## Get in the game Youth, family golf great summer fun

Picking up golf skills at a young age is about building muscle memory and the foundations of technique. What else does it do?

"I've been playing for 55 years, I guess," says Stu Nauss. "I was five, and I remember walking the course as a caddy for my Dad. I liked being out, I liked being with him."

Nauss and Mike Logan are volunteers with the Greenwood Golf Club, and they're the volunteers behind this summer's junior golf program. Through July, they're coaching two dozen youth to early success – and, hopefully, a lifetime of golf enjoyment.

"Golf was bred into me – it really helps kids pick up the game when a par-

ent comes out with them. I learned from my father, and there were a bunch of senior mentors at the course growing up who helped me," Nauss says.

That's exactly the thinking behind Greenwood club manager Karen Gorman's plans for the junior program.

"The whole intent is to have families come out and play together – no one is on the sidelines," she says. "The course is beautiful, we have orange tees out for younger golfers and beginners so it's not intimidating, you can borrow clubs for the kids and it's all meant to be fun and expose everyone to the game."

Weekend family golf packages are affordable: \$10 plus tax for parents, youth ages six to 18 are free and families can borrow

clubs from the pro shop for free. Anytime after 2 p.m., the course is family friendly.

"We have our regular golfers, and they're welcome any time. We just ask our families, who may have some newer golfers with them, to let more advanced groups play through. That way no one is rushed."

And, really, seeing families and youth on the course is great for the game as a whole.

"You can play golf for life, and we want youth to pick up the game early," Gorman says. "Golf is what you want to make it: you can play for fun, against yourself or you can become more competitive."

Nauss agrees. When he sees some of his golf students playing on their own or with their own family, it is satisfying.

"We cover balance, posture, swing and build muscle memory" in the lessons, following a national golf instruction program, Nauss says. What makes it stick is finding personal enjoyment in the game.

"There has to be a 'tweak,' in why youth want to learn to play – they've watched it, or someone in their family plays. Some may come out, take a shot and think, 'Oh, I'm horrible.' Others will get a good shot in and say, 'Gee, this is pretty good.'"

"It took me years, years, to beat my Dad – maybe 20 years, but golf is where you meet people and spend a lot of great time."

The Defence Ethics Programme (DEP)'s 2015 movie, *An Unlikely Adventure*, is now available.

Accompanying the movie is a study guide that includes specific questions related to movie situations geared at facilitating and encouraging ethical dialogue in group situations.

## 'Strength to strength' 14 Wing's new honorary colonel committed to belief in work

"I'm here to join you," said Terry Kelly, as he was invested July 6 as 14 Wing Greenwood's newest honorary colonel.

"I've enjoyed a life of not being overprotected, of being coached and counselled – giving me the gift of belief, that you believe in something you are working towards. In the military, to work together as one, that's what you do."

The blind Nova Scotian singer-songwriter, entertainer and speaker takes on a three-year term as honorary colonel, taking over as businesswoman and author Barb Stegemann signs off.

Kelly gave a humorous account of his memorable hounding of several Canadian military leaders, as he angled for the opportunity to travel to Afghanistan and entertain Canadian troops. He was

successful with General Rick Hillier, who informed him he could look after the "night operations" while in country. He met current 14 Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston on that trip for the first time, and now says he'll do the same work for Huddleston and the incoming commander, Colonel Pat Thauberger. He dreamed from an early age of flying, and joked with Stegemann, who failed her own hearing test trying to join the Canadian Armed Forces, that he would have passed that requirement.

"I have been blessed in my life with so many wonderful mentors who gave me gifts I take very seriously. It is a delight to be here today, to share and use those gifts in whatever way I can."

Stegemann congratulated Kelly on his new role, and wished him well.

"I couldn't think of a better person to 'tag team'

with," she said, remembering her journalism student days when she spent a week with the Kellys on a documentary project.

"I have had some special moments, some spiritual moments" while serving as honorary colonel at 14 Wing, she said, highlighting opportunities she had to meet and work with people on women's issues, post traumatic stress disorder and business development that goes hand in hand with the work the military does.

"We as citizens must do more of the 'heavy lifting'

to build peace in new ways, and not just leave it to government and military. I've made it part of my role as honorary colonel to bring positive media attention to 14 Wing and the military."

Huddleston was pleased to see 14 Wing moving from "strength to strength," in the changeover from Stegemann to Kelly.

"It's with mixed emotions we're saying goodbye and welcoming two great Canadians – and Nova Scotians – at the same time. We're a tight knit family, and we welcome you all."

## ‘Success with something that matters’ 14 Wing on solid path: Huddleston

More, better, faster.

That would about sum up the past two years’ pace at 14 Wing Greenwood, as Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston prepares to depart July 23.

Upon his arrival in 2013, Huddleston was challenged with combining several aircraft maintenance lines into a streamlined structure. It was actioned within months, but has still taken time to work out the fine details. Still, “the proof is in the pudding,” Huddleston says.

“We have fewer airplanes, we’re more stretched as a fleet and we’re still enjoying better serviceability and availability than we ever had. Without those changes, we wouldn’t be where we’re at.”

Taking the modernized CP140 M Aurora, the Block III, was on his list: “we blew through that very quickly,” Huddleston says. Once national and international eyes started seeing what the new

Aurora could do, the aircraft and its crews were on deck at the international RIMPAC training exercise and at Operation Nanook, showing the prime minister its intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance capabilities in a remote location.

“There were significant technical challenges – much accelerated,” Huddleston says.

Tackling those issues became a prime driver in the move to “bring all eggs into one basket,” with the merger of 14 Wing’s Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit and 14 Software Engineering Squadron into a re-energized 415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron this June.

“We’re now better organized to deal with the many technical enhancements planned for the aircraft; we’re also moving forward with the rest of the units at 14 Wing and 19 Wing Comox to ensure our folks are used as effectively as possible. We’re short on manpower, but we’re

trying to make better use of the people we have for the future growth of the force.”

Add in the sudden demands on the Aurora fleet, and supporting elements at home and abroad, as Canada undertook a major role as part of the international coalition against the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria: 14 Wing has had about 80 deployed personnel away at any give time since October.

“It’s been maximum surge: readiness training, administration, the care and feeding of a detachment and its personnel. Training is at a really high tempo, it’s quite a complex mission, and there are a lot of flying hours. It’s meant that everything has been accelerated, with a lot of our efforts focussed on upgrading the airplane for an overland role.

“People are showing signs of stress, but not as much as we’d expect. That has to do with team support, clear goals and success with something that matters. We’ve got the support back home to make sure everyone’s looked after.”

While 14 Wing’s work pace

and success has been “exceeding expectations,” Huddleston also has good things to say about the soft side of life in Greenwood: several hundred thousand dollars of recent investment in Personnel Support Program facilities and programs, improvements to the Military Family Resource Centre framework and Wing Fund funding for infrastructure means “we’re completing projects.”

There has also been fun: successful Mess dinners, a leadership visit to check in with deployed 14 Wing crews, a command team that was “closely aligned in work and play,” and the special events that make Greenwood feel like home for military families from across the country.

“We have advantages here, but it all still takes people being engaged in wing activities. The wing’s on a good path, and there’s a good, strong team coming in. Wing Chief Warrant Officer Pierrot Jetté and I have done a lot to make Greenwood better, but there’s always more to do.”

## Leadership from the top obvious in team approach

The in-step success of 14 Wing Greenwood’s top command pairing – Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Pierrot Jetté – will be one of the most noticeable changes this summer, as both men are posting away to new challenges.

Huddleston is headed to England for a year, to attend the Royal College of Defence Studies, and Jetté is taking on chief warrant officer duties for 2 Canadian Air Division.

“I’ve been very lucky,” Huddleston says.

And Jetté responds: “I’ve been very lucky.”

The men agree the strong relationship they’ve

enjoyed has enabled them both to get a lot accomplished. The men have spent innumerable hours over the past two years as the formal command team in headquarters, around 14 Wing and representing the base in the wider community; they’ve also spent plenty of evenings in Huddleston’s garage, restoring an old car, as friends.

“Whenever I need advice, I ask and get it – in a good way. It’s been a great time, and I’m going to miss it a lot,” Huddleston says.

Jetté says of Huddleston, “he’s given me enough rope to go with” in daily duties. And, “I’ve taught him how to hit a golf ball!”

# Réussir à faire quelque chose de grand »

## La 14e Escadre est en bonne voie avec Huddleston

Toujours plus, toujours mieux et toujours plus vite.

Voilà ce qui résume à peu près le rythme de travail qui a régné à la 14e Escadre de Greenwood ces deux dernières années, alors que le commandant de l'Escadre, le colonel Iain Huddleston, s'apprête à partir le 23 juillet. À son arrivée en 2013, Huddleston a été confronté au défi de combiner plusieurs lignes de maintenance d'aéronefs en une structure simplifiée. En quelques mois, cette structure a été mise en place, mais il a fallu quand même du temps pour mettre au point les menus détails. D'ailleurs, « les faits parlent d'eux-mêmes », a déclaré Huddleston. « Nous disposons de moins d'avions, notre flotte est de plus en plus sollicitée et, pourtant, nous bénéficions d'un meilleur état de service et d'une meilleure disponibilité qu'auparavant. Sans ces changements, nous ne serions pas au point où nous en sommes aujourd'hui.

Prendre en main la phase III du projet de modernisation du CP140M Aurora faisait partie de ses priorités : « Ça s'est fait très rapidement », a déclaré Huddleston. Dès que le potentiel du nouvel Aurora a été perçu à l'échelle nationale et internationale, l'aéronef et ses équipages ont pris part à l'exercice international RIMPAC et à l'opération Nanook pour faire une démonstration au premier ministre des capacités de renseignement, de surveillance et de reconnaissance à distance de l'appareil. « Nous nous sommes heurtés à des difficultés techniques qui se sont présentées à un rythme de plus en plus élevé. » La résolution de ces difficultés est devenue une motivation première dans la décision de « mettre tous ses œufs dans le même panier », lorsque la 14e Escadre de l'Unité maritime d'essais et d'évaluation et la 14e Escadre de génie logiciel ont fusionné pour former la 415e Escadre (développement de la force de patrouille à long rayon d'action) en janvier dernier.

« Nous sommes maintenant mieux organisés pour gérer les nombreuses améliorations techniques prévues pour l'aéronef. Nous allons aussi de l'avant pour ce qui est du reste des unités de la 14e Escadre et de la 19e Escadre Comox pour nous assurer que nos soldats sont utilisés de la façon la plus efficace possible. Nous manquons de personnel, mais nous essayons de mieux utiliser les gens que nous avons pour la croissance des Forces. »

Sans compter les demandes soudaines concernant la flotte des Aurora et les éléments de soutien au pays et à l'étranger, puisque le Canada joue un rôle majeur dans la coalition internationale contre l'État islamique en Irak et en Syrie. Ainsi, la 14e Escadre a déployé environ 80 personnes à tout moment depuis le mois d'octobre. « Cela a demandé un effort maximal : la préparation au déploiement, l'administration, le soin et l'alimentation d'un détachement et de son personnel. L'instruction va à un rythme

très rapide, c'est une mission particulièrement complexe, qui demande de nombreuses heures de vol. Cela signifie que tout s'est accéléré et que beaucoup de nos efforts se concentrent sur la modernisation de l'avion en vue d'une utilisation à l'extérieur du pays. Les gens montrent des signes de stress, mais pas autant que ce à quoi nous nous attendions. Cela est dû au soutien d'équipe, à la clarté des objectifs et aux réussites obtenues dans quelque chose qui compte vraiment. Nous avons du soutien de chez nous qui nous assure que tout le monde peut compter sur quelqu'un pour s'occuper de lui. »

Bien que le rythme de travail et le succès de la 14e Escadre reposent sur l'idée de « dépasser les attentes », Huddleston a de bons mots à dire sur le caractère harmonieux de la vie à Greenwood : les plusieurs centaines de milliers de dollars investis dans le programme de soutien du personnel et les installations connexes, dans l'amélioration du cadre du centre de ressources pour les familles militaires et dans le financement de l'infrastructure de l'Escadre montrent que « nous menons à bien nos projets ».

Le plaisir a aussi été de la partie, comme le prouvent les dîners régimentaires réussis, la visite des directeurs pour

faire le suivi des équipages déployés de la 14e Escadre, une équipe de commandement qui avait à cœur « d'harmoniser le travail et le plaisir » et les événements spéciaux qui donnent aux familles de partout au pays le sentiment d'être chez soi à Greenwood.

« Nous sommes privilégiés ici, mais il reste que notre besoin, c'est de voir des personnes engagées dans les activités de l'escadre. # New RCAF commander to build on capabilities, achievements

Command of the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) officially changed hands at a ceremony held July 9 at the Canada Aviation and Space Museum in Ottawa.

The new commander of the RCAF and Chief of the Air Force Staff, Lieutenant-General Michael Hood, assumed command from Lieutenant-General Yvan Blondin at a ceremony presided over by General Tom Lawson, Chief of the Defence Staff.

As the senior air force officer in the Canadian Armed Forces, the commander of the RCAF is responsible for training, generating and maintaining combat-capable, multi-

purpose air forces to meet Canada's defence objectives. As the Chief of the Air Force Staff, the commander acts as an advisor to the Chief of the Defence Staff on strategic air force issues.

Blondin is retiring after 35 years of distinguished service with the RCAF as a fighter pilot. He has held many commands throughout his career, including commanding officer of 425 Tactical Fighter Squadron, commander of the Canadian CF188 Operational Force in Aviano, Italy; commander of 3 Wing Bagotville, and commander of 1 Canadian Air Division, headquartered in Winnipeg.

Hood began his military career as an army reservist with Montreal's Canadian Grenadier Guards before transferring to the Regular Force and receiving his Air Combat Systems Officer wings in 1988. He commanded both 429 and

436 Transport Squadrons and subsequently served as the commander of 8 Wing Trenton from 2007 to 2009. He leaves his post as Director of the Strategic Joint Staff to take command of the RCAF.

"As our continental op-

erational successes have demonstrated, the Royal Canadian Air Force is an agile air force, integrated with our partners and Allies, and with the reach and power needed to carry out Canadian Armed Forces operations at home

and abroad," Hood said. "I intend to sustain and build upon the capabilities that have led to those achievements, and ensure Canada and Canadians have an air force ready for the challenges of the future."

## Lieutenant-General Michael J. Hood, Commander, Royal Canadian Air Force

I can't begin to express how honoured and privileged I feel to take command of the Royal Canadian Air Force and of all those airmen and airwomen who have chosen to serve their country with professionalism and dedication.

First and foremost, I want to acknowledge those RCAF members who are on duty at this very moment. They are flying missions over Iraq and Syria, guarding North America as part of NORAD, and saving the lives of Canadians 24 and seven in our search and rescue role. The RCAF's success in operations, at home and around the world, is a direct result of their exceptional skills, capabilities and flexibility. I am immensely proud of them.

At home, the support that our families provide to their loved ones in uniform has a direct impact on that

operational success. In return, I am committed to supporting our military families in all their diversity. We will work with our partners to improve services for our families and better address their needs. They are crucial members of our RCAF team – and deserve our best.

Reflecting upon my upcoming command, I also promise to uphold and reinforce the values and ethics of the Royal Canadian Air Force. We are a vital national institution and hold an immense responsibility on behalf of all Canadians. I will demand that we respect the dignity and rights of all

our personnel – and I will be sending a very clear message to my subordinate commanders that harassment of any sort – be it sexual or otherwise – has no place in the RCAF or, for that matter, throughout the entire Canadian Armed Forces. We must rid ourselves – once and for all – of this abhorrent behaviour.

Nevertheless, I have great faith in those who serve our nation in the Canadian Armed Forces. During my tenure as commander, I will continue to invest in our airmen and airwomen – to further develop and harness their immense intellectual capacity as we think beyond the cockpit, beyond the flight line, and beyond the maintenance hangar to ensure that we remain prepared to confront future challenges.

And what will those challenges be?

My crystal ball doesn't work any better than yours, but we do know that the world is full of instability and uncertainty, and that

Canadian airpower is a key instrument in achieving our government's objectives. We must be ready to answer the call. We will do this by enabling our four key Royal Canadian Air Force vectors – our key attributes that are summed up as "A I R Power:" agile, integrated, reach.

**Agile:** As we demonstrated when we geared up and deployed our fighters and support aircraft to Libya on less than 24 hours' notice.

**Integrated:** Across all of our air power domains – as we are during search and rescue missions where we work within a whole-of-government approach, integrating SAR platforms and personnel with assets that may often serve in other roles or integrating with other commands during natural disasters such as the Manitoba flood or the forest fires burning on the Prairies at this very moment.

**Reach:** Necessary for success at home and abroad – as we demonstrated when our fleet of

Globemaster aircraft, which was repatriating equipment from Afghanistan, was re-routed, at a moment's notice, half-way round the world to deliver aid to the Philippines in response to the humanitarian crisis that had developed there following Typhoon Haiyan.

And **power:** Essential to protecting our sovereignty at home and Canadian interests abroad. This cuts across all of our capabilities, all our occupations and ranks, and our entire aircraft fleet. We all have a critical role to play.

And that is the source of our strength. We are one air force team. And to achieve airpower mastery in today's interconnected and interlinked world, all members of the RCAF must "fly in formation" – together – regardless of their job, their aircraft, or their mission. Every air force capability is crucial to the defence of our great country and our values.

I am also committed to flying in formation with our sister services – the

Royal Canadian Navy and the Canadian Army – as well as our colleagues in the Department of National Defence. The RCAF will be a key supporter of the defence team and you can count on our support – as we count on you for our own success. We will also be steadfast wingmen to our fellow government departments and organizations with whom we work in the defence of Canada, and with our allies as we carry out coalition operations and build interoperable capabilities. For we must continue to strive for excellence in all that we do, and we will accomplish this by delivering A I R Power in formation: agile, integrated, reach – power.

In closing, let's remember the RCAF's motto – Sic itur ad astra – Such is the pathway to the stars. You have my pledge that I will continue to strengthen that pathway and strive with all my energy to enable the success of our airmen and airwomen and the Royal Canadian Air Force.

“There has been significant progress on numerous fronts, and I’m committed to build on that. It’s the only way to ensure the long term viability of air maintenance success.”





# Greenwood home of Cadet summer training

Located at 14 Wing Greenwood, the Greenwood Cadet Training Centre is one of four Cadet Training Centres in Atlantic Canada.

Approximately 1,100 Cadets come to Greenwood each summer to participate in training opportunities, ranging from two to seven weeks in duration. Cadets are selected for these opportunities based on merit and qualifications obtained through their local Cadet corps or squadron. Normally, a Cadet's first course is General Training (two weeks) and, each year they return to "camp," they participate in more advanced courses.

Greenwood was established in 1951 at the Royal Canadian Air Forces Station, Greenwood. Since its inception, it is estimated over 60,000 young people have come through the centre.

Summer camps include the two-week General Training, three-week Basic Drill and Ceremonial, Basic Aviation, Basic Aviation Technology and Aerospace, Advanced Aviation, Basic Survival and Basic Fitness and Sports; and the six-week Drill and Ceremonial Instructor, Survival Instructor, Fitness and Sports Instructor, Intermediate Musician – Military Band and Advanced Musician – Military Band. It is not uncommon to see sea and army Cadets attending courses at the training centre, such as the band programs.

"I want to be able to improve my physical fitness and feel the sense of happiness and connection with other Cadets on this course," Dupuis says. I also look forward to returning home to instruct other Cadets during sports activities."
