Ice is nice Chinook runs clearance testing at 14 Wing

East Coast weather is just the ticket to test out the flying capabilities of Canada's newest military helicopter, the Chinook CH147F.

the Aerospace Engineering mance in ice conditions. Test Establishment out of 4 Wing Cold Lake and a crew from the Chinook's home 450 (Tactical Helicopter) Squadron in Petawawa arrived at 14 Wing Greenwood October 31 and spent a month chal-

"This is a new fleet, so there are no icing clearances on it," says Major Jonathan Knaul, operations officer with 450 Squadron. "It's not unusual to have a number of restrictions in the stand-up of a fleet: we couldn't initially fly in clouds,

Now we're trying to get clearance to fly in clouds and ice. We're aiming to complete about 40 hours of flight tests."

Major Mathieu Bergeron, with the AETE, says engineers designed testing equipment to fix on the test Chinook. The

and now we have clearance. Vernier ice accretion meter measures the amount of ice build-up on the helicopter, and can be used to infer the conditions the helicopter is in. Typically, ice showed up first on the windshield and antennas.

- The CH147F Chinook is an advanced, multi-mission, medium- to heavy-lift helicopter. Its primary mission is the tactical transport of equipment and personnel. The Chinook has an increased internal fuel capacity that allows it to fly twice as far as previous models.
- 450 (Tactical Helicopter) Squadron, based in Petawawa, is the home of Canada's fleet of 15 CH147F Chinooks. These helicopters are dramatically improved, compared to models operated in the 1970s and 1980s. Its versatility, impressive capacity and extended range make it ideal for operations in Canada's vast and demanding environment.
- · The 2013 Chinooks have an enhanced self-protection capability, including advanced anti-missile protection systems, radar and laser warning systems, ballistic protection, self-defence machine guns and advanced electro-optical and infra-red sensors to assist aircrew in operating in reduced visibility conditions.

specific weather conditions.

"We want ice, but we want ice at higher altitudes - up to 10,000 feet, with warmer air below," Bergeron says. "Based on aviation statistics, typically, the East Coast has a lot of moisture in the air, so you get icing a lot. We want poor weather – but a special version."

As the test helicopter reaches altitudes and conditions where icing occurs, the monitors – all built in bright orange materials to distinguish parts from the Chinook's standard issue – start to check on the aircraft's performance and ice accretion.

"Does it take more power to do the same manoeuvres? Are there vibrations? Is ice flying off the blades and breaking stuff?" Bergeron says. "So far, it's been performing pretty well, with limited effects on power and vibration."

Testing for the project was limited to -12 degrees Celsius and limited "liquid water content."

"Even with these limitations, there was inherent risk to this testing that must

be carefully considered." Bergeron says. "We can't Greenwood looking to test in risk mitigate for every issues."

> The team stayed safe by always planning an escape route from ice: "we get warm by coming down into warm air, and there is a power limit increase we can't exceed."

Now that the flight tests are over, Bergeron and Captain Tyler Johnson, the flight test engineer, will compile results and present a report on the certification potential for flying the Chinook in icing conditions.

"If that's approved, it is going to provide a lot more flexibility for flight planning and execution for Chinook crews," he says, "but it's important it's all been tested and reviewed with proper risk assessments. We have strong limits, and we can afford to do that: the guy who needs to go in the field needs an aircraft that has been proven goodto-go in any condition."

that happen: "We have initial operational capability on these aircraft, and we are striving toward full operational capability. Like any pilot, though, we want to be able to do more."

Both men had good things to say about the team's reception at 14 Wing: the team used space for a month in Hangar 9 for the Chinook and working office areas, accommodations and recreation programs; and relied heavily on air traffic control to facilitate flexibility of movement durina testina.







Museum volunteers drive aviation education, history through 2015

Malcolm Uhlman, Greenwood Military Aviation Museum

Yet another banner year was realized through 2015 by the dedicated volunteers at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum. With so much more coming down the pipeline this year, the enthusiasm displayed by volunteers is not surprising: they are the backbone of this institution.

2015 marked the 12th year for the Flight Education Program team, tutoring local Grade 6 science students from participating schools. Our veteran aviation volunteers and civilian history buffs provide hands-on knowledge on the theory of flight and the history of the Royal Air Force, Royal Canadian Air Force and Canadian Armed Forces at Greenwood. To date, over 6,500 students and staff have experienced the program.

The Lancaster reconfiguration was the major focus in the air park this summer. Since the elongated nose was removed. many hours were spent shortening the nose by 31" (to make it authentic as a bomber), refurbishing and painting it; another team re-attached it to the fuselage. The daunting task of preparing and re-painting the entire aircraft was carried out, while a replica Fraser Nash forward gun turret (produced by the volunteers) was installed. Due to severe crazing, the lower bomb-aimer's bubble also had to be replaced, with a re-built replica. Decals and aircraft designation numbers will be added this spring, completing the reconfiguration.

The Bolingbroke restoration project saw more exciting progress, with completion of the wing box inner flaps, while a set of wheels was obtained from Alberta. Soon, the complete wing box will be attached to the assembled gear legs and wheels so engine and cowling work can commence on the upper structure. The Boly cockpit was completed and moved from the workshop

fuselage, which is now being sanded and buffed, hole filled and primed prior to camouflage painting. After extensive re-glazing, the dorsal turret was assembled and mounted to the upper rear fuselage, completing the major work on the entire cockpit and fuselage structures. While some volunteers continue with the wing box, others will restore the two wings - the port wing having already received some new panels and a complete tip with new position light and glass lens.

Another new task saw the beginning restoration of a Lancaster-era aircraft tug, or "mule." As a contribution to the Second World War effort, the Mercury Truck and Trac-

After extensive re-glazing, the dorsal turret was assembled and mounted tor Company retooled their tractor and truck chassis to produce tugs. This particular example was produced later by the Pettibone Mercury Tow Tractor Company of Galion, Ohio in 1964/65 and sold as a Mercury Super Huskie.

The H44 "Flying Banana" helicopter restoration team successfully replaced five large, corroded panels on the rear fuselage of RCAF 592 and now are refurbishing the large tail fairing. Three of the four top transmission tunnel covers were repaired, replacing the light fibreglass construction with durable aluminum. Re-installing the upper transmission case will see the first placement of the major mechanical parts. A nose section, purchased from a company in North Carolina, hoist and many needed pieces. All needed parts from the secondary (donor) rear fuselage were removed, and the hull of the rear fuselage is being populated with these parts and pieces, including electrical panels, oil cooler and lines and hydraulic lines. Only the final rear and forward fuselages remain in the workshop, showing the excellent restoration progress.

In the final stages of completion of the Dakota aircraft, the cargo area walls are being completed and necessary items installed. Some paint delamination will be repaired.

A major upgrade to the air park was the installation of underground electrical wiring to all the aircraft, enabling the placement of air exchangers

contributed pilots seats, a hoist and many needed pieces.
All needed parts from the secondary (donor) rear fuselage riors and equipment.

Inside the museum, many small changes and additions added to the interesting displays. Two war-time dioramas were completed, helping visitors understand the realities of a 404 Norwegian fiord attack, depicting "Black Friday" February 9, 1945, when the squadron lost six Beaufighter aircraft and 11 airmen - its largest single-day loss; and a 405 Squadron night bombing run, depicting a 405 Pathfinder formation, stacked at various altitudes, with the visitor looking through a bomb aimer's window as if seated in the nose of a Lancaster. Sound and light simulates the feeling of being "there."

The Greenwood Band and Pipes and Drums held a Battle of Britain concert in September, with well-attended success and proceeds donated to the museum's aircraft restoration fund.

The inaugural Wings and Wheels 2015 vintage aircraft and car show held at the museum in September was also a resounding success! Seventytwo classic, antique and special-interest vehicles travelled from as far away as Yarmouth. Dartmouth and Bridgewater. These beautifully-restored cars were parked under museum aircraft, drawing hundreds of spectators. Visitors enjoyed guided tours of the museum and were able to get inside three of the restored aircraft. They also got a first-hand look at the on-going restorations by museum volunteers.

Major museum restoration projects for the future include a Link Trainer - the original Second World War flight simulator, and a C45 Expeditor aircraft. Parts of both were received last summer from the Reynolds Heritage Foundation in Wetaskiwin, Alberta. Appropriate time and space will dictate the start of these projects.

Another dimension to the GMAM is the introduction of a public library, with hundreds of books and periodicals on history and aircraft-related topics. Visitors may also admire the pictures, paintings and aircraft models from the museum's collection on display around the room.
