
"I try not to limit myself -I'm busy, I'm happy with how the tattoos are going, I'm keeping on top of the business side."

CAF marks transition of Air Task Force-Iraq

The Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) officially marked the transition of the Air Task Force-Iraq mission during a parade March 5 in Kuwait. Lieutenant-General Michael Hood, Commander Royal Canadian Air Force, presided.

Air Task Force-Iraq will continue to operate aircraft in support of coalition air operations. The CC150T Polaris supports coalition air assets in the region with aerial refueling and two CP140 Aurora conduct intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance missions based on identified and predetermined areas of interest.

As directed by the Government of Canada, the CF18 Hornets ceased airstrike operations February 15, and will depart the region in a phased approach in the coming weeks.

"Canadians can be proud of the members of the Operation Impact Fighter Detachment who, through their professionalism and dedication, assured the fighter contribution to the mission was expertly delivered," said Lieutenant-General Michael Hood, Com-



The Atlantic Canada International Air Show will be August 20 to 21, with both the Royal Canadian Air Force Snowbirds jet demonstration team and the CF18 Demo Team available to perform in Miramichi.

The RCAF Snowbirds and CF18 Demo Team are some of the most sought after performers in North America. The Snowbirds fly a nine-plane formation performance, highlighting teamwork and precision in their distinctive red and white CT114 Tutor jets. The CF18 Demo Team is a fast and powerful display of the premier air superiority Canadian fighter jet. Its one-of-akind, themed paint scheme is a striking testament to the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan (BCATP) from the Second World War. The RCAF theme for 2016, "Training for Victory," celebrates the BCATP and the over 130,000 air crew personnel trained at over 150 sites across Canada. The Chatham, New Brunswick base was first created as one of those sites, so it is an appropriate location for the Teams to attend this season.

A typical air traffic control radar system consists of an area surveillance radar and a secondary surveillance

The area surveillance radar covers 60 nautical miles and focuses on all targets in the sky by transmitting a signal and receiving it back as a passive echo. This echo allows the radar to locate all aircraft positions without any interaction with the aircraft equipment.

The secondary surveillance radar covers 128 nautical miles, and focuses only on aircraft responding with a transponder by sending a signal and receiving the response directly from the aircraft systems as an "active question/ answer reply." The transponder replies to interrogation messages with data such as the aircraft identity, altitude and other important parameters.

The air traffic control

radar system processes, combines and filters the target information from both radars. This provides an optimal position, with the inherent tracking data, for each aircraft in the coverage area. When used together, the two radar systems allow air traffic controllers to detect and positively identify aircraft. They also allow increased airspace capacity and flexibility, by reducing the protected airspace footprint for each aircraft.
