage paint, like the already-completed tail surfaces. The cooler weather has slowed further progress; the remainder will be done in the spring. Like the tail, the nose has been repainted, shortened to its Second World War configuration, and the proper nose gun turret is being manufactured from authentic images. The turret cage structure is complete, and work now concentrates on the internal structures of ammunition trays and gun supports. Plexiglas will be moulded for the turret windows and, below the turret, for a new nose bubble.

A new project that will soon commence is the restoration these programs.

of a 1960s Mercury aircraft tug that once towed aircraft. Projects like this, when placed around air park aircraft, make for a diorama that enhances understanding of the total role of the wing.

Finally, a dynamic diorama has been completed inside the museum, depicting a Second World War 404 Squadron air raid on ships in a Norwegian fiord, with disastrous results: the event is known as Black Friday. The Argus Tactical Crew Procedure Trainer LED lighting project is progressing, bringing the display panels alive, and the museum's newly-redesigned webpage has been uploaded.

In addition to all this activity, the Flight Education volunteer team is organizing its 12th year of instructing Grade 6 science students from local schools in their course on aeronautics and flight. Over 5,000 students and teachers have already attended
