Northern life, work an eye-opening survival course

From January 23 to February 3, I had the "luck" to experience the Canadian Armed Forces' Arctic survival course in Resolute Bay, Nunavut with three other fellows from

413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron. We all volunteered to attend, since it's not a mandatory course for Royal Canadian Air Force aircrew. Only two courses are given per year, with around 20 people per session, and the location is specifically chosen to make each candidate

experience the brutal conditions the Arctic has to offer. At this time of the year, the sun doesn't even rise above the horizon and daylights last only a couple of hours. The average temperature is around -30 degrees Celsius and, as soon as the wind picks up, it can easily reach

near -60 degrees Celsius.

On the first two days, a gentle transition took place between outdoor and indoor learning sessions, supposedly to help us acclimatize and test all kinds of clothing options. On the third day, we spent our first night outside in a tent, surrounded by walls

Adamson will take on 14 Wing command

February 22, the initial 2017 list of colonel and captain (Navy) promotions, appointments and retirements was announced.

Lieutenant-Colonel J.A. Fletcher will be promoted and appointed officer in charge Air Component Coordination Atlantic, in Halifax. Lieutenant-Colonel J.J.P. Hache, currently commanding officer at 9 Wing Gander, will be promoted colonel and appointed Director Aerospace Program Management (Tactical Aviation and Simulation), in Ottawa.

Colonel S.G. Hale will be appointed ACOS Training, 5 Canadian Division Headquarters, in Halifax. Colonel K.E. Osmond was appointed commander 5th Canadian Division Support Group, Gagetown. of snow which we built up by cutting numerous snow blocks. We had the option to have a lantern lit up inside the tent to produce a bit of heat, but that also required a constant watch. We decided to all sleep at the same time with no lantern... big mistake! It was probably the coldest night of our life! In the middle of the night, the wind blew some snow blocks over on to our tent, which partially removed the insulation layers between the tent and the outside.

The second time we slept in the tent, we were better prepared and had a better night but, in the morning, another challenge was waiting for us: our stove was so frozen, we couldn't light it to make water and warm up our ration pack breakfast. We were already dehydrated from the night, since it's so dry so far north, and it wasn't until sometime in the afternoon we could finally drink some hot liquid.

Every day, we learned tons of useful information: like the fact you can't eat frozen food, since it takes too much energy for your body to warm it

up versus how many calories it will give you (and also that it's disgusting!).

Each simple action we take for granted here in more southern parts of Canada can be excessively challenging in the North and, most of the time, we had to put some thought into everything we did. Every time you need to use your hand, ideally you want to keep your thin gloves on – but, sometimes, we had to go barehanded. That could only be done for 30- or 40-second increments, for obvious reasons. The best way to stay warm is to constantly be working on something but, at the same time, not working too hard. Sweating can also cause some serious issues. We quickly realized how badly adapted we are to that northern environment, compare to our two Inuit instructors, who never seems to be bothered by the elements.

We learned how to build four different kinds of shelter, including an igloo - not the easiest to make! It took less than two hours for our Inuit instructors to build one but, for us, after a full afternoon of work in a team of eight or nine

people, we made something that resembled an igloo - after numerous collapses.

The course was a real eye-opener for us on what to expect in an emergency situation in the high Arctic. A simple blizzard can stop you from working for hours or days, and there are hundreds of other variables that make the difference between life and death. Most course participants really enjoyed the experience, but were more than happy to take a hot shower on the last day.

The 14 Wing Greenwood Women's hockey team, the Raiders, traveled to Gagetown February 7 for the 2017 Atlantic Region Women's Hockey Championship. After the opening ceremonies February 8, the Raiders faced off against the Gagetown Warriors, defeating them 3-1.

In their second game February 9, the Raiders challenged the Halifax Mariners; the third period ended with a 1-1 tie, which went straight into a five-shooter shoot-out. This also ended in a 1-1 tie, resulting to a sudden death shoot out. Halifax took the first shot and scored, the Raiders were unsuccessful in scoring on their shot, ultimately losing a 3-2 game.

Later that day, the Raiders met Gagetown in the semi-finals, a game they easily

won 6-0, giving them a spot in the finals.


February 10, Greenwood found themselves once again facing-off against Halifax in the championship game. Both teams gave everything they had, and it was a close game but, unfortunately for Greenwood, Halifax came out on top 2-1.

The Halifax Mainers will now continue to the Canadian Armed Forces nationals at CFB Borden March 4 to 9 as Team Atlantic, but will be picking up four players from the Greenwood Raiders to join them.

The 14 Wing Greenwood Old Timers took part in the Atlantic Old Timers Regional Hockey Tournament January 31 to February 3. The first match-up was between 14 Wing and CFB Gagetown, with

14 Wing winning 4 – 1. Later on on day one, 14 Wing won its second game against Halifax with a 6-3 score. The two wins secured the 14 Wing Old Timers a place in the finals.

The final game was played against Halifax, and what a barn burner it was! The first period was scoreless, as both goaltenders, especially 14 Wing's, played exceptionally well. The second period saw Halifax score one goal to take a 1 -0 lead. The third period remained scoreless late into the period, when 14 Wing scored against Halifax to tie it up, with six minutes remaining. Unfortunately, the goal was disallowed due to a call of a high stick. 14 Wing made the decision to pull its goalie with 1:30 left, but Halifax was able to hold them off and win the tournament.

the evidence and meet some of the men and women who left this campus to join the fight for justice overseas. This talk will also be repeated March 28. April 6 closes the series



MAJOR D.A. JONES CD (Retired),
Middleton, NS

JONES, Donald Allan age 76, Middleton, NS passed away suddenly at home on 14 February 2017. Born in Star City, SK, he was the son of the late Robert E. Jones (Star City, SK) and the late Ethel B. Mitchell (Canora, SK). Born into a farming family, he spent the first 19 years of his life working the land. In 1959, he joined the military which began an illustrious 37-year flying career with the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) initially as a Radio Officer then for most of his career as a Tactical Navigator on the Argus, the Aurora, and while on exchange at RAF St Mawgan, Cornwall on the Nimrod from 1970 to 1972. Don flew into all of the NATO Maritime Patrol bases in North America and in Europe. An avid aviator he volunteered to serve on Sea King helicopters rather than being posted to a non-flying position. From 1979 to 1981 he was the Helicopter Detachment Commander aboard HMCS Huron. While so serving he obtained a Watch Keeping certificate, a rare feat for an aircrew member. A natural leader with outstanding tactical skills and excellent teaching abilities he held the highest of respect from the Anti-Submarine-Warfare community. As a result he along with a few others became the first Aurora navigators to become Crew Commanders, a position normally held by pilots. On retirement he was the Chief Aircrew Instructor at the Maritime Patrol and Training Squadron. He accumulated almost 13,000 flying hours, earning the VP International Gold Pin awarded for accumulating 8760 hours, one full year while airborne in support of Maritime Operations. A stalwart supporter of VP International, he served as its President from 1975 to 1976 and from 1982 to 1985. He spent his retirement life by travelling, spending winters in the southern US, travelling abroad and then eventually just enjoying his lakeside home with his soul mate second wife, Donna Jones (Halifax, NS). He was predeceased by his beloved sister, Lynda Carole Jones (April 1962 Star City, SK). From his first marriage, he is survived by his three sons, Dwayne Allan Jones (Melinda) Lower Sackville, NS; Daryle Robert Jones, Edmonton, AB; and Deryk Edward Jones (Marie), Edmonton, AB; daughter Pamela May Jones (Lloyd) Lunenburg, NS; Grandchildren Shannon Lee Jones, Middleton, NS; Kyle Edward Jones, Edmonton, AB, and Coletyn Allan Jones-Trimper, Middleton, NS; various aunts, uncles and cousins in SK and BC. As per Don’s wishes he was cremated, there will be no visitation or funeral, rather a Celebration of Life ceremony will be held later in the summer. Museum moment



M. Uhlman, Greenwood Military Aviation Museum Society

This nine-metre wooden structure was erected on the shore of the Bay of Fundy at Economy in early 1942, one of a tripartite group of towers that could triangulate the position of anything moving through the Bay. Two of the towers were in the Economy area (one is now a tourist information centre on the Glooscap Trail), and one was on the North Mountain. Built for two purposes - as part of the coast watcher plan

for the dreaded German U Boat that lurked close inshore in Canada's Eastern shoreline and as a bombing range observation platform, the towers were continuously manned with personnel with sighting apparatus. Aircraft from RAF Greenwood and RAF Debert used the inlet at Economy as a bombing and gunnery range, with floating targets, and were controlled by the range safety officer. When

the aircraft bombs struck the water, tower personnel sighted on the splashes and passed the direction of the splash from the tower. By drawing the lines from each tower, the assessor could tell if the bombs had struck the targets or not.

The tower now located at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum, and walkways along the crest of the hill overlooking the museum's Air Park, were restored and erected in the

summer of 1998 by visiting members of the Vermont Air National Guard, who needed a foreign employment of work for trade qualification. The tower structure was re-built with new materials, using the old frame as a guide, and salvaging what interior items were possible. It is hoped the tower can be opened to the public, with meteorology and air traffic displays.

The Royal Canadian Air Force has taken delivery of 60 replacement vehicles for an aging fleet of D6 tow tractors – more commonly known on flight lines as “mules.”

The vehicles were delivered in late January 2017 to several Royal Canadian Air Force wings, including 3 Wing Bagotville, 4 Wing Cold Lake, 8 Wing Trenton, 14 Wing Greenwood, 17 Wing Winnipeg and 19 Wing Comox.

The mules are used to tow and manoeuvre aircraft on the tarmac for flight operations and scheduled maintenance, as well as to tow aircraft maintenance support equipment

(AMSE) to carry out aircraft servicing. These particular mules – the smallest in the RCAF inventory – are used in support of flight line operations to tow CT114 Tutors, CH146 Griffon and CC148 Twin Otter aircraft. Larger mules are used to tow larger and heavier aircraft.

Mules are essential to day-to-day activities on the flight line. The new vehicles will be much more dependable and a welcomed resource for the technicians who service aircraft

The current D6 mules, manufactured by Clark, were procured in 1987 and had reached the end of their service life. The existing fleet had reliability, availability and maintainabil-

ity issues that had resulted in increased operational and maintenance costs and parts were difficult to obtain.

The new tractors, manufactured by TLD America, are similar to the old D6 mules but have many improvements. For example, the new mules have increased towing capacity, LED lighting, a superior heating system, an improved cold weather starting aid and the ability to release the front and back pintle hitch from inside the cab.






