## Wing motto ties work to success - for all

Colonel Mike Adamson was satisfied he finished as he intended from the start, doing all he could to support 14 Wing Greenwood's motto, "Operate as One."

Three hundred forty-three of his personnel were on parade July 30 to back him up, as he turned command of 14 Wing Greenwood over to the incoming Colonel Brendan Cook. Guests at the event included The Honourable Arthur J. LeBlanc, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia; 1 Canadian Air Division Deputy Commander Brigadier-General Iain Huddleston, and Canadian Joint Operations Command Deputy Commander Major-General Bill Seymour.

"You folks look great, you look very sharp; and I am honoured so many have joined us here today," Adamson said. "Standing here two years ago, I talked about how proud I was to command 14 Wing, and it's been the most rewarding job of my career."

Adamson said, the wing was “stretched thin” from the punishing tempo of search and rescue and Operation Impact rotations, along with continued support of operations and exercises across Canada and around the world.

“I asked my squadrons to solve problems and respond. We have this motto here, and no operation or airplane takes to the skies without all of us. I am so very proud of the work that goes on here, the leadership and professionalism every day in your duties. We have fought together; we have celebrated together. It’s what we do, and I hope you all feel that sense of accomplishment.”

Cook acknowledged the flights on parade as a “testament to the professionalism and standards here under Mike Adamson,” and also as a note to himself as he takes command.

“14 Wing, your message has been received. We will build on your success and continue to ‘Operate as

One,’ personally and as a collective.”

Cook referenced the Canadian Armed Forces’ new Balance Strategy, focused on strengthening the CAF’s operational effectiveness through physical activity, nutrition, injury and sleep.

“I will continue Mike Adamson’s commitment to look after you, and I encourage your mentorship and your leadership to choose to leave a mark, too. Make yourself better, make the team better. Recommit to that, making the collective better able to ‘Operate as One.’”

Huddleston presided over the parade and change of command ceremony, himself very much at home at 14 Wing, having spent nine years posted here, two years as wing commander.

“Both of these men are friends of mine, both of these men I have the greatest respect for.”

Huddleston congratulated Adamson on a “highly successful command tour.

“You have led your wing and its personnel with courage and conviction, and

# Squadron role in training, learning ties personnel together

Joining a squadron is like taking on a family, and Colonel Ray Townsend acknowledged that in an “emotionally complicated” day July 18, as 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron marked its change of command.

Townsend turned command over to the incoming Lieutenant-Colonel Angie Thomas on 14 Wing Greenwood’s parade square, under the eye of 14 Wing Commander Colonel Mike Adamson.

“The last two years have been the most professional rewarding of my career, and I could not have done it without these people around me,” Townsend said. “We know it’s about work, but it’s more than that. The squadron and people become part of your life, and that can tug on your heartstrings from time to time: especially significant moments like this.”

Townsend compared the squadron’s role designing training for and then teaching 250 long range patrol air crew members in the past two years to planting trees to allow people many years later to enjoy the shade.

“404 Squadron: you have planted a tremendous forest in these young aircrews with the best instruction in the world. I could not be more proud of a unit: they find innovative ways to train, make the courses more relevant, they deal with equipment changes, they prepare crews for war. They are hard workers, compassionate, with a desire to improve themselves and others, and they look after each other. Everyone is like a family.”

Townsend presented the squadron with a quilted wall hanging, depicting both significant 404 Squadron heritage and its modern work, made by his mother over the past few months.

Thomas returns to Greenwood, last here in 2016 with

415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron. She said she is looking forward to adding to the vision and success of 404 Squadron.

“I am overwhelmed with a great sense of pride looking at all of you on parade and in the stands,” she said. “It

takes a special ability to pass on knowledge, and I look forward to learning from you.”

Adamson congratulated Townsend and the squadron for their work in the past two years.

“It has been an interesting past few years for the CP140 fleet, much of it involving

upgrading the training of our personnel here and around the world,” Adamson said. That pressure led to the “get well program” for long range patrol: “Two years ago, I tasked Colonel Townsend to get a handle on our training concerns, and the results have been significant:

sustainable and predictable course scheduling, success with simulated exercises, adaptations of new technology – all while fulfilling your own training mandate and supplementing flying crews around the world. Your dedication is evident in your motto: ‘Ready to fight.’” ➔

Tsai-Lamoureux thanked Adamson for

allowing her the opportunity to lead 14 AMS, and her command peers at squadrons and units across the base.

“There is no better group, no problem we couldn’t solve working together. 14 AMS, though, will always be my ‘home,’ the home of the proud; dedicated, driven and ready.”

Adamson thanked Tsai-Lamoureux and the wider 14 AMS branch, “the home of CP140 Aurora fleet maintenance.

“You meet – and exceed – the maritime mandate, but you also position personnel and expertise across the country and around the world. There are so many pieces to provide airpower to the Royal Canadian Air Force, but no issues have arisen you can’t meet.”


Adamson said, while command is an important and

challenging career opportunity, “there is nothing like an opportunity to make a difference with your personnel.

“14 AMS has proven relationships time and time again. Thank you for your tireless effort to keep Auroras in the sky – and I know you will do that for Lieutenant-Colonel Marchand.”

Marchand and his family served in Greenwood from 2000 to 2007, “and we have been trying to get back ever since.

“I am humbled and honoured to be back as your commanding officer. Rom the meetings in the past week, it is very evident this squadron’s work doesn’t happen in isolation: you do ‘Operate as One,’ and I hope that continues. I promise to work tirelessly on your behalf and support you as you work in the fleet.” ➔

# Swordfish mark contributions, new faces at changeover

There are two new faces at 415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron, following a change of command, a Regular Force retirement and a change of appointment July 25 at 14 Wing Greenwood.

The squadron held the ceremonies in the Annapolis Mess, with a flight of personnel presented for inspection by reviewing officer 14 Wing Greenwood Colonel Mike Adamson.

Lieutenant-Colonel Bernie Thorne finished his 32-year Regular Force career with the last day of his command of 415 Squadron, embarking on a new role as a member of the Reserve Force and remaining here in the Valley. He acknowledged the changes make “part of me really happy.

“I wasn’t willing to leave, I wasn’t willing to leave the East Coast – so we’ve bought a farm and I’m joining the Reserves to help folks out,” Thorne said. “I’m really look-

ing forward to it.”

He thanked his wife, Alisa, for her long-time support “to let me pursue what I wanted. You laid your dreams aside – but know I’ve kept them with my own.”

Family and heritage highlighted Thorne’s comments, from his intentions to put down roots in their farm, including a small vineyard they’ve named Mooreast; to what he found as CO of the re-established 415 Squadron.

“The Swordfish is a big family: when I took over, I said we’d centre our squadron around the formed 14 Software Engineering Squadron and the Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit, and I still firmly believe that, and we’ve grown with force development adding the 434 Schooners. The 415 association has done a great job keeping us involved in our wider community, and we’ve adopted all the honorary colonels from 14 SES and MPEU into our family, too.”

He added in the strong and emotional overseas connections the squadron maintains with Eastmoor, its Second World War home in England.

His biggest advice for the incoming CO, Lieutenant-Colonel Ross Freeman, was to both take time to mark the squadron’s continued growth and achievements; and have fun.

“Families love having fun together, and never regret the time you spend doing that.”

Freeman is back in the Valley, having been posted here in the past with 415 (Maritime Patrol) and 405 (Long Range Patrol) squadrons.

“I will not let you down in carrying on all the great work that’s been done – with huge thanks to Bernie. The squadron is breaking ground on the operational capability of the fleet, and everyone is proud to be part of the squadron. Morale is high.”

Adamson looked at his and Thorne’s Greenwood careers, flying off and on again over

postings here through the past 25 years.

“It is a great source of satisfaction for me we are full circle, working together here at 14 Wing again. Two years ago, I asked you to put us on the right path with new capabilities and plot a way forward for the Aurora aircraft. I could

not imagine anyone better. The LRP community will continue to benefit from your experience: few in this community have contributed as much as you to LRP work.”

Adamson included praise for 415 Squadron personnel: “You are a small squadron, but made up of the best mili-

tary and civilian personnel in the LRP community. I look forward to seeing where you take us in the next few years.”

Master Warrant Officer Jean Plamondon also left the squadron, turning over duties in a change of appointment to the incoming Master Warrant Officer Stu Greenslade. ➔

hours in the OMS, 194 hours in the Procedural Crew Trainer and 271 hours flown on 67 separate sorties. Twenty-six students graduated, with 27 instructors involved in their

training. Concurrent with MOAT training, 404 Squadron was involved with several domestic and international deployments, local proficiency flights and simulation

training - all while members often augmented other 14 Wing units.

As course graduates leave 404 Squadron, ready to employ their new skills on the

CP140 at home and abroad, a new course, MOAT 1901, is already in progress, continuing the cycle of training members for the best long range patrol aircrews in the world. ➔

## Wing reps join in Wolfville pride event

The Town of Wolfville raised the pride flag in a public celebration July 10, joined by volunteer ambassadors with 14 Wing Greenwood's Positive Space initiative. About 60 community members attended the event, held in conjunction with the weekly Wednesday evening farmers' market. Captain Arne Backhouse, a member of 14 Operational Support Squadron and the wing's coordinator for the Positive Space program, led a uniformed military contingent. They stood in uniform as the rainbow-coloured flag was raised, with Backhouse contributing to the formal presentation with a description of the Positive Space program.

It's vitally important all CAF members, whether LGBT or non-LGBT, are free to express who they are in a completely open manner." June 3, 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Mike Adamson actually raised the pride flag at the base's main gate for the first time, marking June as International Pride Month. "This, as you can imagine, was a big deal and was a very proud day," Backhouse said. "On behalf of the members of 14 Wing Greenwood and the Canadian Armed Forces, it is an absolute honour to be in beautiful and welcoming Wolfville today.

"All of us, whether members or non-members of the LGBTQ+ community, should strive to live up to what the colours in this flag represent: life, healing, sunlight, nature, serenity and spirit. It might go a long way to making this world a better and more inclusive place for everyone. Backhouse said after the Wolfville event military members spent time at the market meeting people also at the pride event and offering more information on Positive Space and its reach at 14 Wing Greenwood. "Although there were only five of us there in uniform, I believe we made a very large impression. We had many folks come up to us afterwards and thank us for being there and spreading the word of diversity and inclusion in the CAF. We have been invited back next year." ➔

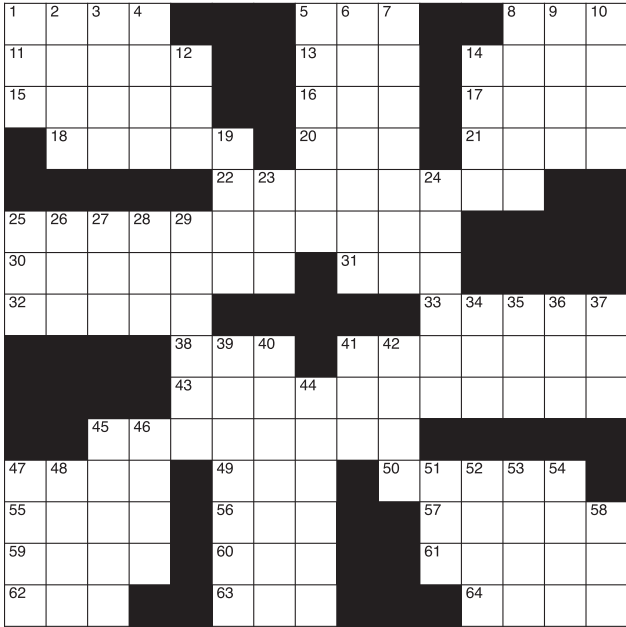

# Rescued pilot’s emotional Youtube video highlight’s SAR work

Search and rescue technician Master Corporal Nic Brouard likes Matt Lehtinen's Youtube video.

“It is rewarding and cool to see the other side of a rescue, and his shift in emotion from panic mode to, ‘I’m getting rescued,’ when he sees the Hercules fly over,” Brouard says.

One member of two crews of 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron, out of 14 Wing Greenwood, Brouard was one of two SAR-Techs who dropped into a crash scene “in the middle of Quebec” July 27, captured by Lehtinen in a vlog posted to Youtube “so people can learn from this experience, so something good comes out of this.

“I was losing oil pressure,” Lehtinen says, walk-

ing around the wreckage of his small plane and gathering supplies to start thinking about being rescued.

“Reality is setting in, this could be a while. The bugs are so bad. The smell of fuel is just thick. Gotta get some smoke up there....”

Lehtinen deployed a CAPS parachute from the rear of his plane as it slid into the forest 80 nautical miles northwest of Sept Iles just after 9 a.m. Eastern Time. A tree drove through the fuselage, across the seat beside him; he was uninjured, besides some scratches, and immediately set to work sending a rescue signal, lighting a fire to make smoke and draw attention to his plane's parachute entangled in the trees in the crash path.

With the emergency signal, the Halifax Joint Rescue Coordination Centre

dispatched the 413 Squadron Cormorant helicopter and Hercules aircraft, just after 11 a.m. ET.

“The Hercules showed up first and dropped a radio down,” Brouard said. “The guy found it, he could tell us he wasn't injured, we got there, dropped in, were maybe 15 minutes on scene, extracted him.

He did a lot of things right to help us.”

Brouard says the Hercules and Cormorant crews would call Lehtinen's rescue “simple,” compared to a couple even the week before jumping into a scene in Labrador or down to a boat.

“If he'd of been injured – whole different scenario.

The terrain was very steep, but he was able to help us, work with us, walk with us.”

From Lehtinen's perspective, “I was rescued... by Canadian Heroes.” As he messaged with his father, his voice broke with the news from his dad, “‘aircraft looking for you spotted the smoke.’

“Fantastic, baby! “Canadian Royal Air force, Mounted Police, law enforcement, search and rescue, air traffic control and Nav Canada. You are my heroes, and you saved my life – sincerely, a grateful American.” ➔

were long and required me to get a lot done.
