## Wing marks change of command July 30

## Argus artwork adds story to 415 Squadron heritage

A lucky 13th painting has been added to 415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron’s collection at 14 Wing Greenwood.

Chris Henneberry, president of the 415 Squadron Association, delivered a Geoff Bennett painting of an Argus, after it – and the aircraft depicted in it – followed a circuitous route to the modern-day 415 Squadron briefing room.

“This painting was done in 1976 of aircraft #37, a year before it crash landed in Summerside. The painting was given to

the first officer on an Electra on ice patrols – and it was this Electra the Argus sliced in half in the crash. The Argus was destroyed, the Electra was put back together and flew again.”

The painting was later given to a fellow who served at Summerside during the Argus era; that man’s son later still had it in a yard sale.

“He got to talking with a man who came by the sale, and he gave him the painting. That man knew of the 415 association, he got in touch and said he’d send it to us.”

The painting had a hole and a few marks, but “the association took it on right away. It’s the

history of our squadron. We know so little about the people who flew the Argus, back in the Cold War years, and we’re really trying to fill in that history.”

Henneberry said the Bennett painting collection held by 415 Squadron is important.

“The squadron was stood down in 2005, and we don’t know where the squadron will be in the future.”

Commanding Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Bernie Thorne thanked Henneberry for the artwork, but more particularly for the history notes the 415 Squadron Association was able to add about the depicted aircraft and its history, but

also the provenance of the painting’s travels.

“Everything we have here in the collection is here for a reason, it means a lot,” Thorne said. “Without the information recorded, we forget how important some things are.”

Thorne encouraged 415 Squadron members past and present to join the squadron association and maintain their links with a proud military unit dating back to the Second World War.

“It’s important to know everyone around you are your friends and are here for you, whether it’s being encouraged to come out for the official

## Deputy Wing Commander branch handover acknowledges responsibility for ‘little bit of everything’

Lieutenant-Colonel Dale King isn’t making the same promise his predecessor made two years ago: as Lieutenant-Colonel Bruno Baker took command then of the newly stood-up Deputy Wing Commander Branch at 14 Wing Greenwood, he pledged “the number one thing to do is learn your job so I could help.

“What a foolish ideal!” Baker said, explaining just what he encountered as he took on the role. The branch was created during a 2017 structural realignment Canadian Armed Forces-wide, with many mission supporting sections combined, including finance, projects and planning, Canadian Forces Morale and Welfare Services programs, responsibility for lodger units,

housing and more.

## Meeting the needs they know

### MFRC marks AGM with call for input from community

A military family resource centre can help families meet the challenges of a military lifestyle, 14 Wing Greenwood deputy Wing Commander Lieutenant-Colonel Bruno Baker says, to the point the “job in uniform would be almost impossible to do” without MFRCs.

Baker represented Wing Commander Colonel Mike Adamson at the Greenwood MFRC’s annual meeting June 19, thanking the volunteers on the centre’s board of directors, the centre’s staff and its volunteers for doing what they do.

“Most of you have an association with the military, and you know what we demand of our families. It is very difficult, very tough, being away from your networks,” Baker said. “In Greenwood, we are privileged: the relationship between our MFRC and the

base is good, and this is one of the best places to be in the country as far as services go. You have a tremendous team, with excellent guidance. We know it’s not easy, but we all benefit from it.”

MFRC board president Kathryn Dalton led the formal annual meeting, detailing happenings over the past year which included a focus on governance, strengthening the MFRC’s presence in the community and communications around childcare supports. This fall, the board begins a three-year strategic planning process that will incorporate national changes to MFRCs’ structure, accountability and policies.

“How do we do that so our families and programs don’t notice it at all,” she asked. “We’re volunteers, and we’ve got people here at the centre to help us and we work with the wing to make sure we’re covering all our bases for the success of the centre.”

MFRC executive director Margaret Reid also emphasized the focus of the board and centre staff on meeting the needs of the community with its programs for families, children, couples, men, veterans, singles; offering crafts, trainings, outings, socials, counseling, language classes, employment tips and more.

“We think we deliver programs to meet your needs, but we need to know that from you,” she said. “If we do something we like, let us know. If we don’t do something, tell us. Let us know how we can hit the mark, and where we miss the mark. We count on you.”

Staff employment milestones were acknowledged, with awards presented to Cara DiPersio, five years; Allison Stymest, six years; Michelle Thibodeau-Wagner, 10 years; Karen Doiron, 20 years; and Kim Dixon, 20 years.

Financially, the MFRC finished 2018/ 2019 \$37,410 to the good. The centre received \$905,913 from Director Military Family Services, \$332,582 through program income and \$7,630 through fundraising; included in \$1,377,799 in total revenue. Program costs totaled \$120,822, board expenses were \$15,137, \$39,832 was spent on childcare and preschool services, and \$774,406 was spent on salaries and benefits. Total expenses were \$1,340,389.

Elections were held for the MFRC’s board of directors. Re-elected were Mandy Park. Re-offering were Justin Kubis and Laura Fox. Elected for a two-year term were Stephanie Osmond, Stephanie Vatcher, Jaime Arnott, Annabella Lamontagne, Stefanie Arduini, Jessica Matchem abd Rhonda Bull. Completing their terms were Kathryn Dalton, Sandra Trail, Pamela Patten and Rini Back. ➔

## Change of appointment at RPOps brings in familiar face

The change of appointment at Real Property Operations Detachment Greenwood June 24 between the outgoing Major James LeGresley and the incoming Major Andrew Peddle likely couldn't have been simpler: the men have shared an office wall for the past year.

“His folks, my folks – we’ve been having weekly joint operations group meetings all along,” said LeGresley. “I can’t think of an easier handover.”

LeGresley was also Peddle’s course office in 2012.

“You took me and showed me the ropes and polished me off, showed me how to put my best foot forward,” Peddle said. “This past year, you’ve been a peer as we have worked hand in hand to deliver more great things as Real Property Operations and Mission Support Squadron.”

ished. I said last year as I arrived, I'd be sticking around and here I am, eight months later, out the door.

“I am leaving, though, on a high note: 14 OSS is starting to develop its personality, from six different flights working in six different parts of the base. The culture and personality of 14 OSS is coming together, and teamwork is very important. We can't do that without working together.”

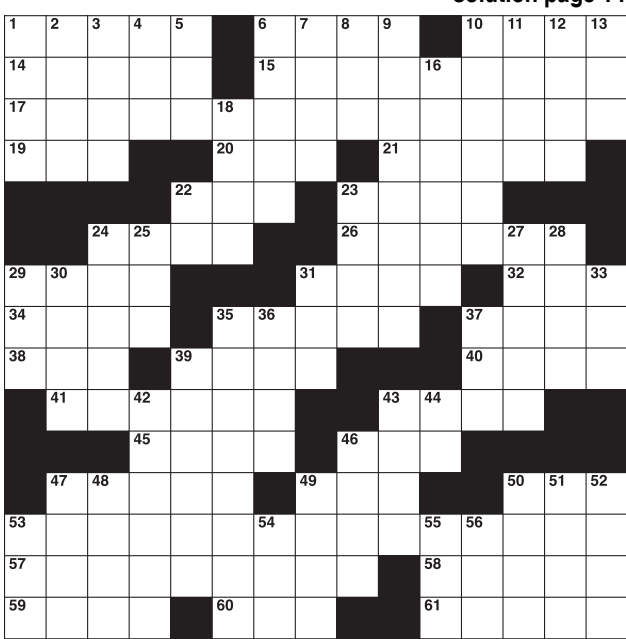

# Dolphins cap season at provincial AAA championships

Eight swimmers with the Greenwood Dolphins Swim Club travelled to Halifax to compete in the 2019 Swim Nova Scotia Ken Dunn Provincial Championships at Dalplex Pool.

Oliver Cadrain, Bailey Dowell, Callie Dowell, Brandon Puttick, Grace Smith, Logan Way, Josh Wootten and Kaleigh Whitelaw all represented the club throughout the four-day competition, held July 4 to 7.

“Everyone had a very successful meet and it was a great way to wrap up the season,” said Dolphins’ head coach Chris Stone.

“This meet is routinely a strong meet, with the best competition from Atlantic Canada along with clubs from Quebec, Ontario and New England frequently attending, so it was great to see everyone stepping up and swimming fast.”

Leading the way was 20-year-old Logan Way, home from his second season with the Acadia Axemen swim team. Way was the bronze medalist in the 50m backstroke in the men’s 16 & Over age category, setting a new club record with his time of 29.34. He also set a new club record in the 100m backstroke event, with a time of 1:03.57, and finished fifth.

New club records were also set by 14-year-old Brandon Puttick in the men’s 13-14 age category for the 800m and 1500m events, with times of 10:33.26 and 19:40.82, respectively. As well, 14-year-old Kaleigh Whitelaw set new club records for the women’s 13-14 year old age category in the 400m freestyle, with a time of 5:03.40, and in the 800m freestyle, with a time of 10:38.30. Sixteen-year-

old Callie Dowell set a new club record for the women’s 15-17 age group in the 100m backstroke, with her time of 1:17.00.

Two new relay club records were set by the Dolphins, with the women’s 4x 100m freestyle team of Callie Dowell, Bailey Dowell, Smith and Whitelaw lowering the mark to 4:21.32 in the Open Women’s category; the men’s 4x 200m freestyle team - Way, Cadrain, Wootten and Puttick -lowered the Open Men’s mark to 8:58.94.

The Dolphins’ 2019-20 swim season will begin in early September, and membership is open to both military and civilian participants, at all levels of swimming. Prospective members may contact gwddolphins@gmail.com for information on the club and the membership levels. ➔
