14 Wing Greenwood highlighted a summer of change July 23, as Wing Commander Colonel lain Huddleston gave over command of the wing to Colonel Pat Thauberger in one of a series of changes in senior leadership at the base.



Ice floe rescue a coordinated effort

It was a long two days for the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre (JRCC Halifax), as the search for missing Russian helicopter pilot Sergey Ananov continued for over 30 hours; it was even longer for Ananov, as he waited to be rescued from an ice floe he shared with three polar bears. Search and rescue (SAR) is complex system of systems that involves close cooperation between government, military and civilian assets; all of which were exercised during the search.

complete a flight around the Arctic Circle in a helicopter that weighed less than a tonne, and was nearly halfway through a flight from Igaluit, Nunavut to Nuuk, Greenland when mechanical failures caused him to ditch his aircraft. In the few seconds before the helicopter sunk, he was able to retrieve a life raft and flares. After swimming to a floe, he hunkered down, awaiting rescue.

Watch keepers at JRCC Halifax were alerted to the incident when the GPS tracker

The fact Ananov's helicopter had a tracker "was incredibly helpful – it allowed us to proceed directly to that area. If he did not have a tracker, we would have Ananov was attempting to had to search from Igaluit to Nuuk." The GPS tracker alerted the JRCC to Ananov's plight over an hour before he would have been declared overdue, allowing for the complex SAR mechanisms to start moving. In the harsh and austere conditions of the Arctic, those hours can mean the difference between life and death.

A critical part was played by the fishing vessel Belle Isle Banker, in the area and which provided a first search presence. By law, the JRCC can order all vessels within a specified area to report their position, to take part in a search and to carry out such other SAR operations as deemed necessary. The master of a vessel is required to comply with these orders insofar it does not endanger his own vessel or personnel.

In addition to the initial assets, a second Hercules aircraft, a Cormorant helicopter and the Canadian Coast Guard Ship Pierre solid ground.

Radisson were all part of the search. Making the search more challenging was a low ceiling and heavy fog that persisted throughout July 26. A late break in the weather that night allowed the Radisson to launch its helicopter, which ultimately picked up Ananov when his last flare was seen from the bridge of the ship.

"Four minutes later, personnel on board the helicopter located the survivor on the ice, alive, walking and waving," said Radisson Captain Stéphane Julien. "When they announced the news, cheers erupted all around the bridge."

Ananov arrived in Igaluit July 29, happy to return to

Be on the lookout for symptoms of heat exhaustion: Thirst, fatigue, disorientation, vision problems, a rapid pulse, headaches, dizziness or weakness.

 If you experiences any of these symptoms, stop activity, drink fluids (preferably water), find a cool place to rest. Seek medical attention if you don't start feeling better very quickly. Heat exhaustion can lead to heat stroke if not treated. Heat stroke is a medical emergency!


