RCAF Association presents annual awards Greenwood's Nixon Reserve aviator of the year

Royal Canadian Air Force Association

The Royal Canadian Air Force Association (RCAFA) has announced the 2016 recipients of its annual awards recognizing outstanding achievements in Canadian aviation.

Ordinarily presented during the association's annual meeting, held in Hamilton, Ontario, in October; the announcement was delayed until January (the association's awards to its own membership were presented during the AGM).

The Air Marshal W.A. Bishop, VC Memorial Trophy was awarded to 407 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron, 19 Wing Comox, for "outstanding and meritorious achievement in any field of aviation" other than air transportation or military search and rescue. 407 Squadron has not only maintained a crew in combat operations in Iraq in Operation Impact in the fight

against ISIS, but has also conducted counter-narcotics missions in Central America in Operation Caribbe, illegal fishing monitoring missions out of Japan in Operation Driftnet and Canadian Arctic sovereignty patrols in Operation Qimmiq.

The Golden Hawks Trophy was presented to 406 (Maritime Operational Training) Squadron, 12 Wing Shearwater. Presented for "outstanding contributions or highly commendable achievements in any field of military aviation," other than air transportation or search and rescue, 406 Squadron had an outstanding 2016, overcoming numerous challenges and celebrating momentous milestones. The squadron spearheaded 12 Wing's transition from Sea King to Cyclone helicopters, developing and delivering training which produced the first Cyclone technicians and aircrew. The squadron executed a wholesale move from Second

Strength in diversity recognized March 21

March 21, the Canadian Armed Forces' Defence Team will join the global community in commemorating the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (IDERD).

The date marks the anniversary of the Sharpeville Massacre, which captured worldwide attention and put anti-racism on the global agenda March 21, 1960, when police in South Africa opened fire and killed 69 people at a peaceful demonstration against "apartheid laws" requiring all Black people carry a pass book containing fingerprints, photo and information to access non-Black areas.

The theme for the 2017 IDERD commemoration at National Defence is "Defence Team Diversity." The IDERD reinforces values of inclusion, diversity and equality. Members of the Defence Team proudly chose to stand together as a unified entity to recognize the added value of diversity within the team and focus on defending Canada, its lands, its peoples and its values. Racist behaviour not only undermines team cohesion and jeopardizes mission success, but

also counters everything Canadians stand for.

"As the DND CAF interim champion for visible minorities, I strongly encourage all base, wing and station commanders to plan for and support activities to highlight the IDERD and to ensure the highest levels of participation by all DND employees and CAF members," said Vice-Admiral R. Lloyd, acting Vice-Chief of Defence Staff. "I will host the national event March 21, from noon to 2 p.m. at the Major-General Peakes Building in Ottawa."

Le 21 mars 2017, l'Équipe de la Défense des Forces armées canadiennes se joindra à la communauté mondiale pour souligner la Journée internationale pour l'élimination de la discrimination raciale (JIEDR).

Cette date marque l'anniversaire du massacre de Sharpeville, lequel avait attiré l'attention du monde entier et permis d'inscrire la lutte contre le racisme à l'ordre du jour mondial le 21 mars 1960, lorsque les policiers ont ouvert le feu et tué 69 personnes noires lors d'une manifestation pacifique contre les lois de l'apartheid; tous les noirs devaient porter un livre contenant leurs empreintes, leurs

photos et des renseignements afin d'avoir accès aux secteurs où les habitants n'étaient pas de race noire.

Le thème de la Défense nationale pour la JIEDR de 2017 est « L'Équipe de la Défense et la diversité ». La JIEDR renforce les valeurs d'inclusion, de diversité et d'égalité. Les membres de l'Équipe de la Défense choisissent fièrement d'unir leurs forces afin de reconnaître la valeur ajoutée de la diversité au sein de l'Équipe et d'axer leurs efforts sur la défense du Canada, de son territoire, de ses citoyens et de ses valeurs. The Gordon R. McGregor Memorial Trophy went to the Calgary Airport Authority. Presented "in recognition of outstanding and meritorious achievements in the field of air transportation," this award recognized the July 1, 1992, assumption of responsibilities by the Calgary Airport Authority for the operation and expansion of the airport. Today, YYC is a world class

facility, committed to creating a positive, engaging experience for passengers and to setting the standard for the industry.

The Air Marshal C. Roy Slemon Award was awarded to Corporal David Jackson, 51 Aerospace Control & Warning (Operational Training) Squadron, 22 Wing North Bay. Presented to the "aviator of the year (Regular Force)," Jackson has made outstanding accomplishments as an instructor in three crew positions within 51 Squadron and given unwavering support to Air Task Force-Iraq. His embracement of "service before self" was evident in a short-notice Operation Impact deployment, where he made significant contributions as a tactical data link operator to the common ground station and operations centr4e. Jackson's involvement on his trade's qualification level three writing board exemplifies his regard as an expert. His leadership in squadron events, operations, and community volunteering are indicative of RCAF values.

The Flight Lieutenant D.M. Grant, DFC Trophy, was presented to Warrant Officer Pat Nixon, of 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron, 14 Wing Greenwood. Presented to the "aviator of the year (Reserve Force)," Nixon directly contributed to the successful implementation of the Air Occupational Enhancement program on the CP140 fleet. Since May of 2015, Nixon expertly fulfilled his role as training and education plan manager, while also embracing additional responsibilities as squadron senior aircraft maintenance superintendent, a key technical airworthiness position in the squadron providing guidance in the force generation of aircraft technicians. His work ethic and dedication are admirable, as he not only carries out his roles in uniform with the utmost professionalism, but is also a prominent role model in the community.

The NORAD Trophy was presented to the 19 Wing Deployed Operating Base Team, 19 Wing Comox. Presented "in honour of those who guard what we value most – our loved ones, our liberties and our peace," the 19 Wing NORAD Deployed

Operations Base (DOB) team consistently displayed an exceptional level of support to NORAD operations. 19 Wing has led the way amongst Canadian DOBs in the creation and establishment of Quick Reaction Alert (QRA) liaison, occupational training plans, DOB checklists, procedures and dedicated A3 Fighter/ DOB liaison, and QRA custodian positions. Most recently, 19 Wing hosted 4 Wing Cold Lake for a three-month airspace control area deployment coincident with a busy operational summer. Following 19 Wing's most recent NORAD evaluation in August 2015, the lead inspector described 19 Wing as a "model DOB in North America."

Medevac, beacon response call out Herc

At 12:50 p.m. March 13, the Halifax-based Joint Rescue Coordination Centre tasked 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron to send a Hercules C130 aircraft (R344) on a top

cover mission in support of a Gander-based Cormorant helicopter responding in a medevac of a casualty with a broken knee from marine vessel Sichen Beijing. R344 was

airborne at 1:44 p.m. R 911 took the injured crew member to St. John's, while R 344 returned to Greenwood 6 p.m.

413 Squadron's C130, again R344, was tasked March 15 for an ELT search just off Cape Sable, and also in aid of 128-foot vessel 107 nautical miles south-southwest of Yarmouth. The Coast Guard's Cape Rogers was also responding to the vessel in distress, with an estimated time of arrival of 1 a.m. There were reports of 31 people on board. Search and rescue support was enacted just before 11:30 p.m. March 14, and R344 went airborne just after 1 a.m. March 15. The Hercules successfully located the ELT signal: it was a boat alongside the vessel in distress, and then proceeded to the distressed vessel. The Coast Guard was on scene and everything seemed to be in order; the Hercules was stood down and landed in Greenwood shortly after 4 a.m.

Court action close in men’s regional basketball

14 Wing Greenwood hosted the Canadian Armed Forces Atlantic Regional men’s basketball tournament February 21 to 24. Four teams were in the field, and the competition was much closer than some of the scores indicate.

Game 3 February 22 got off to a rocky start, particularly for the Shearwater team, suddenly and unexpectedly down a few key players. Three base female players stepped in to fill the holes at the last minute. Shearwater opened with a 38-102 loss to Halifax, while Greenwood beat Gagetown 76-56. Game three, also February 22, put Gagetown on top of an 84-39 win over Shearwater.

Game 4 February 23 saw Halifax beat Greenwood 77-61, Greenwood defeat Shearwater 86-42 and Halifax come out over Gagetown 93-65. With a bye into the finals for Halifax,

round robin third-place Gagetown went into the semifinal that evening against second-place Greenwood. Greenwood won, 84-69, to take the spot in the February 24 final with Halifax.

The final itself was close in score to the end of the

third quarter, when Halifax came up big through the fourth quarter to beat Greenwood and win regional representation rights for the 2017 CAF nationals in Borden April 8 to 12.

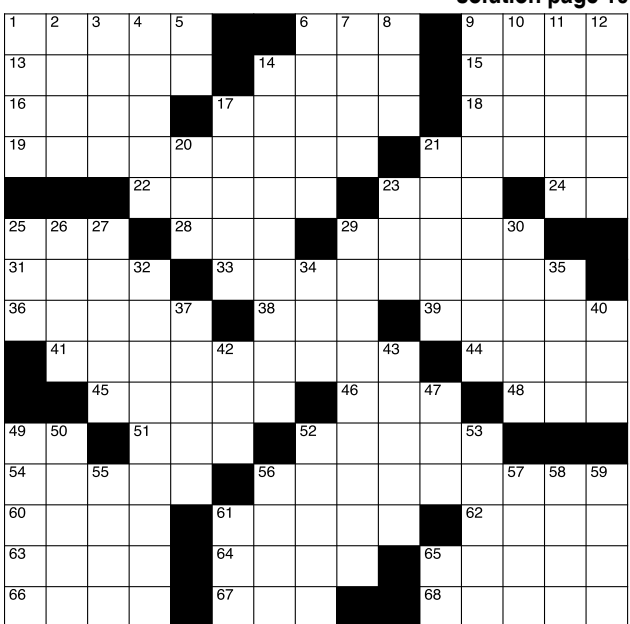

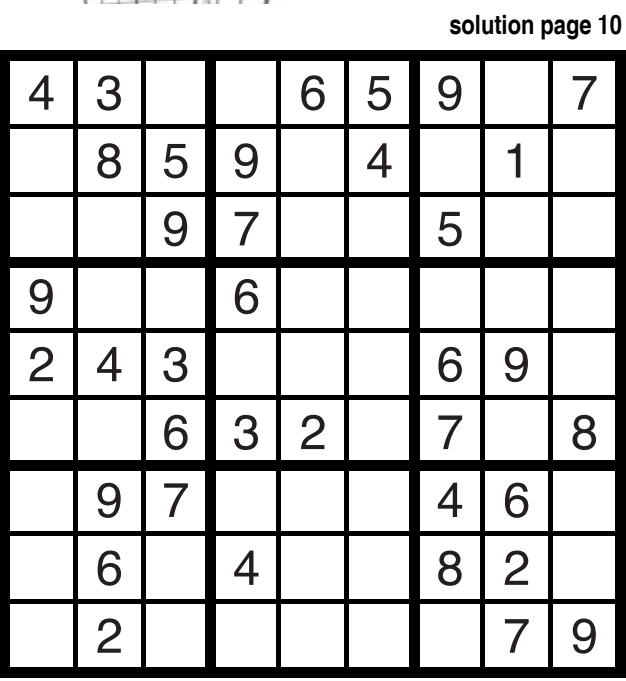
