## Grandfather clause approved for Op Impact hardship, risks

April 11, the Government of Canada approved the Minister of National Defense's request to grandfather the hardship and risk levels for the locations of Arifjan and Ali Al Salem in Kuwait for Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members currently deployed on Operation Impact.

Last year, the Departmental Hardship and Risk Committee (DHRC), responsible for assessing hardship and risk on deployed operations, determined the levels were lower for Arifjan and Ali Al Salem as a result of a lower risk to CAF members. All CAF members in those regions when the decisions were made to reduce hardship and risk levels will not see their levels drop for the duration of their deployment.

With respect to CAF personnel in Kuwait, those in Ali Al Salem will have their tax-exempt status extended until August 16 and those in Arifjan will have their tax-exempt status extended until December 18, not September 1, 2016.

The review of the overall policy, as requested by the Minister of National Defence to the Chief of the Defence Staff is still underway. Hardship and risk levels for all operations are continuously reviewed and reflects a rating or level supported by analysis and advice from subject-matter experts, including the force employer, medical and intelligence advisors.

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## Sunrise service marks Easter in Morden

April 16, an Easter Sunrise Service was held at the French Cross in Morden.

The minister providing this lovely service was Reverend John Moses, Aylesford United Church.

Started by the late Reverend Gordon Fraser in 1981 as one of four services for the Aylesford Pastoral Charge, which then included Aylesford, Morden and Greenwood Square churches; in Holy Week; the sunrise service was held at the French Cross, which marks an escape event during the Expulsion of the Acadians. The Deportation Cross was erected in 1924 to commemorate the deportation of 2,000 Acadians, overlooking the mighty Bay of Fundy.

There is something moving about gathering at the stone cross, a symbol of Christ's power over death, and having a service beside the powerful Fundy tides. We gather most years, whatever the weather (except when roads are impassable), to celebrate the story, the mystery and meaning of the empty tomb.

This year's lovely service was held at about 6:30 a.m., with approximately 31 people attending. It was a beautiful experience: often quite cold, the weather on this morning was about seven degrees



Celsius. During the service, Moses cooked up fish and loaves at the site of the French Cross and, after the service, we went up the hill to the Morden Community Hall
