14 Wing Greenwood will host aircraft from 407 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron, Comox (one CP140M Aurora), 435 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron, Winnipeg (one CC130T Hercules), a US Navy P8 Poseidon, a German Navy P3C Orion and a French Navy Atlantic 2; providing all long range patrol operations and air-to-air refuelling during the exercise. Aircraft will begin arriving September 9.

Fighter forces involved in the exercise will operate out of 3 Wing Bagotville, with contracted combat support aircraft operating out of Halifax and Sydney airports as required.

Cutlass Fury will begin September 11 with an inclusive air briefing, and terminate upon debrief and postmission data capture from the final sortie September 22. Veterans Affairs Canada has developed a new "Have Your Say" online engagement tool, which allows veterans, stakeholders and Canadians to submit their views on veterans' issues. Veterans Affairs Canada will also be reinstating later this year the Veteran Satisfaction Survey, discontinued in 2010. The return of the survey will supply Veterans Affairs Canada with data to improve the delivery of service to veterans and their families.
