Band hits high notes at Glasgow worlds

the 78th Highlanders Grade 1 Pipe Band from Halifax consider themselves among the elite in the piping and drumming world, having placed as the 12th best pipe band in the world.

The 78th attended the Piping Live Festival and World Pipe Band Championships in Glasgow August 9 to 15. It was an intensive week for band members, with every day filled with rehearsals, live performances, contests succeeding in the qualifiers, and concerts.

There were 343 bands competing in various levels but, by far, the most intense and best-watched event was the Grade 1 band arena. The contest started with an elimination qualifier, with 22 bands competing for just 12 spots available in the final. Bands played twice on the Friday in front of different panels of judges. The 78th qualified to compete in the finals, knocking out many bands from the qualifier who have had high placings at the World Championships in previous years.

The competition is intense. "You play in a stadium with a crowd exceeding 30,000 people watching you, live, while, at the same time, know there are a few hun-

es members competing with critics' picking apart your performances watching the live streams at home," said Sergeant Andrew Bruce, 14 Wing Greenwood's pipe major. "This is the type of training that benefits the Canadian Forces musicians. There is no better way to test and develop your skills as a musician than by putting them out in such a public venue, under such intense pressure."

Due to the results of the Friday contest, the band was in the "first on" position for the finals, and played twice – once in the morning and then again in the afternoon.

The Bible was inscribed in 1941 to James C. Lovelace, then a member of 103 Squadron (which would go on to become 403 Squadron).

> Funnily enough, the second item – the Red Ensign – also comes via the Bridgewater fire department: John Bird gave it to Eisenor, having said it had been found in a box underneath the Astor Theatre in Liverpool, further along the South Shore, when it was being renovated in the 1980s.

"We don't know the story behind this, but it's sure gone "Every member was given through the ringer – several times!" Hennessy said. "Liverpool – they have that

given by Lovelace to Wendell maybe they had this stashed in case the new Canadian flag didn't take!"

> The Red Ensign appears to be of 1920s vintage: it's stained, and has definitely sustained some damage.

> Wing Heritage Officer Major Bob Johnson says both items will be added to the museum's collection. The Lovelace Bible will be placed with the exhibit covering religion in the military, along with a photo of the original owner, who re-enlisted after the Second World War at Greenwood. The Red Ensign is important, as the only other one owned by the museum is with a 404 Squadron display: it was altered to take out the Queen's crest and put in the maple leaf emblem many years ago.

There is "Somebody in Tremont,"... and, indeed, there were many.

A cemetery service was held September 13 at the former Tremont Baptist Church, now the Church of the Nazarene, hosted by the Tremont Community Cemetery Society and the Church of the Nazarene. The event was more than just a fundraiser: it brought the community together.
