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# Op NANOOK Working with Arctic partners

Operation NANOOK is a Northern sovereignty operation that features up to five annual Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) Arctic deployments. This gives the CAF the opportunity to train with a variety of organizations every year, including international military partners, other government departments and Canadian agencies, and territorial and Indigenous governments.

August was busy, as five warships, a replenishment vessel, and a United States Coast Guard cutter participate in a naval exercise that tested their basic war-fighting skills and ability to operate together in the harsh Northern environment. Working alongside Canadian personnel and assets were Denmark, France and the United States.

From 14 Wing Greenwood, 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron and 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron had the opportunity to participate in a scenario of anti-submarine warfare/ anti-surface warfare. The squadrons' CP140 Aurora crews were employed in a number of different ways, including submarine tracking, providing over-the-horizon targeting and performing battle

# Fall transition focus of wing's next effort

The COVID-19 challenges of spring and summer continue now into fall, as families make a major "transition" with students heading back to school. 14 Wing Greenwood leadership is well aware of the choices and, in some cases, stresses some of its personnel are facing. Wing Commander Colonel Cook emphasized "connectivity"

in his and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Dan Campbell's Facebook Live town hall August 21.

"Get the info you don't think you have," Cook said. "Ask. It's really, really important everyone works through the next few weeks into the fall and communicates."

Defence team members need to talk to their chain of command if there are on-going or new challenges around being in the work-

place or working from home, childcare, or school or home school decisions being made by their family.

"There are choices the chain of command can make to support you, but that can't happen without us talking to each other. The first week of September, our focus is to help you and your family go back to school; then, we look at the wing posture."

Approximately 300 wing workers on any given day

are still working from home, mostly with continuing childcare challenges; hundreds of others have returned to the base while, in some instances, sections and squadrons have operated at close to 10 per cent despite the "stay safe, stay home" push in March.

"I'll tell you up front: there is a whole lot of work that has to happen on this wing," Cook said. "We know that from how challenging it was for us to do

it into June. How can we adapt to help support you? It'll be exceptional circumstances we have to deal with now, so let's make sure they're informed decisions and help you down that road."

Cook compared the Nova Scotia back-to-school plan in pandemic times with wing and Canadian Armed Forces protocols, and urged people to either read the provincial 35-page document or, at least, the annex summary.

"That document has public health measures: if your child is sick, this is what you do. What happens if there's an outbreak in a school? There are back-up response plans in the back to school plan with details that may affect you. It's going to take a lot of flexibility to get through this, and a lot of patience from parents, but we will work with public health and schools, we will adapt as a wing, with the work we have to do, to support parents."

Campbell said COVID-19 has been an “epic test” of character and leadership, and military families’ “strength behind the uniform” has already shown itself through the pandemic’s early days.

“Military families are the backbone of everything we do – there is not a single time we’ve never thanked them,” Campbell said. “We can be innovative and support them, and make our community better.”

The men fully expect it will be an “unusual” fall.

“Strap in,” Cook said. “The wing as a whole, and the command team in particular, has gone through a lot of effort to do what we can to manage what has been a stressful experience for everyone. It’s been a challenge, and a good plan will continue to be challenged by circumstances as we go along.

“You’ve done exceptionally up to this point. We’re just asking you to do it again. We did not get here and do this well by accident.” ➔

damage assessments - all while providing the surface fleet with a comprehensive understanding of the battle space. This important function enhanced the fleet’s situational awareness and enabled improved decision making at all levels of command.

Normally, the CP140 and a crew would deploy to a location closer to the fleet – close to other nations’ air assets – but the Aurora demonstrated its flexibility and reach by operating out of 14 Wing throughout the operation. This dynamic made for some long days, but the cooperation and teamwork amongst our crews led to a high level of engagement and mission success. Every opportunity to work with allied nations, and our own Canadian Arctic partners, provides the Royal Canadian Air Force and 14 Wing Greenwood with valuable experience, and the opportunity to learn from one another. ➔

14 Wing Greenwood is criss-crossing the country – virtually – in this summer's online CAF Physical Activity Tour of Canada challenge. And, in the last week, the effort topped the leaderboard for participating bases and wings.

14 Wing Commander Colonel Brendan Cook hopes folks get in one last exercise push in the days before the challenge ends August 31. Logging every 15-minute increment of walking, running, hiking, cycling, weight training, boating, yoga, Zumba – and even backyard activity with kids – adds up to 15 kilometres of distance traveled. The online tracer plots individuals' and bases' results on a route map of Canada.

As of August 26, Greenwood had 78 participants who have put in 202,420 minutes

of training time since June 8. In the top-three mix are Kingston (150 participants, 195,545 minutes of training time) and Comox (60 participants, 68,600 minutes of training time).

"That's great," Cook said in a Facebook post August 25 to encourage a last-week effort. "But, did you know that the base or wing with the largest number of participants will win \$1,000 towards prizing of their choice from any Canadian retailer (to be managed locally by the base or wing senior manager PSP)?"

"CFB Kingston is about 7,000 training minutes behind us, but let's not sit back now and let them catch us. You have only until 31 Aug to log your times. They decide the winner once the results have

been tabulated September 2. So, for your own health, get out there and be active. And then, to show your pride in 14 Wing: log your time. Operate as One!"

On the individual leaderboard, as of August 26, top spot is held by Patrice Beauchamp, Kingston, with 47,464 kilometres of activity time logged. Right behind him is

The CAFPAT Challenge also counts towards the Canadian Armed Forces Aerobic Award of Excellence, where members' exercise time may count towards receiving a certificate and progressive recognition seals. ➔

# Retired Navigator shares how new recruits learn to soar

For Bert Campbell, it all started when his father, a Lancaster bomber navigator during the Second World War era, piqued young Campbell's interest in the air force.

Although he couldn't recall quite when the aviation bug bit him, Campbell says, "so, basically, all my life up until I joined [the military] I lived on air force bases and had been surrounded by the air force, so I figured, why not join the air force?"

So that's what he did.

In 1966, Campbell left home for Venture, British Columbia, where he would attend the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) Officer Basic Training and, later, become the youngest radio officer in the RCAF. From there, Campbell continued on to electronic systems aircrew training in Winnipeg

in 1967. By 1968, now-Major Campbell had become a member of 405 Squadron, which was integrated into the RCAF February 1, 1968. He would stay here for six years before transferring to 415 Squadron, then located in Summerside, Prince Edward Island. Campbell later returned to 405 Squadron in 1980 and, fast forward another eight years, found himself back at 415 Squadron, now in Greenwood.

With every high comes a low, and Campbell says his lows came when he would be deployed and have to leave his family behind. Despite the fact he enjoyed the adventure and the travel opportunity, Campbell says the hardest part was "in a lot of cases, not knowing when you're coming back." Campbell was never one to give up and, during his career, ended up travelling to upwards of eight countries, including most of Europe and the Middle East. One of the

highlights of his career was being posted to Iceland and seeing the Canadian aircraft that came through, as well as meeting prime ministers, along with military and civilian very important persons (VIPs). When asked how many countries he's been to, Campbell admits he hasn't counted: "[I've been to] Bermuda, I've been through the [United States], Iceland, Germany. Been to the United Arab Emirates, Kuwait, most of the European countries, Australia, Thailand; you name it, I've done a lot of them."

However, with responsibility and duty came many great skills. Campbell says the military has taught him things such as organization and comradeship. He also learned how to safely operate and navigate an airplane anywhere in the world, giving him the chance to not only travel but serve his country in the process. His friendships have always been the most rewarding thing he has

taken away from the military, saying, "you get basically to travel throughout Canada and sometimes to other places in the world and, in the military, you definitely form unique and, in some cases, lifelong bonds and friendships." He called the military "a band of brothers." To this day, many of the people Campbell met during his years of service are still in contact with him.

Campbell also experienced many firsts and lasts during his time in the RCAF: he was on the last operational flight of the CP107 Argus and witnessed the day when typewriters were exchanged for tablets and the digital world began taking shape.

"On our office desks, we had a telephone and a typewriter; that was it. Now, of course, you have computers and cellphones and tablets and what have you. So, there's been a number of changes that way as well."

Another example of these changes is the CP140 Aurora aircraft currently flown from 14 Wing Greenwood. The Aurora first took flight in the late 1970s, and later replaced the Argus due to having much more advanced equipment. However, the new advancements were no problem for Campbell, who says, "[technological advancements] weren't a challenge because of the way they were instituted. It was very gradual and it was done in a timely manner, so it was just gradually brought in and [it] enabled everyone, as they were learning these new technologies, to understand how they were going to

improve what they did - and what they are able to do."

To anyone interested in joining the military, Campbell says this: "the military is kind of a unique career.

"[It is] unlike most others, where you get to serve your country and, at the same time, learn very valuable skills you can use if you decide to leave the military for whatever reason."

He also stresses the importance of getting a university degree, now a requirement to become an officer.

"When I joined, I just required high school - it's called a direct entry, which only required a high school education to become an officer. Now, of course, you require a university degree to become an officer, so that certainly has changed."

Currently, Campbell passes his time at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum. He was appointed honorary colonel of 405 Squadron

in 2011, and held the role until 2017, when he passed it on to Heather Hemming. Campbell has participated in prestigious positions such as the Wing Commander's Excellence team in 1999, and he later joined the Reserves as wing heritage officer and museum general manager in 2003. It is things like this, Campbell notes, people are losing interest in.

"It seems that, as we carry on into the 21st century, more and more people seem to be less interested in volunteering, especially in the civilian world, where, for years, the military played an active role in local communities."

He hopes to see a change in this, and that people begin to volunteer again.

Campbell also recognizes the Air Cadet program in Canada.

"I have to give a full shout out to the Air Cadet program that Canada has, in that it's one of the - probably one of the most - unique organizations that certainly teaches young people skills, such as leadership and working as a team, and I hope that the program continues."

One thing is certain: where there is Bert Campbell, there is much to be learned. As long as he has a passion for sharing, his knowledge and legacy will always last. ➔

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## SAR crews over water, in the North

The Halifax-based Joint Rescue Coordination Centre August 6 tasked a 14 Wing Greenwood Cormorant helicopter, with 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron, while it was on a training flight to investigate an EPIRB sounding from the Digby harbor. The helicopter altered its flight around 9 p.m. to conduct a search, and returned to training shortly before 9:30 p.m. after completing the task.

August 12, Cormorant R911 was tasked just after 4 p.m. to assist a fishing vessel taking on water near Moncton. The helicopter landed back in Greenwood just after 6 p.m., after being stood down by JRCC.

August 14, R912 was tasked just after 3 p.m. to assist an overturned kayaker near the Confederation Bridge. It returned to 14 Wing to hot refuel, before proceeding on the tasking. The helicopter was stood down around 3:30 p.m.

August 14, JRCC tasked R912 again, just after 6 p.m., to provide assistance for an overturned canoe with two people on board in the vicinity of Liverpool Bay. The helicopter was airborne at 6:30 p.m., but stood down in the next hour to investigate an unknown emergency beacon sounding. The crew identified the source – a boat with a tarp on it, and determined nobody was in danger. The helicopter stood down, fueled in Yarmouth and returned to Greenwood before 10:30 p.m.

August 16, Hercules R343 left 14 Wing just after 5:30 a.m. to provide top cover for a Gander-based Cormorant conducting a medevac off a cargo ship, the Taiga Desgagnés, near Nain, Labrador. A 57-year-old man had suffered multiple seizures. The vessel was steaming towards Nain, planning to meet up with the Cormorant once in range. Just after 10 a.m., the Cormorant stopped in Nain to refuel, before heading offshore. Both the Gander Cormorant and Greenwood Hercules were on scene by 12:30 p.m. R904 airlifted the patient for transport to medical assistance, and Greenwood was released; both left the scene before 3 p.m.

August 18, just before 11:30 a.m., Hercules R343

was tasked to search for an overdue hunter, approximately 95 nautical miles northeast of Frobisher Bay. The 43-year-old man was expected back from a trip from a remote cabin. Terrain, and poor weather prevented local assets' immediate assistance, and extended the timeframe for potential distress. Additional search assets included the Canadian Coast Guard Henry Larsen's helicopter, tasked to search while en route to Frobisher Bay. Into the night, R343 landed in Wabush for crew rest and the CCG helo returned CCG Henry Larsen once out of crew day. From 103 Squadron in Gander, Corm R904 was tasked and completed a night search of the area and returned to Iqaluit, as a 413 Squadron Hercules transported a second Cormorant crew from Greenwood to ensure mission continuity into August 19. CASARA also added two spotters to help search from dawn, and a 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron Aurora was tasked to add sensor search capability. With the combined effort of a smaller Twin Otter and the Aurora, the hunter was located. The Aurora stayed on scene for three hours, as a helicopter returned to pick up the hunter. Greenwood aircraft returned around 11:30 p.m.

August 20, Cormorant R911 left Greenwood just after 6 p.m. to assist in the rescue and transport of a 45-year-old woman at the bottom of a ravine near Five Islands. Around 7:30 p.m., the helicopter transferred her to hospital in Truro, returning to base around 9:30 p.m.

August 23, just before 1:30 a.m., Hercules R344 was tasked to search for an overdue vessel northeast of Goose Bay, and was airborne just before 3:30 a.m. Around 8:30 a.m., R904 out of Gander located the vessel and its occupants on a small island within the search area. All individuals were OK: they had run low on fuel and visibility was poor, and they had decided to stay the night to avoid getting lost in the fog and running out of fuel. R904 transported one of the people back to Postville, and all assets stood down. R344 landed in Greenwood just after 10 a.m. ➔
