Colonel Mike Adamson was satisfied he finished as he intended from the start, doing all he could to support 14 Wing Greenwood's motto, "Operate as One."

Three hundred forty-three of his personnel were on parade July 30 to back him up, as he turned command of 14 Wing Greenwood over to the incoming Colonel Brendan Cook. Guests at the event included The Honourable Arthur J. 


