Standing sentry

Greenwood aviator represents RCAF at National War Memorial service



At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, a Greenwood woman will be standing guard in Ottawa, representing not only the Royal Canadian Air Force but also Canadians, as the country marks Remembrance Day.

Aviator Sarah Comeau has been selected by Chief of Defence Staff General Jonathan Vance as
