New to this year's ride are three different routes to pick from, all to be completed at your own pace. Incentives, health info adds to CAF fitness

Putting a little extra into PT now has rewards - beyond the obvious fitness and health benefits.

Canadian Armed Forces members tackling the job-

"We are a resource we want to be helping," says 14 Wing Fitness and Sports director Fred Williams of his team's willingness to work with CAF members on their overall fitness, health and FORCE results. "That's why we're here. People who are self-motivating and directed will do it; it's the remaining people we want to help."

14 Wing's Health Promotions manager Lisa White also encourages military leadership, as they look at their members' fitness and see some in more unhealthy zones, to remember there are barriers to doing better for many people.

"There are many reasons people may not be doing well - stress, relationships, weight wellness and diet. Remember the health promotion side, and what we can support you with."

standard FORCE fitness test from April 1 on now have a chance to go for incentives: ovm gear, annual performance report points, time off and - for the elite few - a uniform pin. The FORCE test will rank CAF members who put their best effort into meeting and exceeding – the standard. It's expected 50 per cent of CAF members will be able to reach the bronze incentive level, according to their age and gender. Silver recognition means a member is performing better than 89 per cent of their peers; gold recognition comes as members hit the top two per cent. Likely just 0.1 per cent of CAF members will be rewarded with platinum incentive status. Regular Force members started the FORCE incentive April 1: Reserve Force members will start April 1, 2017. Group rewards will be added next year, too, as units bring up their overall results. The percentages will also be reviewed as more data is compiled.

Even more important than the incentive rewards is the information FORCE can now provide about the health of each CAF member, unit, branch and the force as a whole. With the addition of a waist circumference measure, a "fitness profile" may be pulled from the computerized data collected from the testing floor. Waist measurement is an indicator of overall health; with the cardiorespiratory data from the FORCE test itself, both tools can help individuals or units identify ways to improve their odds against heart and lung disease, diabetes and other related long-term risks.

The group had a briefing on the changes, and then was on the floor for their own certifications. Several members were obviously gunning for the highest levels they could attain, hoping to set a standard for their units – just what Thauberger wants to see.

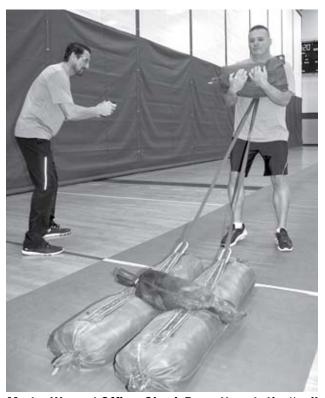

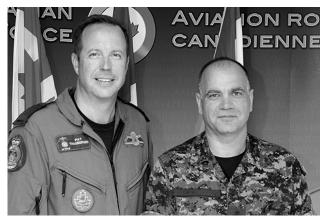

Cold, dark, wet and rough

Egress training sets helicopter crews up for over-water emergencies

Master Corporal Pam Evans, Imaging coordinator, 14 Air Maintenance Squadron

The course provides military instructor Rob Walker toured members with emergency response procedures in case including the Modular Egress of a water impact, and subsequent abandonment of the helicopter on the surface or March 9 and 10, military from underwater. Course parmembers from 14 Wing ticipants included two imagery technicians, search and rescue technician and three Cormorant helicopter pilots.

The first day commenced Services Canada, in Halifax. with classroom theory. Lead

the group through facilities, Training Simulator (METS), went through videos, demonstrated equipment used, such as the Emergency Breathing System (EBS), and presented some emergency scenarios.

In the afternoon, participants met by the training pool and were fitted with survival equipment, including a helicopter helmet, a life preserver survival vest, immersion suit, the EBS and sneakers - instead of boots. Falk provided all equipment, and is well equipped for various sized trainees.

Before entering the pool, Walker described the facility's cold tank, nick-named the "hot tub." It did look like a hot tub; however, the water in the tank is approximately two degrees Celsius. Each course member took turns in the tank, fully emerging and holding their breath until they could last no longer. (I lasted 16 seconds, compared to 27 seconds in warm water.) Doing this gives participants an indication of how cold ocean water is, and the effects temperature has on the body.

In the Survival Training Simulation Theatre (STST) pool, the group did some training drills with their EBS equipment. In one exercise, with their faces in the water, participants had to reach for their EBS with their mouths, arch backwards (while being held by an instructor) so their heads were now upside down in the water and put the EBS into their mouths. This would cause the nose to fill with water - not a pleasant feeling. Once all were comfortable

with the EBS, the group advanced to the METS to start egress training. They did approximately three cycles with the METS holding their breath and changing potions in the simulator during each cycle. (I tried all positions, since my primary position as an



quickly and safely.

By day two, most trainees had snuffly noses but were eager to continue the training. Morning theory was followed by an afternoon in the pool. While cycling through the METS simulations, participants were presented with high sea states, winds and rain as before; however, blackness and simulated lighting was added. This made things a bit more difficult. It was hard to see where the water was entering the METS and, once at the surface, the water was very rough, making it hard to swim to the front of the simulated aircraft, where members were to meet once they successfully egressed. Disorientation was

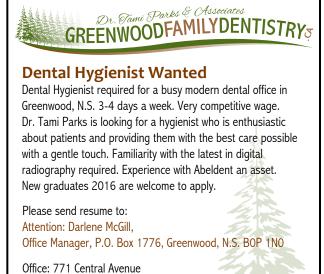
