## Sew Team 6 on a mask-making mission

Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, production of non-medical masks became a top priority to enhance our public health measures at 14 Wing Greenwood. Our clothing tailor, Angela Vroom, and Canadian Armed Forces members – including Master Corporal Nadeau-Rivest (413 Squadron), Corporal Leistra (14 Air Maintenance Squadron), Corporal Hewko (14 Mission Support Squadron TEME), and those from 14 MSS Replenishment - all stepped up to accomplish the task!

As the production officer, my role was to set up a non-medical mask production

facility upstairs at 2 Hangar. An assembly line consisting of eight sewing machines, ironing boards and irons, and a section dedicated for material measurements and cutting, as established, all set up ensuring the minimum two metres' physical space between each work station. Add in a dedicated team or personnel, pulled from across 14 Wing, and, in no time, we were producing 500 non-medical masks each day - more than doubling the wing production in short order.

Two members who contributed to the establishment and operation of Sew Team 6 are Aviator Pelletier and Corporal Dowling. These two dedicated CAF members were on a mission, and nothing was going to get in their

way. Both of them showed up to an empty room and immediately set out to identify everything they needed to make this task successful, including the procurement of ironing boards, sergers, little craft scissors; you name it, they had it covered.

The members of the production team decided on the

name Sew Team 6; a clever play referencing the United States' famous SEAL Team Six. In the last seven weeks, this team has produced more than 7,000 non-medical masks; an incredible feat that has earned the recognition of the command team.

Without the incredible dedication and industry of all

members who contributed, including teams from 14 MSS, 14 AMS, 413 Squadron and, of course, Sew Team 6; we would not have so quickly achieved our goal of producing enough non-medical masks (over 12,000 to date) to be able to offer and sustain the three-masks-per-person necessary to bring people

back to the workplace safely. The effort has been a true testament to how members of the Canadian Armed Forces can adapt in order to succeed at any challenge, no matter how unique it may be. ➔

# Rose bed re-invigoration

A root rejuvenation is behind the first-ever replanting of the 14 Wing Greenwood commemorative rose garden, containing close to 50 rose bushes planted by former base and wing commanders from 1942.

Wing gardener Zacharia Gubbins is working on this challenging project: all the rose bushes were carefully removed from the bed just to the left of the main gate entrance and transported to Green Leaf Enterprises in Wilmot, where they're being housed and reinvigorated with a root compound. While the beds are empty,

Airfield and Grounds crew have taken out all the old structure, and reframed the space with a new, three-tier timbered setting. Once the soil is topped up, the rose bushes will return.

"They're all going to make it," Gubbins says confidently: his green thumb is responsible for all of the wing's beautification, including main gate and headquarters' gardens. Of the rose bed planting, "the weeds were plentiful and the roses were not doing so well. This is the first time a rejuvenation has ever been done."

As base and wing commanders complete their posting in Greenwood, they've each been invited to

# Video series takes virtual tour of work, life in Greenwood

Call it "Greenwood Earth."

14 Wing Greenwood is launching a series of video, virtual tours of base facilities, housing neighborhoods and community highlights. The project has been on the radar for a long time; in the days of COVID-19 travel and access restrictions, personnel, families and base visitors are flying blind as they look at limited house hunting tours while posting, on-base business contract work and delivery and what services may – or may – not be available, and how they look day-to-day.

The first three videos are "in the can," shot and edited by 14 Wing Imaging techs and available via links at CAFConnection.ca. Included in this first phase are tours of the Greenwood Military Family Resource Centre, Community Recreation and the Fitness and Sports Centre. More

videos will showcase the Residential Housing Units' neighbourhoods, as street views and home tours; driving tours of both the support and operational sides of the base, a look at nearby Greenwood and Kingston neighbourhoods and commercial districts, key locations near the base and just further afield, including "pinned" directions between points A and B; and finally, an aerial tour of the area, including the base, and nearby communities.

"Right now, there are families coming who've never been here – or it's been years since they were here last," says Deputy Wing Commander Lieutenant-Colonel Dale King. "Virtual or member-only house hunting trips are the options this posting season: the first time many folks will see the base is when they come with their moving truck."

The GMFRC is a must-visit place for military members and their families arriving

in the community, and has a solid inventory of maps, shopping tips, school information, services and resources. Accessing some of that has been affected by reduced access to the centre – and, more importantly – a chat with centre staff.

"We love to help you navigate your new home," says Margaret Reid, the GMFRC executive director. "Staff has stories of the best places to eat seafood, hike, pick apples, beachcomb, see a lighthouse and on it goes. We maintain a community database of

services and resources to help you connect in your new community."

Despite facility closures in recent weeks, the GMFRC remains responsive by phone, email and social media as staff work from home.

"Please do not hesitate

to reach out!" Reid says. "It won't be long until we can welcome you in person. We look forward to meeting you and making sure you are finding your way and uncovering all of the gems this posting has to offer."

King is pleased with the initial steps in this project, but knows there is more work ahead.

"It is spread out over phases, and Wing Imaging has the lead and is running with it," he says. "They're taking footage and adding pictures; then, they'll go back and update the videos with new imagery as facilities open again and there are people and programs to show. This will create a growing inventory of the wing to be added to and updated over the years to come."

Incoming families in particular will be provided the links to the video collection; they may also be found via the CAFConnection.ca website. ➔

Distance was evident June 14, as community representatives attended a commemorative service for Commonwealth airmen killed during Second World War training at RAF Greenwood, and remembered at the Old Holy Trinity Cemetery in Middleton.

While guests and spectators were distanced to respect COVID-19 limitations on public gatherings, those in attendance referenced the distance the lost airmen were from their homes and loved ones as they served, and died, so many years ago. International Order of Daughters of the Empire Rosemary Chapter hosted the decoration of the graves event, returning this year to a tradition its members initiated 78 years ago, in 1942.

"We had a telegraph message, asking to have flowers placed on one man's grave – the first man to be buried here," said IODE Chapter president Shelley Reycraft, welcoming guests and describing the origins of the service. Aircraftman 2nd Class Ivor George Badham,

from Wales, died in the Middleton hospital in 1942. His mother sent the letter to the IDOE, asking the ladies to look after her son's grave.

That care extended to 27 other airmen later buried at Old Holy Trinity, and another six at the Saint Lawrence Catholic Cemetery in Kingston. The first service was held in 1942, led by the IODE chapter. Royal Canadian Legion Middleton Branch 001 took on the ceremony in the 1960s; this year, with pandemic restrictions, the Legion could not lead the event, so the IODE planned the much-scaled down gathering.

Individual red roses and national flags were placed on the men's headstones, according to their homeland. A piper and

bugler beyond the cemetery fenceline added traditional service music. Representatives of the IDOE, Legion, Province of Nova Scotia and 14 Wing Greenwood all laid wreaths.

"This invitation is one we weren't going to turn down," 14 Wing Commander Colonel Brendan Cook said in his remarks, "even in troubling

times. We must take this time to remember.

"The graves here mark men, the best of a generation, lost when our world was in a time of crisis. These airmen died in training in a common purpose, a cause much bigger than themselves. They were selfless, bold and, most of all, they cared."

Cook asked those in atten-

dance to think about standing up and doing something for your nation and the world.

"Think of their moment of honour, and how we can best do that, too: selflessly, boldly and caring for all people."

Reycraft thanked everyone for attending, and for their support in ensuring this annual ceremony was uninterrupted.

"Like the postmaster, who's job is always done no matter the circumstances – that applies to us here tonight," she said. "We asked for permissions, we started planning and every one of you said, 'I will attend,' and 'What can I do?' We all appreciated your willingness to make this happen. ## 14 Wing-led SCAN at home ‘game changer’ for CAF member transition training

If you have ever been to a Second Career Assistance Network (SCAN) seminar, you will understand it is not enough to attend just one! The amount of information shared is a lot to consume. So, the earlier you are able to understand what resources and benefits are available to Canadian Armed Forces members and their families, the better prepared you will be for the eventual transition online.

May 27 and 28, 14 Wing Greenwood had the privilege of hosting the first ever virtual SCAN seminar. This inaugural event marked a leading change in developing a new format, allowing more flexibility for members and their spouses to access vital presentations, ask questions and get answers in real time - all from the comfort of their own home. This initiative has turned into a game-changer with how we plan SCAN seminars for the future, and I've been asked to tell you how it came to fruition.

My name is Lieutenant (Navy) Victoria Cluney. I am the 14 Wing personnel selection officer (WPSO), and I am additionally responsible for supporting 9 Wing Gander and 5 Wing Goose Bay. As per the usual spring schedule, I had three SCAN seminars lined up; however, the sweeping impact of COVID-19 rendered those plans impossible. As a “one-of” PSO, my

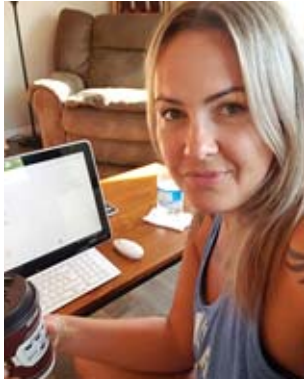
window of opportunity to plan and provide an event is already quite limited, so I knew rescheduling would be a challenge. After a few days of restlessness, I decided to reach out to Mark Tite, an Ottawa-based presenter who has been providing the CAF pension and benefits presentation for as long as I can remember. I explained I would like to offer the SCAN virtually, and was wondering

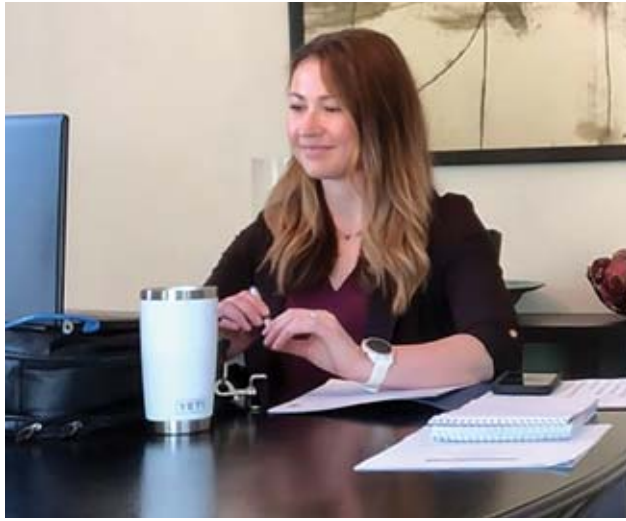

leaned in.”

Next, I ran two dress rehearsals the week prior to going live in order to make sure the presenters were comfortable using WebEx video conferencing. After the first day of rehearsals, I was honestly terrified. All of the “what-ifs” started running through my head and, with only one week left before the big day, we still had so much to do. However, after watching endless amounts of “WebEx tutorials” on YouTube and multiple meetings to fix audio and visual problems, everybody pulled through and the virtual SCAN Seminar went off almost flawlessly! We even had members join in from Kingston, Ontario; Gagetown, Halifax and as far as the United Kingdom! I have to send a special shout out to Cali Keating from the Greenwood Military Family Resource Centre, who went above and beyond to assist

- especially when it came to anything IT related.

The live event went better than I could have expected, and the feedback has been amazing! I was pretty confident this SCAN would be appreciated, but I didn't anticipate people would love this type of format as much as they did. I put a call out to attendees, asking for pictures of them enjoying the SCAN, and received photos of members sitting on their back deck soaking up the sun, walking while listening and hanging out in their living room with their kids in the background.

Due to COVID-19, there have been 23 SCAN seminars across the country cancelled. With no end in sight, the future of large-scale events is uncertain. An official, national roll out of this new virtual format will allow members to stay connected, stay informed, stay healthy - and stay the blazes home! ➔

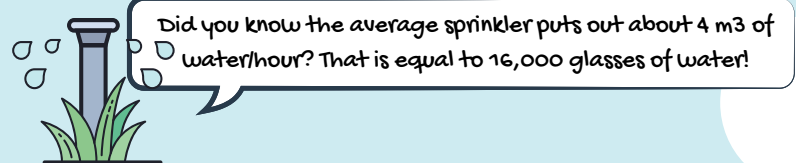

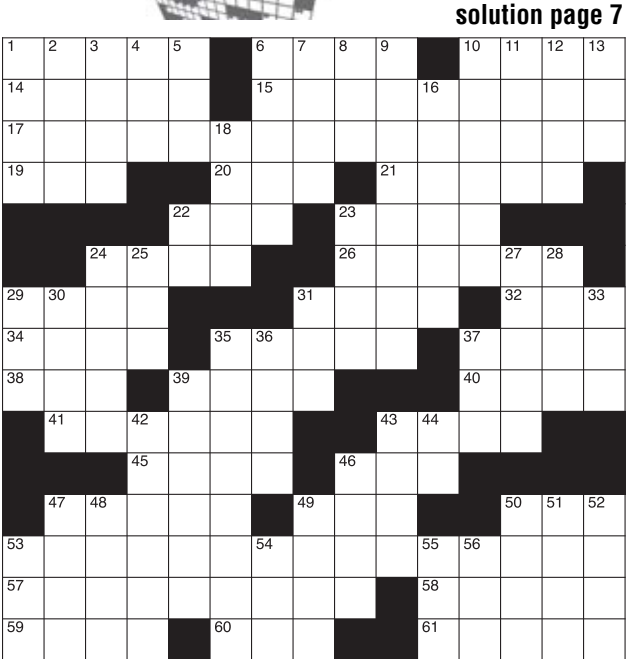

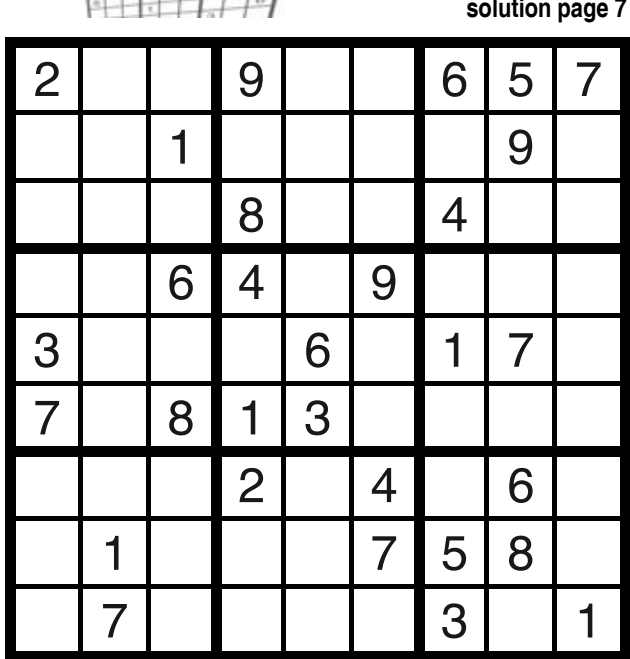
