# Windows' light, lives remembered highlight St. Mark's 60th

A little piece of St. Mark's Chapel history popped up at just the right time to mark a major milestone this spring.

April 26, the congregation and invited community friends will rededicate a memorial panel of stained glass windows as part of 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations of the dedication of the chapel in 1955.

Chapel archivist Mary Lou Graham was pleased to recently accept from Frank Martyn a service bulletin from that dedication event. Martyn is the son-in-law of then-Wing Commander and 2 Maritime Operations

C.D. MacLean. As Graham considered the bulletin, she noticed the dates: "This is the anniversary year."

The three-panel window was installed as the chapel was dedicated in 1955, two years after the original construction. Captain The Reverend Ken Greer, chapel padre, says those panels hold "sacred the memory of everyone who, at that time, had died supporting missions out of Greenwood base," including close to three dozen individuals. # Fire service 'unbelievable' 14 Wing's new chief ready for the challenge

Captain James Gannon is fully aware his new job as 14 Wing Greenwood's fire chief could be the best job of his career.

"I know I've probably said that about every job after 20 years in the forces," Gannon says, "but this is challenging, rewarding and comes with a great crew of people."

Gannon is a construction engineering officer, and could be doing planning, operations, contracts or any of the myriad supervisory roles that fall within the trade. Fresh out of the fire manager indoctrination course, he was posted to 14 Wing's Fire and Emergency Services in February.

"It was a 'win-win' posting. They asked me if I wanted to be a fire chief – yes! They said Greenwood - ves!"

Gannon arrived in Greenwood for the first time on a driver's course, back in 1999 as a West Nova Scotia Regiment member. He remustered as a plumber and was back in Greenwood, part of 141 Airfield Engineering Flight in Bridgewater, to build a C-span. He joined the Regular Force in 2002, and had several postings and tours, including the Golan Heights in 2003, an exercise in Fort Bragg, North Carolina; and teaching plumbing

and heating at the Canadian because he's gone in June. Forces School of Military officer training, beginning in 2008, and was posted an air traffic controller in training. Following a stint in Moose Jaw, he was back in Greenwood again in 2013, as a construction engineer in trainings, inspections and training, and then deployed to Georgia as flight commander a nation-wide equipment on a construction exchange.

# The 'unseen' side of 14 Wing communications

Sometimes overlooked, members of the Department of National Defence's communication world, the Army Communication and Information Systems Specialist (ACISS) - line systems technologists (LST); are the installers and maintainers of the backbone communication infrastructure on every wing, base and camp - domestically and deployed.

The line section has two corporals and one master corporal, led by a sergeant, and is part of the Wing Telecommunications and Information

team here at 14 Wing Greenwood. The section is located in 4 Hangar, where members work with the rest of the WTISS family under the umbrella of the Wing Logistics and Engineering Branch.

Linemen are often found high on communication towers, or underground in the many manholes across the wing, linking tens of kilometres of cables, the towers situated on the base and in the surrounding areas. On call 24/ 7, linemen provide communication capability for the wing, enhancing flight training or operations. The line also provides the fibre optic service for secure networks directly to users. Linemen also work

Corporal D.J.R. Villeneuve Systems Squadron (WTISS) in the main termination rooms summer for members of the (MTRs) in every building, the central point connecting main communication cables that feed the immense amount of computers, telephones and all the different systems across the wing. You may have noticed the line truck parked by the side of the road. or randomly in a field.

At 14 Wing Greenwood. crews also work with the ATIS (aerospace telecommunication information systems) technicians. The linemen provide the main communication cable (copper or fibre optic) feed into the building's MTR; the ATIS technicians then provide the link to your office space or work station.

Winter is more harsh than

trade, as they work mainly outside repairing damage by snow clearing operations, weather, natural phenomenon or excavation done by contractors. Recently, crews had to dia some of the frozen around on an extremely cold day repairing fire alarm circuits. This was due to an impact between a pedestal (skinny grey box that stands three feet out of the ground) and a loader clearing snow - the pedestal lost that fight!

With the ever evolving communication technologies DND uses, there will always be a need for lineman and their skill set to connect them together, keeping the lines of communication open and operating.

# MFRC relief with end of fraud, theft trial

# 14 FES answered 405 calls through 2014

14 Wing Fire and Emergency Services provided all fire protection services to 14 Wing Greenwood and modified services to Camp Aldershot during 2014. The manning and equipment levels are established to meet a Category 6 airfield rescue and firefighting operation and emergency fire operations in respect of Department of National Defence and Canadian Armed Forces infrastructure.

14 Wing FES has an established manning of one captain as fire chief, and 40 Regular Force NCMs augmented by eight Reserve NCMs. At the end of 2014, FES was just under-manned, with 38 of the 40 positions filled.

FES continued to provide personnel for support of CAF operations and exercises, including contributions within Canada - Inuvik, Igaluit, Alert, Borden, Cold Lake, Winnipeg, Gagetown; and internationally - Savannah, Georgia; Romania and Kuwait.

A number of personnel within FES received career training which placed a higher level of stress on the operational manning. With the large number of QL3 trades persons being produced by the system, FES is in a constant training cycle, with ongoing QL4 requirements and eventual QL5 course loading. In March, 14 Wing became a trial base for a Mobile Aircraft Trainer (MAFT), which allowed ARFF recertification training to be conducted at the wing providing significant cost savings. CFB Shearwater was recertified using this trainer at 14 Wing. This training was previously conducted at Pearson International.

Vehicle serviceability continued to be an issue through 2014 in regards to general purpose vehicles. The lack of a water tower or ladder truck has resulted in the continued use of a 1993 structural pumper, which remains a challenge to keep serviceable. A wildland vehicle was transferred from Detachment Dundurn in January to replace the current 1995-12817 International model, based in Camp Aldershot to provide protection to the ranges. The 2005 Stirling received had too many deficiencies to place in service: this vehicle is currently being repaired and is hoped to be in service prior to the upcoming wildland season.

14 Wing FES responded to 405 calls for assistance during 2014. These can be divided up into four categories: fire incidents (35: three Category 1, three Category 2, 27 Category 5, 2 brush/ grass fires), medical (35), aircraft incidents (80: 21 in-flight emergencies, two ground incidents, four barrier engagements, seven hazardous processes, three hot brakes, 41 engine runups, one cable operation and one blown tire), and non-fire incidents (255:

including false alarms, fuel spills/ leaks etc. (255: one ruptured water pipe, one vehicle accident, one public hazard – gasoline or fuel wash down, four public hazard gasoline or fuel spill standby, six downed power lines, two miscellaneous public hazrds, two propane leaks, three carbon monoxide alarm detections, three miscellaneous gas leaks, one citicen trapped in an elevator, one assist to police or other agency, 13 accidental miscellaneous, five smoke or steam mistaken for fire, five sprinkler surges or discharges, 82 dectectors activated, 8 unknown odours, 16 miscellaneous, one internal or local alarm system call and one unclassified situation)

The Fire Inspection Bureau was active through 2014, performing regular fire inspections, engineering reviews and training of 14 Wing personnel. There were 385 inspections conducted of 14 Wing buildings, with another 126 completed at Camp Aldershot. Fifty-four off-wing buildings were also inspected. Both sites hosted two fire wardens' courses, training a total of 31 people. Portable firefighting equipment courses were held, required every four years for all CAF and DND employees, regardless of their employment: 35 at 14 Wing and four at Camp Aldershot, training a total of 456 people. Firefighters conducted 86 visits of Residential Housing Units at fire trends at 14 Wing through 2014, and Aldershot again had reportable incidents caused by the misuse of pyrotechnics which, while not acceptable, it is a fact of operating ranges.

# Optimizing maintenance of vehicles, equipment critical to success

In the heavy equipment maintenance hangar at Garrison Edmonton, Private Naomi Timmons gets up from her work stool by a Heavy Logistics Vehicle Wheeled (HLVW) wheel base and heads off in search of parts.

She returns about 15 minutes later carrying a sealed plastic bag with 10 round metal shims. "They are OEM (original equipment manufacturer), and they were right here!" she says.

If you are a vehicle technician in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) or Canadian Army (CA) whose job it is to keep the vehicles and equipment in military fleets operational every day, waiting for parts to arrive can add a significant amount of time to your schedule.

Efficient workshop layout and design, workflow, availability of parts and training necessary for personnel to become qualified and authorized to perform maintenance tasks are important not only in the garrison, but also when soldiers are in the field.

KPMG has been retained to conduct a CAF-wide analysis of maintenance execution in land, naval and air maintenance facilities; and began in the 3rd Canadian Division vehicle maintenance hangar in early February as part of Defence Renewal initiatives.

"We want to increase the time techs spend actually working on equipment, and seek a balance between doing corrective mainte-

nance and preventative maintenance," says Major Chris Wood, Army G4 Desk Officer in charge of the Land Maintenance Execution portion of KPMG's work. "We are going to the maintainers on the ground to seek their input because we believe they already have the solutions."

Next, the KPMG team will travel to Halifax and Greenwood to look at maintenance execution in the Navy and Air Force, respectively. In the coming months, KPMG personnel from the maintenance execution initiative will visit a number of other CAF maintenance facilities across the country. Its report and will be ready






