Legacy of Lancaster legends lives on

Three men were honoured September 10 for the role they played decades ago, charting the path for today's Canadian Armed Forces' flying crews.

The on-going Greenwood Military Aviation Museum's Lancaster restoration project will include something special in recognition of what museum volunteers call "Living Legends." Plaques for the three initial veterans – Clark Montgomery, Roy Loomer and Peter Bone – were signed, unveiled and will be riveted inside the aircraft, near where the men worked during their wartime service.

"Right now, we have some of the men and women from 14 Wing and the Royal Canadian Air Force overseas, working against Daesh in Iraq," said 14 Wing Greenwood Commander

Colonel Pat Thauberger. "They are flying the CP140 Aurora – a modernized, state-of-the-art, world-leading aircraft. Their squadrons formed in the crucible of the Second World War and, when we look back from where we've come – the precise navigation and targeting nowadays, with lasers and radar – and think about the Second World War, when the first indication flying crews had they were close to a target was being shot at themselves; we've come a long way."

"It is a true honour to be here, recognizing your heroism. You literally put your lives on the line with every mission, and that is a proud legacy we carry forward."

Museum volunteer David Saulnier leads the Lancaster restoration, a

Wing wide drug test 'snapshot' of personnel, operational safety

An early morning call to a mass drug testing greeted 14 Wing Greenwood military personnel as they arrived at

work September 6.

Wing Commander Colonel Pat Thauberger received the order in August from the Assistant Chief of Military Personnel to conduct the test, and background work with a

small 14 Wing team and the Canadian Forces Drug Control Program got underway. With a potential 1,200 Regular and Reserve Force personnel to test in a day, the ambitious testing went well.

"Nobody on base complained, and everyone was really cooperative," says Major James Durand, Wing Personnel Administration Officer, who led the 14 Wing planning. "It went really well – we had a

minimum number of people we were expecting, and we got more than that, so we'll have a good sample.

This was the first time 14 Wing personnel have been involved in this type of screen-

ing and, in his wing wide message, Thauberger stressed the importance of overall results, rather than any individual findings.

"The purpose is to develop

slow-and-steady project already three-and-a-half years along, with hundreds of hours put in by the team – and hundreds more to come. Along the way, he thought of the “Lancaster Living Legends” initiative, which would place a plaque for every Lancaster survivor the team can find inside the aircraft.

This initial ceremony was held as part of the museum’s second annual Wings and Wheels vintage car show, with visiting classic cars arrayed under the wings of the various display aircraft. Attending in person from Nova Scotia were Flight Sergeant (retired) Clark Montgomery, 94, who served from July 1941 to December 1945 with 428 “Ghost” Squadron. He flew 14 operational missions in Lancasters, primarily as a Lancaster mid-upper gunner. Flight Lieutenant Roy Loomer, 93, served from May 1942 to May 1957, including three operational missions as a tail gunner with 408 “Goose” Squadron before being shot down in February

1944 and held as a prisoner of war until May 1945. Flight Sergeant Peter Bone, 95, could not attend (he lives in British Columbia). He served from September 1944 to June 1945 with 626 Squadron, putting in 25 operational missions as a mid-upper gunner.

“I’ve been serving for 34

years, and I have stories – but none like yours!” said Wing Chief Warrant Officer Luc Emond, as he was introduced to Montgomery and Loomer.

It’s true: Loomer describes having to bail out of his Lancaster, falling “like a bat out of hell” as he struggled to find his parachute’s ripcord

on the right side (it wasn’t there – it was on his left side: he’d pulled his chute on backwards). Montgomery’s crew won a contest one mission, returning to their English airfield with hundreds of bullet holes in their aircraft: more than any other plane that night.

Greenwood housing upgrades continue

Canadian Armed Forces families who call 14 Wing Greenwood’s military housing home are seeing the benefits of targeted infrastructure investments the Department of National Defence (DND) is making.

In November 2014, the Government of Canada announced a \$5.8 billion investment in infrastructure, of which DND received \$452 million. The Canadian Forces Housing Agency (CFHA) received \$102.75 million, \$8 million allocated for improvements at 14 Wing during 2015/ 2016 and 2016/ 2017.

CFHA began putting projects in place using these additional funds in the spring of 2015. The first phase was completed March 31. As a result, 34 homes in Greenwood received interior renovations, which included the replacement of plumbing, electrical and heating systems; and kitchen and bathroom renovations. Investments also included work to improve accessibility and safety of parking areas, as well as new fences and storage sheds.

Under the additional funding available in 2016/ 2017, CFHA Greenwood will invest \$4 million adding a second storey to four one-and-a-half storey, three-bedroom houses. This pilot will provide modern, energy-efficient houses. They could become a model for other sites across Canada. Additionally, 27 residential housing units will receive interior renovations.

As part of CFHA’s ongoing work, residential housing units will also see improvements, such as the replacement of roofs, attic insulation and chimneys. This type of work also aims to improve energy efficiency and comfort. Other smaller scope projects include deck refurbishment, driveway paving, and the replacement of steps, walkways, floors, doors and carbon monoxide and smoke detectors.

Phase two work and projects at 14 Wing Greenwood are already underway. CFHA will strive to minimize any short-term inconveniences caused by these improvement initiatives.

an anonymous baseline of drug use amongst our military members. Since no names are attached to the individual samples, no administrative or disciplinary action can or will be taken against personnel," he said. "The results of the testing will be used to compare drug use at 14 Wing with other Royal Canadian Air Force and Canadian Armed Forces units."

Durand worked with the base's chief warrant officers to gather a 131-member testing team, which was simply told to be ready for assignment. At September 6's briefing, they were walked through the day's required processes and paperwork, and assigned to test personnel in units not their own at various spots around base. All Regular and Reserve Force members of 14 Wing's integral units were tested; lodger units' members were not included.

Personnel provided a urine sample in a test kit. Durand said only three things were tracked: unit, age (37 or younger, 38 or older), and rank (officer, non-commissioned member from private to master corporal or non-commissioned member from sergeant to chief warrant officer). Only refusal to provide a sample could result in disciplinary action.

"Today's testing is not designed to punish or initiate disciplinary action," Thauberger said. "It should also not be taken to be a lack of trust on my part, or the part of the wing and squadrons' leadership. Rather, this form of testing is conducted in order to gather

data that can help our health promotions personnel improve and tailor drug awareness programs to meet the needs of members everywhere."

14 Wing, like all Canadian military communities, uses a range of military health services and family support programs to offer personnel and family members drug and alcohol counselling, education and prevention and promotion resources. Durand says one factor drove the testing.

"It's a chain of command responsibility to provide the

appropriate tools and information to reduce or eliminate drug-risk behaviours of CAF members. We need a good picture of what our problems may be, then we can work on adapting our approach at the wing."

Thauberger appreciates the cooperation of personnel in the testing, which takes the base's "Operate as One" motto to a deeper level.

"I know the vast majority of you know the harm illegal drug use can cause to ourselves, our team and

our operations. You would also agree any illegal drug use by our aircrew, maintainers or support personnel is completely unacceptable, and runs counter to our military ethos, our personal values and jeopardizes continued safe flying operations and our clearly demonstrated excellence in operations."

Durand expects results back in February. Any drug education and resources programs needed to best serve 14 Wing personnel will then be identified.

Veterans' stories, lives shared with visitors

August 21, a number of 14 Wing Greenwood personnel accompanied members of the Kingston Royal Canadian Legion on a visit to the Camp Hill Veterans Hospital in Halifax, where the Legion generously hosted a full BBQ meal and band for the 30-member Valley contingent and veterans' unit residents.

On a sunny summer weekend afternoon, the visit was an opportunity for the Legion and serving members to "make a veteran's day a little brighter" said Kingston Legion president Dave Geddes.

14 Wing Greenwood Honorary Colonel Terry Kelly also shared his time and talents - on his birthday,

lifting veterans' spirits with some old tunes and a heartfelt performance of his own "Pittance of Time." Kelly's crowning achievement was

Recognizing that, the further back in time an event happened, the more the present and future rely on its message; 14 Wing Greenwood's Wing Chief Warrant Officer Luc Emond encouraged veterans to open up about their experiences and share their own stories, which can continue on in the memories of the visiting volunteers for another lifetime.

One veteran shared a chilling story of being in a tank under "friendly fire" from his neighbour across the hall, who commanded an air fleet during the flawed victory known as the Falaise Gap.

Another then-15-year-old boy spoke of his experience when the fuel tanker he was on was sunk in the Atlantic, and he spent the next four years as a prisoner of war. Another man told of his experiences in charge of

immigrating thousands of refugees from Europe into Canada. Others spoke of mine sweeping on D-Day, working as medical officers or a vice admiral, casualties in Italy, the life of a paratrooper, being an army

engineer - and there were a couple of jokers who would say anything for a group laugh and photo op!

The veterans' stories were vast, broad and engaging; each with immeasurable, humble value.
