Military brothers athletes in arms

Greenwood squadron chief on track at world championship

The World Masters Athletics Championships (WMAC), held in Lyon, France, August 4 to 16; was one of the best championships in the history of WMA. Lyon provided excellent facilities in the stadiums at Parilly, Bron and Chassieu, accommodating over 8,000 athletes from 114 countries.

Racing while jet-lagged, along with temperatures soaring above 40 degrees, did not prevent Cana-

dian Armed Forces members Chief Warrant Officer Claude Faucher, 413 Squadron, Greenwood; and his brother, Major Serge Faucher, National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa; from representing Canada in an outstanding fashion. Both achieved personal bests in some of the events they entered.

Competing in the M45 age group, it was Claude's appearance at the WMA, and he fared well in the two

events he entered. In the qualification round August 6, he posted 2:10.15 minutes in the 800 metre race, a personal best as a Masters athlete. The following day, he ran the semi-finals in 2:12.27, landing him in 27th place overall. It would be an understatement to say racing conditions were difficult, with the thermometer rising to 42 degrees! In fact, a medical crew measured temperatures of 52 degrees at track

level, with six competitors taken to hospital for heat-related problems. August 12, Claude competed in the 1,500 metre event, again with blistering temperatures, and ran a season's best of 4:29.15 min (placing 24/ 57).

Serge, competing in the M50 category, ran 2:14.46 min in the 800 metre qualifications, finishing 29th overall. A few days later, he ran the 200 metre event in 25 sec-

onds, a personal best which moved him into the semi-finals. He covered the distance in 25.17 seconds, finishing 19th out of 93 competitors. Two days later, he moved on to the 400 metre race qualification, where he clocked 55.67 seconds and, again, moved on to the semi-finals. There, he posted the exact same time of 55.67 seconds, finishing 17/ 68 overall.

Claude also took part in the 4 x 100 metre relay filling an empty spot in the M45 category. The team ran well at 45.77 seconds, good for fifth position. Three hours, later he ran in the 4 x 400 metres M50 relay team, which came within four seconds of the Canadian record in 3:54.41 min, landing them in sixth place.

How do middle-aged, top military athletes like the Fauchers prepare themselves, mentally and physically, for an event such as the WMAC? You have to love what you do in order to put in the hundreds of hours of training in preparation for such events: three or four weekly track workouts, tackling at least three different energy

systems; another three to five trips to the gym for squats, cleans, deadlifts, cross-training (rowing or elliptical, stretching, drills and so on); using the foam roller every evening, eating

SAR responsibility changes hands at 413 Squadron

"We've done some amazing things," said outgoing 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron Commander Lieutenant-Colonel Scott Murphy August 21, referring not only to his two years as head of the squadron, but also their day-to-day duty to help people across Eastern Canada.

"Twenty-four/ seven, 365, covering an area of nearly five million square kilometres; hundreds of missions, and people brought home safely. We were there, and we are inexplicably linked to those family's history. That never changes.

"I'm very proud, and very grateful. I take away an amazing love for the 'Tuskers' family."



The change of command parade between Murphy and incoming CO Lieutenant-Colonel James Marshall was held on the 413 Squadron hangar floor, with 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Pat Thauberger as reviewing officer.

"There is no question 413 Squadron remains a lynch pin in 14 Wing operations,

and has a permanent role for the Royal Canadian Air Force – and all Canadians. Your mission is directly attributable to saving Canadian lives every day."

Thauberger acknowledged challenges, such as operational funding restraints, but commended Murphy and his squadron for their pursuit in recent years of new, stronger local and regional search and rescue partnerships.

"I'm always impressed with 413's mission focus: you get things done. Even as we speak, we have 413 personnel searching for a lost Canadian on the Gulf of St. Laurence."

Thauberger urged Marshall to provide "strong, ethical leadership so these people can get on with the job we need them to do."

Marshall, returning to Greenwood for the first time since he was a 21-year-old on-the-job trainee, now with a wife and two young daughters; said he already "feels at home."

"This is a demanding and rewarding role. My mother asked me, 'I have 150 people working for me?' No, I'm working for 150 people, and it's an honour to be part of 14 Wing Greenwood.

"All of you have a demanding job, and I admire each and every one of you. Your safety is priority number one: properly trained, well equipped and rested. My job is to get you that."

Aurora crew safe after abrupt runway crash

At approximately 11:15 a.m. August 27, a CP140 Aurora slid onto the grass adjacent to a runway at 14 Wing Greenwood. The aircraft was in the process of taking off when it initiated an abort, and subsequently slid about 20 metres off the runway into soft ground.

All 17 crew members used emergency procedures to get out of the plane "as fast as possible," said Captain John Pulchny, 14 Wing Public Affairs and Visits Officer, August 28.

"It had stopped raining

and the thunder storm alert had been cancelled. The runway was wet, and it started raining again right after the crash. The crew moved away, as far as possible, staying together."

The call came in as a "two-bell" alarm, meaning emergency crews respond to "something wrong with an aircraft.

"That changed to a one-bell, which means a crash. This is not common: I can't remember one, and I've been here since 2004."

14 Wing Fire and Emergency Services and Military Police emergency response teams were on scene immediately.

The wing's Flight Safety team was also immediately dispatched to secure the scene and start initial investigative measures.

The crew was transported to the base's medical centre, where all were checked and three treated for minor injuries. All were sent home and were expected to report for

work mid-day August 28, for interviews related to the crash.

National Director Flight Safety representatives arrived at 14 Wing and were on scene August 28 to begin their investigation and interviews. The Aurora was still sitting in its final resting place that morning, and the adjacent runway closed.

"We wouldn't be doing our own investigation on this – it's handed off to DFS," Pulchny said.

The temporary runway closure has not affected wing operations, as search and rescue response and other flights can make use of the second runway.

While 10 crewmembers

would be the regular complement on board an Aurora, this flight was heading for Northern surveillance patrols over the weekend, and had extra personnel. Pulchny said both the pilot and the flight engineer are "extremely experienced.

"We'll try to get them all up flying as soon as possible."

'More than anything, we want to help'

413 search crews ready to respond

All day, all night, every day; covering 1.8 million square miles – there is a big job on the shoulders of men and women with 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron, based at 14 Wing Greenwood. While days could go by without a call for help from somewhere on Canada's east coast, other days show just how necessary the SAR crews' skills are.

A handful of calls in the past week involved boaters in distress, hikers trapped on a cliff, an airplane crash and an offshore medevac. All took hours to respond to, but any success represents multiple more hours spent in preparation.

Ideal overwater medevac

August 16, Master Corporal Brad Nisbet and his Hercules crew were getting set for an airfield parachuting exercise with the shift's Cormorant crew when a call came in about a medevac from a fishing vessel near Sable Island. Cormorant personnel immediately disembarked, and the Hercules prepared for follow-on support.

"We have a significantly faster arrival time," Nisbet said, "so it was a go, direct to the scene."

The Hercules left 14 Wing around 1:15 p.m., and arrived in the Sable Island area an hour later.

"We elected to get guys on the boat," Nisbet said. "The patient's condition sounded serious, the Cormorant was an hour out and it made sense to just get in there, next to the patient, help him out and get him ready for transport."

Conditions were close to ideal, and Nisbet and Master Corporal Kevin Cochrane parachuted into the water, Nisbet landing 40 feet off the vessel's starboard ladder and Cochrane just 15 feet off the stern.

"The crew was very helpful: they hauled our gear up and gathered our chutes out of the water," Nisbet said. "We treated the patient, we briefed him on how things would go and,

within 50 minutes, the Cormorant arrived."

Two more SAR-Techs were lowered and, within short order, they had the patient and all four SAR-Techs hoisted above and were on their way to CFB Shearwater, where they were met by Emergency Health Services. 14 Wing crews were all back at base around 4 p.m.

"Three hours? A pretty good response," Nisbet said.

Fog, fog and fog

Fog, darkness and cliffs played a big part in 413 Squadron's efforts to get two hikers off an embankment in Fundy National Park, New Brunswick, overnight August 20.

Captain Dean Vey was with the night shift when, at 12:01 a.m., the call came in for the Cormorant to head across the Bay of Fundy. The hikers had decided earlier in the evening to take a shortcut and found themselves blocked along a shoreline route: they went up.

"About 9:30 p.m., one of them was apparently just standing on a tree root, exhausted. He'd dropped his pack to the beach below – which he couldn't even see anymore. He decided they need help and got out a cellphone."

New Brunswick high ropes rescue parties heading overland on foot to the cliffs were having a hard time.

"We'll go," Vey said. Halfway across the bay, the fog closed in, and the Cormorant crew used its radar to hit on the shoreline. They hovered, then moved forward "at a walking pace," looking for waves breaking on the shoreline or any kind of signal from the trapped men on the cliff.

"We could see a fellow waving a light in the fog – how do we get them out now, without blowing them off the cliff?"

The Cormorant lowered two SAR-Techs 240 feet to an area about 100 feet away, along the top of the cliff. Blindly, in the fog.

"The trees were about 100 feet high, and you couldn't see. When the crew felt the hoisting cable go slack, we guessed, 'the SAR-Techs are on something.'"

Once on the ground, the SAR-Techs radioed an estimate to the Cormorant crew. With

Ten minutes later, the Cormorant arrived, with Canadian Coast Guard vessel Le Blanc arriving 10 minutes after that. The CCG brought the kayakers aboard and the aircraft were released.

Master Corporal K. McFarlane

a three-hour timeframe in mind, the Cormorant returned to 14 Wing to refuel and wait for the extraction call.

The SAR-techs set up a quick rope rappelling rescue, heading down the cliff face to the stranded hikers. One had gotten himself into a semi-safe space and was in good shape; Master Corporal Chris Martin got him set to move to where they could be extracted by the returning helicopter. The other, a few metres lower, "had been standing on his toes for about five hours – he was exhausted," Vey said. Warrant Officer Norm Penny secured him, and then headed further down the cliff, dropping rocks to get a sense of how far above shore they were. With a final rappel, and all men on the beach, the Cormorant returned, performed the same approach in dense fog and darkness, hoisted the party and returned to Greenwood – even then, it was a close call: the back up landing was in PEI, and fog at 14 Wing almost forced its use.

Vey said the hikers were extremely thankful for the crew's efforts, knowing they'd been in real trouble. Vey credits the Cormorant itself for the mission success: "it's a tribute to the capability of the aircraft, that it can hover, come in at a slow creep and then stop. We practice for this, we had an experienced crew on that night and we made all the right calls."

'More than anything, we want to help'

A Beaver charter plane with six people on board crashed in a wooded area on Quebec's North Shore, about six kilometres from Bergeronnes, August 23, as 14 Wing SAR crews were performing parachute manoeuvres at the Atlantic Air Show in Summerside. Their plans instantly changed.

"It was definitely our call, our responsibility area, and we were already airborne," said Master Corporal

Rob Featherstone.

With an additional SAR-Tech on board, the crew spent the hour's response flight getting ready for a jump into the wreckage site. A Griffin helicopter from Bagotville was another hour out and, being smaller, it would take multiple trips to get all six victims out.

"The plane was still on fire when we got there, and we couldn't see any people or movement. We'd been planning for a water jump – it was a seaplane – and we were in our dry suits – and it was 28 degrees."

The three SAR-Techs landed within 50 metres of each other in a swampy area, about 150 metres – and two small gorges – away from the crash site.

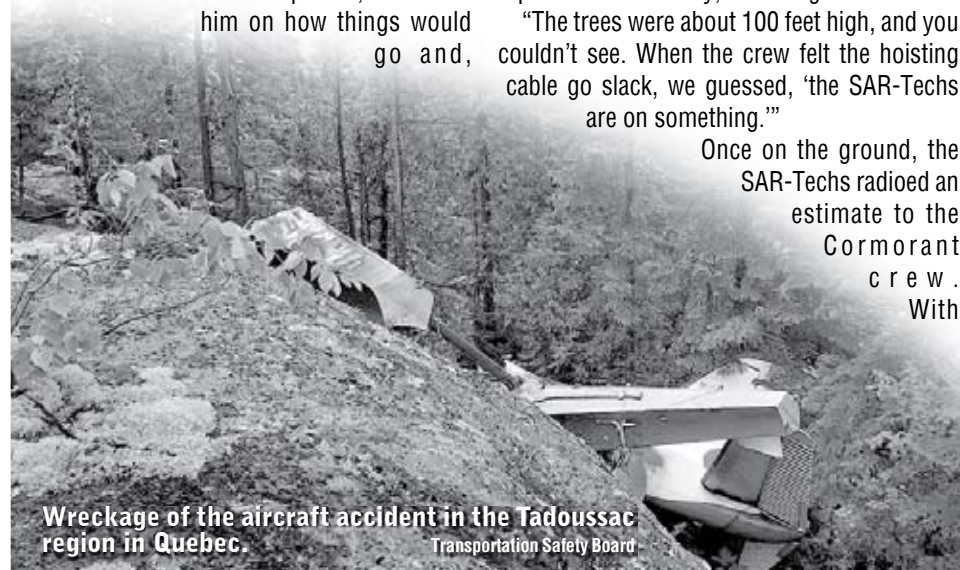
"It was definitely the safest spot to land, collect our thoughts and our gear. It took another 10 minutes with heavy packs, up and down, to get to the scene."

At this point, with the Griffin expected in 15 minutes, the SAR-Techs focused on getting set up and the first victims ready for transport. They unfortunately found four deceased individuals quickly, so started a series of sweeping searches for the other two individuals.

The Griffin arrived and dropped two more SAR-Techs. They set up an extraction point and took over security of the scene until Quebec provincial police could make it overland; the original SAR-Techs left for Bagotville with the first of the emergency scene photos to turn over to investigators. In the end, all six passengers, including the pilot, died in the crash.

The last of 14 Wing SAR-Techs were home August 24, around 3 a.m.

"It was a long call, and nothing we could do to help, unfortunately," Featherstone said. "More than anything, we want to help the injured. Then, if we can't, we want to help with closure for the families."

CDS order for 'Operation Honour' now official

General Jonathan Vance, Chief of the Defence Staff, issued the operation order for "Operation Honour" August 14, which is in place to stop inappropriate sexual behaviour within the Canadian Armed Forces and increase the related support available to all of its members.

"Building on the work that has been done to date, this operation marks the beginning of a cultural change within the CAF and it begins with this organization's leadership," said Vance. "In the

profession of arms, we learn to deal with issues head-on and this operation order sets out the way to reach our objective in a format that we, as members of the CAF can easily identify."

Op Honour's operation order has several key components of interest to CAF members. One is that much of the direction and guidance will come through the chain of command, not simply by the passing of information, but by ensuring everyone understands what constitutes sexual harassment,

identifying those who may need help and implementing better reporting measures. As well, actions will be taken to ensure that the chain of command can respond and better direct cultural change throughout the CAF on the issue of sexual harassment.

Of particular interest is the creation of the Sexual Misconduct Response Centre (Interim). This centre will provide a range of services to all CAF members ranging from providing empathetic listening to offering information on various investigative

and complaint processes. The SMRC (I) will operate outside the CAF chain of command, residing within DND and will come into existence on September 15. The "Interim" designation will remain in place until the centre reaches its full capability within the next two years.

"The SMRC (I) will be put in place to support all members of the CAF," explained Vance. "I fully support the creation of this centre as it provides an easily accessible resource where mem-

bers who may be affected by sexual harassment in some form can receive assistance and guidance."

One other item of note described in the operation order is the "Soldier's Card," which is a wallet sized document that outlines unacceptable behaviours, the expectations of proper behaviour and contact information to obtain help or report wrongdoing. The card presents this information in concise, quick-reference format.

"The Soldier's Card is to help ensure that all mem-

bers of the CAF have no misconceptions about my intent and have readily available contact info should they need it," Vance said. "The final objective for this, the SMRC and the other parts of this op order are designed to reach our ultimate objective of preventing inappropriate sexual behaviour in the CAF."

The operation order itself and other details of Op Honour are available online through the Defence Team Site of the Defence Wide Area Network (DWAN).

L'ordre du CEMD dans le cadre de l'opération HONOUR est maintenant officiel

Le 14 août, le général Jonathan Vance, chef d'état-major de la défense, a émis l'ordre d'opération pour l'opération HONOUR, qui vise à faire cesser les comportements liés à l'inconduite sexuelle dans les Forces armées canadiennes et à accroître le soutien offert à tous les membres des FAC.

« Nous faisons fond sur les efforts déployés jusqu'à maintenant et cette opération marque le début d'un changement de culture dans les FAC, qui commence par les dirigeants de notre organisation, a affirmé Vance. Dans le métier des armes, nous apprenons à aborder de front les problèmes. Le présent ordre d'opérations définit les façons dont nous pouvons atteindre notre objectif dans un format que nous, membres des FAC, pouvons facilement comprendre. »

L'ordre d'opération de l'Op HONOUR comporte plusieurs composantes clés qui intéresseront les membres des FAC. L'une de ces composantes est qu'une importante partie des directives et des conseils sera acheminée par la chaîne de commandement, non seulement pour transmettre des renseignements, mais pour veiller à ce que chaque personne comprenne en quoi consiste le harcèlement sexuel, pour déterminer si

une personne a besoin d'aide et pour mettre en œuvre de meilleures mesures de signalement. En outre, des mesures seront prises pour faire en sorte que la chaîne de commandement puisse intervenir, et un changement de culture direct en matière de harcèlement sexuel sera mis en œuvre dans toutes les FAC.

Une des mesures particulièrement intéressantes est la création du Centre d'intervention sur l'inconduite sexuelle (intérimaire). Le Centre fournira une gamme complète de services à tous les membres des FAC, allant d'une écoute empreinte d'empathie à la diffusion d'information concernant divers processus d'enquêtes et de plaintes. Le Centre mènera ses activités hors de la chaîne de commandement des FAC, et il sera établi au sein du MDN. Il ouvrira ses portes le 15 septembre. La désignation « intérimaire » restera en place jusqu'à ce que le Centre ait atteint sa capacité opérationnelle totale, soit au cours des deux prochaines années.

« Le Centre sera mis en œuvre afin d'appuyer tous les membres des FAC, a expliqué Vance. J'appuie entièrement la création de ce Centre, qui sera une ressource facile d'accès où les militaires touchés par le harcèlement

sexuel sous toutes ses formes pourront recevoir de l'aide et des conseils. »

Autre point digne de mention est la « carte du soldat », un document de poche qui définit les comportements inacceptables, les attentes en matière de comportement adéquat et qui indiquent où demander du soutien ou signaler des actes répréhensibles. La carte présente l'information dans un format concis et facile à consulter.

« La carte du soldat vise à faire en sorte que tous les membres des FAC ne se méprennent nullement sur mon intention et qu'ils aient accès à des renseignements sur les ressources dont ils ont besoin, a précisé Vance. La carte, le Centre et les autres éléments du présent ordre visent à nous permettre d'atteindre notre

objectif ultime, soit prévenir l'inconduite sexuelle dans les FAC. »

L'ordre d'opération et d'autres détails sur l'Op HONOUR se trouvent dans le site de l'Équipe de la Défense du Réseau étendu de la Défense (RED).
