"We have our regular golfers, and they're welcome any time. We just ask our families, who may have some newer golfers with them, to let more advanced groups play through. That way no one is rushed."

And, really, seeing families and youth on the course is great for the game as a whole.

"You can play golf for life, and we want youth to pick up the game early," Gorman says. "Golf is what you want to make it: you can play for fun, against yourself or you can become more competitive."

Nauss agrees. When he sees some of his golf students playing on their own or with their own family, it is satisfying.



'Success with something that matters' 14 Wing on solid path: Huddleston

That would about sum up the past two years' pace at 14 Wing Greenwood, as Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston prepares to depart location. July 23.

Upon his arrival in 2013, Huddleston was challenged with combining several aircraft maintenance lines into a streamlined structure. It was actioned within months, but has still taken time to work out the fine details. Still, "the proof is in the pudding," Huddleston says.

"We have fewer airplanes, we're more stretched as a fleet and we're still enjoying better serviceability and availability than we ever had. Without be where we're at."

Tackling those issues became a prime driver in the move to "bring all eggs into one basket," with the merger of 14 Wing's Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit and 14 Software Engineering Squadron into a re-energized 415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron this June.

We're short on manpower, but we're

"People are showing signs of stress, but not as much as we'd expect. That has to do with team support, clear goals and success with something that matters. We've got the support back home to make sure everyone's looked after."



And **power**: Essential to protecting our sovereignty at home and Canadian interests abroad. This cuts across all of our capabilities, all our occupations and ranks, and our entire aircraft fleet. We all have a critical role to play.

And that is the source of our strength. We are one air force team. And to achieve airpower mastery in today's interconnected and interlinked world, all members of the RCAF must "fly in formation" - together - regardless of their job, their aircraft, or their mission. Every air force capability is crucial to the defence of our great country and our values.

I am also committed to flying in formation with our sister services - the

Royal Canadian Navy and the Canadian Army - as well as our colleagues in the Department of National Defence. The RCAF will be a key supporter of the defence team and you can count on our support as we count on you for our own success. 

Greenwood home of Cadet summer training

Located at 14 Wing Greenwood, the Greenwood Cadet Training Centre is one of four Cadet Training Centres in Atlantic Canada.

Approximately 1,100 Cadets come to Greenwood each summer to participate in training opportunities, ranging from two to seven weeks in duration. Cadets are selected for these opportunities based on merit and qualifications obtained through their local Cadet corps or squadron. Normally, a Cadet's first course is General Training (two weeks) and, each year they return to "camp," they participate in more advanced courses.

Greenwood was established in 1951 at the Royal Canadian Air Forces Station, Greenwood. Since its inception, it is estimated over 60,000 young people have come through the centre.

Summer camps include the two-week General Training, three-week Basic Drill and Ceremonial, Basic Aviation, Basic Aviation Technology and Aerospace, Advanced Aviation, Basic Survival and Basic Fitness and Sports; and the six-week Drill and Ceremonial Instructor, Survival Instructor, Fitness and Sports Instructor, Intermediate Musician – Military Band and Advanced Musician – Military Band. It is not uncommon to see sea and army Cadets attending courses at the training centre, such as the band programs.
