## Strong message to military Dignity, respect, safe workplace will come with response to sexual misconduct report

Extremely uncomfortable.

Lieutenant-General Christine Whitecross led close to 2,000 14 Wing Greenwood military and civilian personnel through a troubling, frank and challenging set of town hall sessions June 8, focused on the Canadian Armed Forces' response to the April report on sexual misconduct in the military.

"This is intellectually and emotionally draining at times," she says. "Long days, I'm away, it affects my family – but I wouldn't have it any other way."

She and members of the Canadian Armed Forces Stra-

tegic Response Team are one-third of the way through 33 base visits, bringing home the message any sex-related harassment, joking, assault, discrimination and inappropriate behaviour happening in the CAF is going to stop.

"Maybe 10 per cent of you have read the report. You must. It's about us, and it's important."

She admitted it made her angry to read how people she's worked with throughout her career have been treated – or how some are getting away with treating others.

"I'm a proud member of the chain of command, and I can tell you I care immensely about the people in my care, and their families.

"I know there are people doing the right thing, but I have stories of where we're not doing the right thing. We're not looking for easy: we're looking for right."

Attention by military leaders, government and Canadians has made the CAF look inward – and forward. There are 10 recommendations in the recent report: the first was to accept that we have a problem in the Canadian Armed Forces, and it's followed by steps to change a sexualized culture, support victims, tackle the

intertwined issues of rank, alcohol and sex; and educate and train CAF members to recognize sexual misconduct, and act to stop it.

"We have people uncomfortable in the workplace, and that's corrosive. It affects our operational ability," Whitecross said. "We must have units so cohesive, so close they are able to perform their duties. There are dual imperatives to this: effective operational capability, and respectful teams of people that don't undermine operational capability. We want to treat everyone the same; everyone wants to be treated the same."

In the meantime, CAF policies are unclear, definitions are not encompassing – particularly of accepted gender and sexual orientations, the role of chain of command in discipline is inconsistent and it could be several years before an independent, victim-focused centre of support is established.

"This team is in place for the mandate of the report, the recommendations and the establishment of a centre. We're not going to drop the ball."

## Nose job underway on museum's Lancaster

The transformation continues!

The Greenwood Military Aviation Museum Lancaster now has her new nose. She is regaining the majestic dignity due such a venerable aircraft. Volunteers shortened the nose by 31" to reconfigure her back to Second World War II configuration and as a representative aircraft flown by 405 Squadron overseas. The correct replica nose turret is nearing completion and will be installed later.

Repainting of the fuselage continues which, of course, is very weather dependent - the paint scheme being the camouflage pattern of the Second World War. New markings and nose art of an aircraft flown by 405 Squadron will make the transformation complete. Yes... she's going to be painted as a 405 Squadron "Pathfinder" bird, LQ-G, named "Gutless Gert," a 60-mission aircraft lost during an overnight bombing raid November 17/ 18, 1943.

A dorsal turret is also planned to be reinstalled and a tail wheel, obtained from Bomber Command Museum in

Nanton, AB, will be replaced.

The mandate for the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum is to record and display the history of the Greenwood airbase from its conception during the Second World War to today. The Lancaster aircraft was the first aircraft obtained by the wing in 1964. Configured from an active bomber to a photographing and mapping aircraft in the 1950s, the nose had a 31" addition for the installation of multiple cameras. As there were no Second World War aircraft on display at the museum - and all Greenwood's squadrons formed overseas during the

war years - the decision was made to reconfigure the aircraft back to a wartime configuration to commemorate the contribution of 405 Squadron.

The museum's volunteers took up the challenge and have successfully removed the "long" nose, shortened it to the proper length of a wartime Lancaster, cleaned and painted it in camouflage colours and have now reattached it to the fuselage. In addition, the original nose turret was a mockup, so a correct replica is being constructed, with installation soon.

Lots to do, worth the wait! Stay tuned!

Out-going – and posted with her family – MFRC board Kristin Gillis acknowledged the transition year ahead, with new volunteers coming on stream, but a strategic plan and training opportunities have been identified.

"The board is in good hands."

Clark, Natalie Catto, Beth McLean, Annette Davidson, Pam Patten and Sandra Trail.

In the fiscal year ended March 31, 2015, the MFRC recorded a deficit of \$32,575. Revenue from partner sources and fundraising totalled \$1,179,185, about \$35,000 higher than budgeted. Program costs ran \$134,040, almost \$19,000 over budget. Expenditures, including \$933,932 in salaries, totalled \$1,045,145, under budget by about \$17,000.

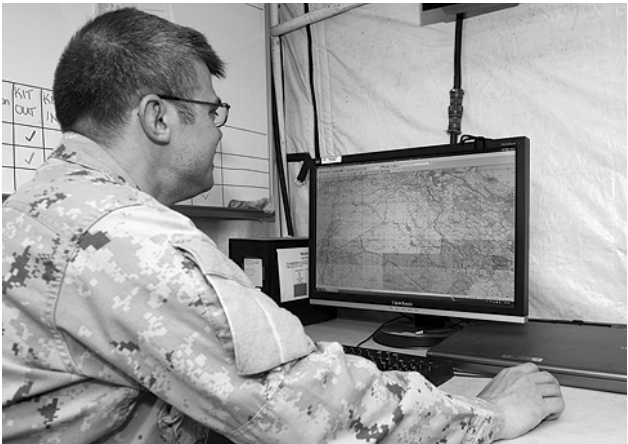
# Long Range Patrol's 'home away from home' in Kuwait

CAMP CANADA, KUWAIT - The two Mobile Expandable Containers (MECs) that make up the Deployable Mission Support Centre (DMSC) look unassuming in their corner of Camp Canada, yet they house an important capability for Air Task Force-Iraq's Long Range Patrol (LRP) Detachment.

Tidily installed inside this unique set-up is everything the detachment needs to keep up the flow of important intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) data to the Middle East Stabilization Force. From servers and computer workstations to chart-plotters and communications equipment, the portable operations centre is a hub of activity. Air conditioned against the hot Kuwaiti desert conditions, the DMSC also has a briefing room in which aircrews can prepare for missions in comfort, as well as conduct analysis and debriefs after a reconnaissance sortie.

The CP140M is among the most advanced ISR platforms in the skies and its sensors and cameras are used to good effect by the crews to keep tabs on various ISIS activities in Iraq. But extracting that data and getting it into the hands of commanders and

intelligence personnel within the coalition is up to those in the DMSC.

"By acting as the focal

point for ISR data, the DMSC provides rapid intelligence

assessments of the Aurora's products, including high resolution photos and video, not only for use by other intelligence assets and units, but also to be fed back into the planning cycle for the next mission," noted the LRP Detachment commander. "The staff at the DMSC are performing to the exceptionally high level we expect, taking the impressive capabilities of the CP140M and translating them into extraordinary operational effect."

While the centre has been proven previously during numerous exercises and operations, like 2011's Op Mobile, Op Impact is the DMSC's

debut in a true desert environment.

"To support Op Impact, the DMSC deployed with the first wave of Aurora aircrew, maintainers and support personnel," said a senior leader in the LRP Detachment. "Within days it began playing its vital role as a conduit of information, funneling mission-critical data to the flying crews and maximizing their effectiveness while airborne."

The DMSC was transported into Kuwait on some of the first flights after Canada committed to helping in the fight against ISIS. The modular design of the DMSC enables the MECs to be loaded into a

CC177 cargo or other transport aircraft and flown almost anywhere in the world that a CP140 Aurora detachment may find itself operating from.

"The DMSC is almost like a home away from home for the aircrew. It performs all of the same functions as a Wing operations centre back in Canada," noted the Deputy Operations Officer. "It can be set up in only a few hours, although there have been some improvements made to it since we got here, reinforced air conditioning and heat-reducing canopies over the roof being among the most important for desert operations."

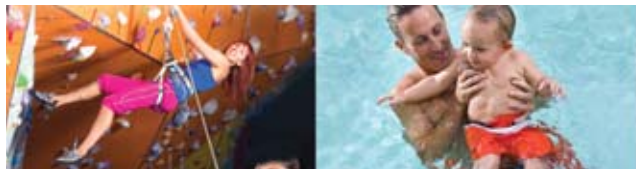

## Hams prepare for disaster

Hurricanes, ice storms, floods – no matter what the disaster, emergency officials all over North America will be better able to communicate, thanks to the efforts of amateur radio operators and their annual field day exercise June 27 and 28.

For over 100 years, amateur radio has allowed millions of people to experiment with electronics and communications techniques. Amateur radio operators are private individuals licensed by Industry Canada to operate two-way radio equipment for non-commercial purposes. Also known as “hams,” they have a proud history of helping in times of disaster. They provided invaluable assistance during the ice storm of 1998, the crash of Swissair 111 and hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Closer to home, hams supported the evacuation of Kosovo refugees to 14 Wing Greenwood. Today, operators are provid-

ing essential communications in earthquake-ravaged Nepal, and are often the only link to the outside world from remote communities.

Organized by the American Radio Relay League, the field day is an emergency preparedness exercise that encourages operators to step away from the regular electrical grid and power their station using emergency systems. The objective is to make contact with as many stations as possible while operating under simulated emergency conditions.

Amateur radio has been described as the only failsafe communications network in the world: even if regular infrastructure has been destroyed, hams can set up portable stations and quickly re-establish communications in a disaster zone. Operators come from all walks of life, from Nobel Prize-winning astrophysicists to your next-door neighbour.

Today, almost all astronauts are hams, and contacts with the International Space Station are a daily occurrence. Far from the popular image of old men hunched over Morse code keys, amateur radio is actually a dynamic hobby that uses state-of-the-art technology. Hams communicate with a wide variety of voice, image and digital modes, using exotic techniques such as bouncing signals off the Moon or the trails left by meteors.

The Greenwood Amateur Radio Club has commitments to the Emergency Measures Organization in both Kings and Annapolis counties. To practice for these commit-

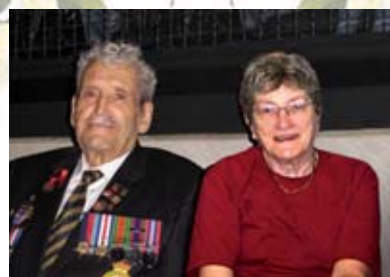
