Trudeau touches down

It was a flying Nova Scotia visit, but Prime Minister Justin Trudeau made an impression on 14 Wing Greenwood personnel as his aircraft made the base it's overnight home August 15 and 16.

Trudeau arrived at 14 Wing late in the day August 15, arriving on his Challenger, crewed by his regularly-assigned Royal Canadian Air Force and civilian staff. His RCMP security detail arrived with him, met on the airfield by support members from H Division, including vehicles and an RCMP dog handler.

14 Wing Greenwood's visits officer Captain John Pulchny said the base provided 24-hour security for the prime ministerial aircraft, including ground services like refuelling, marshalling and air traffic control guidance. Technical and mechanical support was available in case it was required.

14 Wing Commander Colonel Pat Thauberger and Wing Chief

Warrant Officer Luc Emond wide-eyed, Pulchny said, "so greeted Trudeau, welcoming him to Greenwood and shaking his hand. Trudeau was quickly whisked away, preparing for the next morning's announcement in Bridgetown of federal funding for Nova Scotia water treatment projects in a number of communities.

Trudeau was back at the base mid-morning August 16 for his departure.

"It happened that there were some people outside the fence, including some of the summer camp Cadets, and I asked the RCMP detail if we could bring some of the Cadets in to see the prime minister," Pulchny said. "They said yes, so we brought them in to stand along the side of the airfield. When Trudeau arrived, he got right out of his vehicle and went right over to them."

The Cadets were beyond excited, Pulchny said, obviously impressed and pleased to meet the prime minister, who spent time taking pictures and talking with the group.

"Everyone was absolutely

happy. Trudeau looked so relaxed, like their brother, and he was very easy to get along with. The Cadets were so happy."

Trudeau then spent a few more minutes having pictures taken with the H Division RCMP security detail members. Thauberger and Emond and other 14 Wing personnel at hand.

Pulchny said it's the first time in a dozen years he knows of a prime minister who has used 14 Wing's airfield as a staging area for a Nova Scotia visit. The visit was arranged on short notice, with federal security officials making a quick preliminary flight in to check local arrangements before Trudeau's arrival. No major adjustments were required in 14 Wing's standard security posture.

Tactical Mobile Support training at Camp Aldershot A real-life account

Any type of military operation, at home or overseas, requires capable motor vehicle operators to move personnel and equipment securely and in a timely fashion. This summer we were fortunate to join a band of eager candidates on the Mobile Support Equipment Operator Qualification Level 3 course at Camp Al-serviceable condition. dershot in Kentville.

E Company, the MSE Op QL3course required candidates to operate various standard military vehicles. These ranged in size from the General Motors Light Utility Vehicle Wheeled Militarized Commercial Off-The-Shelf or LUVW MilCOTS (a militarized version of the Chevy Silverado), to the five-ton Navistar Medium Support Vehicle System (MSVS) Tactical Truck.

What candidates do with lecture to take place on the these vehicles is serious but fun stuff. We were exposed to many different types of employment and environmental situations, such as safe backing, field operations and road moves on provincial highways. In addition, we were instructed on different types of specialized equipment, like the material handling crane and the air brake systems of the MSVS, as well as how to maintain all equipment in


While on the field portion of Delivered by 5th Canadian the course, we were trained Division Training Centre's on how to provide tactical transportation support for combat operations, performing the duties of an operator in a delivery point and taking defensive action to protect the area, vehicle and load.

The course started with instruction on applicable regulations, defensive driving and dangerous goods transportation. Lessons were not always in a classroom. This was a very hands-on course, so it was not unusual for a

Once written tests were completed, we participated in a familiarization drive onbase, on off-road tracks and trails in a controlled area, followed by both day and night drives with the LUVW MilCOTS and MSVS on provincial highways and urban areas. Then came the really fun part where we applied knowledge from our training during the field portion with tactical convoy drills.

While this was a mentally and physically demanding course, we were excited because we were gaining skills that are applied daily in both military and civilian settings - and we all looked forward to taking part in Exercise Strident Tracer, during which we applied our training in an even more realistic setting with other Army trades from both the Canadian and United States armies.
