The Greenwood Military Aviation Museum Lancaster now has her new nose. She is regaining the majestic dignity due such a venerable aircraft. Volunteers shortened the nose by 31" to reconfigure her back to Second World War Il configuration and as a representative aircraft flown by 405 Squadron overseas. The correct replica nose turret is nearing completion and will be installed later.

The mandate for the Greenis very weather dependent wood Military Aviation Museum is to record and display the history of the Greenwood airbase from its conception during the Second World War took up the challenge and to today. The Lancaster aircraft was the first aircraft obtained by the wing in 1964. Configured from an active bomber to a photographing and mapping aircraft in the 1950s, the nose had a 31" addition for the installation of multiple cameras. As there were no Second World War aircraft on display at the museum - and all Greenwood's squadrons formed overseas during the Stay tuned!

war years - the decision was made to reconfigure the aircraft back to a wartime configuration to commemorate the contribution of 405 Squadron.

The museum's volunteers have successfully removed the "long" nose, shortened it to the proper length of a wartime Lancaster, cleaned and painted it in camouflage colours and have now reattached it to the fuselage. In addition, the original nose turret was a mockup, so a correct replica is being constructed. with installation soon.

CAMP CANADA, KUWAIT - The two Mobile Expandable Containers (MECs) that make up the Deployable Mission Support Centre (DMSC) look unassuming in their corner of Camp Canada, yet they house an important capability for Air Task Force-Iraq's Long Range Patrol (LRP) Detachment.

Tidily installed inside this unique set-up is everything the detachment needs to keep up the flow of important intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) data to the Middle East Stabilization Force. From servers and computer workstations to chart-plotters and communications equipment, the portable operations centre is a hub of activity. Air conditioned against the hot Kuwaiti desert conditions, the DMSC also has a briefing room in which aircrews can prepare for missions in comfort, as well as conduct analysis and debriefs after a reconnaissance sortie.

The CP140M is among the most advanced ISR platforms in the skies and its sensors and cameras are used to good effect by the crews to keep tabs on various ISIS activities in Iraq. But extracting that data and getting it into the hands of commanders and




Doubling up





Hams prepare for disaster

For over 100 years, amateur radio has allowed millions of people to experiment with electronics and communications techniques. Amateur radio operators are private individuals licensed by Industry Canada to operate two-way radio equipment for non-commercial purposes. Also known as "hams," they have a proud history of helping in times of disaster. They provided invaluable assistance during the ice storm of 1998, the crash of Swissair 111 and hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Closer to evacuation of Kosovo refu-

Organized by the Ameriteur radio operators and their can Radio Relay League, the field day is an emergency preparedness exercise that encourages operators to step away from the regular electrical grid and power their station using emergency systems. The objective is to make contact with as many stations as possible while operating under simulated emergency conditions.

Amateur radio has been described as the only failsafe communications network in the world: even if regular infrastructure has been destroyed, hams can set up portable stations and quickly re-establish communications in a disaster home, hams supported the zone. Hurricanes, ice storms, ing essential communications. Today, almost all astronauts are hams, and contacts with the International Space Station are a daily occurrence. Far from the popular image of old men hunched over Morse code kevs, amateur radio is actually a dynamic hobby that uses state-of-the-art technology. Hams communicate with a wide variety of voice, image and digital modes, using exotic techniques such as bouncing signals off the Moon or the trails left by meteors.

The Greenwood Amateur Radio Club has commitments to the Emergency Measures Organization in both Kings and Annapolis counties. To practice for these commitments, club members will establish a complete emergency station for field day at the picnic park near Cottage Cove, located 1.5 km southwest of Port George on Shore Road East. Setup will start the morning of June 27, and operations will continue until late in the afternoon June 28. Members of the public are welcome to drop by. A station will be available for visitors to get on the air as well, if they would like to try their hand at radio communication!
