The new air traffic control tower will be built to the southeast of Hangar 11 as a freestanding structure: not like the 1950s-addition to the hangar's rooftop. It will be nine stories tall, with work space for garages, offices. mechanical and electrical rooms.

"It's very expensive – but it's a must," Nippard says. "Over the years, we've done so much to make the air traffic folks happy – I would say it's probably the single most important building on the wing: it actually controls the aircraft and the airfield; but it's at a point it needs to be replaced. A review is underway now of three bids for a comprehensive energy performance contract, announced earlier in the year. The successful contractor will look at 14 Wing buildings for potential energy savings, do the upgrades; the base will see long-term energy savings and benefit from more energy-efficient buildings. Nippard says the last EPC was 10-15 years ago, so it's time to take a more current look at 14 Wing's greenhouse gas emissions and environmental footprint. The contract should be awarded by the end of October.

The Explosive Disposal replaced. The Refuelling area Flight will move into a new, \$600,000 structure and the Explosive Storage Area into a \$650,000 building by the spring of 2017.

Storage is also on the horizon for search and rescue equipment to the northwest of Hangar 14 (clearing hangar floor space for aircraft access), a project worth \$800,000; and for search parts on the north side of the hangar, a \$400,000 build.

Accommodations in Building 33 will see \$500,000 in interior work, including flooring, fixtures and paint. There was debate on whether or not to invest this money, but Nippard says there are rooms there for about 100 people, and the improvements will make the space more modern - and still useable.

Nippard understands this level of construction around the wing is "a headache" – for wing personnel, contractors, security and his own section staff - but "the long-term is, you get a road, good upgrades and money going



Gala Days' fun since 1945

The first Berwick "Gala Day" was held September 2, 1945. This event was sponsored by the Berwick Amateur Athletic Association to improve Rainforth Park. In 1945, the first Gala Days program included such events as horse pulling, a tug of war, a street parade, women's softball, men's baseball, a United Church supper and a street dance to end the day.
