## Hudson bomber crash site confirmed on Valley farm

During the Second World War, Royal Air Force (RAF) Station Greenwood was the home to 36 Operational Training Unit (OTU), a school that trained pilots, observers (later navigators) and wireless operators/ air gunners (WAG) to operate for the first time as a fully-formed crew. This was the last stop in a long training process before crews shipped overseas to join the war.

surprisingly small, with fragmented items thrown only another 10 to 20 yards from the main impact area. From the evidence, it is apparent the aircraft was moving forward at great velocity, likely coming down nearly vertical as the plane stalled. Just five feet north of the burn field, below the levelled earth, there but twisted and torn metal, still showing paint colour.

"Like the highway itself, each year this ride will honour those who made the ultimate sacrifice in service to our country while having a direct impact in supporting our ill and injured Canadian Armed Forces members, veterans, first responders and their families who are living with operational stress injuries like PTSD."

From 2001 to 2014, more than 40,000 Canadian Armed Forces members served in the Afghanistan theatre of operations. While Canada's efforts made a great difference, this effort came at a great cost: 158 Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members made the ultimate sacrifice. Thousands of servicemen and women were also physically and/ or mentally injured as a result of operations.

In 2007, a 170-kilo-

metre portion of Highway 401, stretching from CFB Trenton to the Don Valley Parkway (and later Keele Street) in Toronto, was designated the Highway of Heroes, reflecting its use as the route for funeral convoys carrying fallen CAF servicemen and women from CFB Trenton to the coroner's office in Toronto.

While unintentional the processions brought thousands of ordinary Canadians - often led by our communities' first responders – out to pay their respects to the fallen. The experience wove the Afghanistan mission into the collective fabric of the nation.
