# Legions plan for poppy campaign, November 11

## Public encouraged to support poppy campaign, take time to remember

Remembrance Day and all activities around traditional November 11 services and events look different in 2020 due to COVID-19 public health guidance, but the message remains the same.

October 23, Kingston Royal Canadian Legion Branch 098 Alvin H. Foster representatives presented their first poppies of the annual Poppy Campaign to 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Brendan Cook and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Dan Campbell. The official campaign runs October 30 to November 11. Legion members invite community friends to support the effort to see red poppies pinned to as many folks' lapels as possible, as

the visible symbol of remembrance takes on extra weight this year.

"There will be no Remembrance Day parade, no banquet, nothing in schools, nothing at the veterans' unit at Soldiers Memorial Hospital, no service organization talks," says Kingston branch president Al Peterson. "People can't attend anything, and we can't go to them. We're going to try and do an outdoor, invitation-only service November 11 and Livestream it.

"This hurts us. We're not going to get the funds for our poppy trust fund, and we need that for our veterans and their families."

Peterson says Legions across Canada are encouraging people who may have attended in-person services

in their own communities in the past to watch the national television broadcast November 11 from Ottawa.

Kingston second vice-president Peter Kirkpatrick, also the branch's Poppy Campaign chairman, says everything poppy funds supports "is visible proof of our motto: 'We Serve.' This year's poppy stands will all be on the honour system except for one, at the Greenwood Mall.

"Businesses I've visited in Kingston and area have all said they will watch our poppy donation boxes and displays for us, and they're supporting the Legion with

wreath donations – sometimes what we've received in the past, but sometimes more."

The Kentville Branch 006 Legion has also cancelled its public November 11 service. A closed service and online event will be held instead, and the Legion is encouraging those who have laid wreathes in the past, or who would like to this year, to contact the branch. Volunteers will ensure it happens on supporters' behalf.

In Berwick, Royal Canadian Legion Branch Ortona 69 President Peter Rigby says there will not be a community parade November 11,

but a small service will be held at the cenotaph at 11 a.m., including the Last Post and Revellie and the laying of key wreaths representing the Government of Canada, the province and the Legion. In the meantime, there will be no manned poppy donation stands; a number of businesses have offered to display poppy donation boxes in support of the Legion. The public is encouraged to use these, or visit the Legion itself during regular hours Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

14 Wing's Cook and Campbell have been working with Valley Legions to meet any requests for Canadian Armed

Forces' representation at this year's modified events.

"We will be keeping it small, but we will be there to join you," Cook said October 23, as he accepted his poppy from Kingston Legionnaires. "We will have a few small teams going out to our cenotaphs and services, but nothing like the bus loads of members we'd typically be sending out."

The base's Annapolis Mess plans to broadcast the national televised Ottawa service, inviting mess members to come in.

"It won't be the same," Cook said, "but we'll do what we can." ➔

# Partners mark milestone in green energy, environmental savings

With green initiatives adding up to 1.7 million kilowatt hours of savings – a 1,000-tonne reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, equivalent to taking 260 houses “off the grid” – 14 Wing Greenwood has marked the first milestone in its Energy Performance Contract work.

Efficiency Nova Scotia presented a cheque October 19, representing the financial savings, \$201,080, to 14 Wing Deputy Wing Commander Lieutenant-Colonel Dale King and Real Property Operations Unit (Atlantic) Lieutenant-Colonel Bryan Mialkowski. As the projects at 14 Wing, and also at 5th Canadian Division Support Base Detachment Aldershot, proceed over the next nine years, the savings will increase: to as much as an annual energy cost reduction at the wing of \$898,000, or 13 per cent, and lower greenhouse gas emissions by close to 7,500 tonnes CO2 equivalent per year.

“This is a partnered project,” Mialkowski said. “We couldn’t do it ourselves.”

RP Ops (Greenwood) looks after the base infrastructure – all the roads, buildings and

fixed equipment. With partners at 14 Wing, including Defence Construction Canada and contractors MCW Custom Energy Solutions, the Energy Performance Contract success so far is helping the Government of Canada meet climate change goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from buildings and operations.

“The government has to make targets; the Canadian Armed Forces, RP Ops and Nova Scotia all have to meet targets. This is an important program that has to happen for all of us, and we have DCC and MCW to help us as a partnership. Now we see this first cheque: it shows everyone on base is working together. It’s not just infrastructure work to make sure this all works.”

King said 14 Wing personnel have been hearing about the green projects over the past year, and this event highlights “why we’re doing it.”

“There are the savings we’re aiming for, but 23 buildings are now complete, with 60 ongoing. That’s phenomenal work between the wing and Aldershot. And, it’s hard to believe just three 14 Wing buildings – the Birchall, the gym and the Annapolis Mess – have amounted

# Mighty Hercules turns 60

When the engineers and designers at Lockheed created the Hercules aircraft in the 1950s, it's doubtful they had any idea how versatile and iconic the plane would turn out to be within the Royal Canadian Air Force.

In 1960, 435 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron received the first operational B-Model Hercules for the RCAF. The squadron still flies the updated H-model today.

"The Hercules is an absolutely work horse," says Lieutenant-Colonel Art Jordan, commanding officer of 435 Squadron. "Built to function in regular and austere environments, this aircraft has been an amazing asset to the RCAF fleet."

The planes are primarily used for search and rescue, as they are at 14 Wing Greenwood, and air-to-air refueling, but they can be called upon

for a variety of transport roles. Its design, with a huge back door that opens up the full cargo department, allows for a wide array of cargo to be carried.

"These planes have literally been around the world

and have just about carried anything, everywhere. On countless United Nations and NATO missions, into Afghanistan over the 10 years of that conflict and into the high Arctic, they can - and have - carried everything from tanks

and planes to soldiers and evacuees," says Jordan.

The Hercules' original role was to be a long range cargo carrying aircraft to replace the CC119 flying boxcar. One of its first jobs was transporting the CF104 fighter aircraft

from Canada, as they were built, to Canadian bases in Europe.

"That original role is interesting, considering that 435 Squadron is now a tactical air-to-air refueling squadron supporting the fighter forces," Jordan says. "The genesis of the Hercules in Canada started with support to the fighter force, and now we continue to do that in different ways 60 years later."

Over time, the aircraft evolved into the search and rescue platform it is best known for today, all the while continuing with diverse tasking at home and around the world.

"We have members with us now whose fathers, and even grandfathers, flew with the RCAF in the Hercules - including me" says Jordan.

As the Hercules' role in the RCAF has evolved over the

past 60 years, it will continue to change moving forward. With the arrival of the new CC295 search and rescue aircraft into the RCAF fleet, the SAR role will evolve, with change expected beginning in summer of 2021. Air-to-air refueling will still take place, as will transport work as required.

"Our role will not change, but our span of responsibility will actually get bigger," says Jordan.

The RCAF celebrated the 60th birthday of the "Mighty Hercules" at 17 Wing Winnipeg October 13, with a fly past over Winnipeg with the Hercules, followed by F18 fighter aircraft the Hercules has the capability to refuel in-flight. It also demonstrated search and rescue streamer drops at Beaudry Park and SAR jumps to the Winnipeg Airport. ➔

## Students remember servicemen at Middleton cemetery service November 5

November 5, a small group of Grade 9 students will place red poppy markers on 24 servicemen's graves, remembering a sacrifice made decades ago.

This is the second year Middleton Regional High School students will take part in the national No Stone Left Alone project, organized locally by resident John MacEachern. The initiative ensures the sacrifice and service of Canada's military is remembered, with students placing poppies on the headstones of veterans every November. Here in the Annapolis Valley, youth will mark the 24 graves of Commonwealth airmen killed while training at the Greenwood base during the Second World War and afterward. They were buried far from their own homes across Canada, and from England, Australia and New Zealand; in the Middleton Old Holy Trinity Cemetery.

Seventeen students will walk from MRHS to Old Holy Trinity Cemetery for their 2:30 p.m. ceremony. A limited number of spectators can be accommodated, to the gathering limits in

outdoor spaces set by public health to prevent the spread of COVID-19. All participants and spectators will need to wear a non-medical face mask, and ensure two-metre physical distancing from one another.

In 2019, 12,297 students from 127 schools placed 64,503 poppies in 121 cemeteries. 2020 marks the 10th commemoration ceremony for the No Stone Left Alone Memorial Foundation. It invites anyone interested to join in a November 5 service (10:30 a.m. MST) via a live stream from Beechmount Cemetery in Edmonton, the birthplace of No Stone Left Alone, at [globalnews.ca](http://globalnews.ca) and the No Stone Left Alone Facebook page. For information, visit [nostoneleftalone.ca](http://nostoneleftalone.ca). ➔







## CISM men's volleyball team manager position available
