# Campground comes with looong spring cleaning list

Tim McLean is deep into a spring cleaning like no other, preparing to open the Lake Pleasant Campground for summer company.

Just a few week's into his new job – "I still have that new campground manager smell," McLean has already experienced no running water or power, cold water showers, a burst septic tank check valve, getting to know the resident Canadian geese; but, also, glowing red-sky-at-night sunsets over the water, the early-bird campers who

pitch in on almost any handy-man job, and great sleeps after crossing item after item off his to-do list.

"I have a pretty extensive list - in my head, and more on paper; and it's all prioritized," McLean says. "We started campground bookings May 1, and that's been going well. It's just, between now and when we open May 20, to get everything done before 'company comes.' It's rewarding every time we get something else done."

The seasonal Lake Pleasant Campground in Springfield is owned by 14 Wing Greenwood and operated by the

Personnel Support Program as a morale and wellness amenity for military families, affiliated veterans and others, and the public. With 60 seasonal sites, 10 rental cabins and 40 overnight sites; plus a new main lodge, wash-room and shower blocks, playground space, docks and water frontage, McLean's list to shake off winter and make site improvements is basically like looking after "10 houses, 100 lots, and three kilometres of water and electrical lines.

"I'd seen the campground manager job open in 2020, and thought it would be a

great job. When I saw it come up again in December, I put my all into it," McLean says.

The timing was good, the opportunity interested McLean, and he was hired for the role - just as he was considering retiring - at 39 - from a 20-plus year in the Royal Canadian Air Force as an aerospace control operator.

"I joined September 19, 2001 – eight days after September 11," McLean says. "I was in Woodstock, New Brunswick working for a company building fire trucks and volunteering as a firefighter. My Dad dropped the hint to join the military. I

went to Gagetown looking to join as a military firefighter, but the trade was closed. They said AC Ops was open, and I said, 'Yup.' They asked me did I want to think about it, and I said, 'Nope.' I'd just turned 19, none of my buddies were joining the military and they told me I'd be working in an air traffic control tower directing planes all day."

Hah – his first posting after basic training was to "the hole," a NORAD complex 600 feet below the ground in North Bay. He joined the auxiliary firefighter underground force and spent seven

years NOT in a tower poking the sky.

From North Bay, he was posted to Anchorage, a great experience for four years, where he logged 500 hours flying in the American Air Force's Airborne Warning And Control System (AWACS), intercepting Russian aircraft in the North. He was on the first and only NORAD Nijmegen marching team in 2010, returned to North Bay in 2012 where, in 2014, he became the wing chief warrant officer's assistant. In 2017, he posted to Panama

City, Florida as a unit warrant officer and, two weeks after his daughter was born in 2018, Hurricane Michael forced a move to Mississippi. Shortly after that disruption, he returned to North Bay. Promoted to master warrant officer, he was offered a posting to Bagotville, but he was considering his time

in the service and new opportunities: the Lake Pleasant Campground manager role re-opened.

“I retired from the military March 27, 2022, and got this job on the 28<sup>th</sup>.”

He admits a technical career is a bit of a challenge to bring into his new “jack-of-all-trades” campground work but, in just a few short weeks, he’s taken any experi-

ence gained working around his own home over the years and ramped it all up to tackle campground-scale plumbing, electrical, carpentry and site work.

“I started here March 29 – and it’s been challenging, sure. Every day is like a pop-up book: I turn a page and see what pops up to be done. But, there are lots of people here to help.”

Seasonal campground staff have been returning to pitch in on spring repairs and cleaning, and bookings are underway for the May 20 opening. Seasonal campers are also coming in to clean up their own sites, many willing to turn an extra hand to McLean’s list. 14 Wing Greenwood’s emergency response team is conducting a training onsite May 9 to 13, meaning

many downed trees will be cleared and several surplus outbuildings will be removed.

Come May 20, the social begins: darts and maybe bingo and breakfasts in the lodge, canoe rentals, a June 4 fishing derby, outdoor movie nights, a July 1 event, community bonfire evenings and more throughout the season, until the end of September. McLean’s own family makes

the move from North Bay to Greenwood in early June.

## Greenwood marks loss of familiar, respected, dedicated Graham

April 30, a well-known face around almost all parts of 14 Wing Greenwood, and the wider community, died.

Major (retired) Lloyd Graham, 84, of Berwick; retired from a 39-and-a-half year career with the Royal Canadian Air Force in Greenwood, after joining the military at the age of 19 in Alberta. He was presented the Officer of the Order of Military Merit and the Canadian Forces Decoration, and moved with his wife, Mary-Lou, and their family through five provinces throughout his career. He went on to serve as the honorary colonel for 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron from 2008 for four-plus years, was active at St. Mark’s Protestant Chapel and with VP International, and was a longtime volunteer at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum.

The museum’s Flight Education program, with Graham at the helm since 2002, introduced 10,000 Grade 6 students over the years to the science of flight, CFB Greenwood history, military technology, trades and operations; all tied closely to the students’ curriculum and delivered by a dedicated team of museum volunteers.

“I’ve known Lloyd and Mary-Lou for the better part of 15 years, stemming from my time at Maritime Patrol and Evaluation Unit, as the commanding officer of 405 Squadron and, now, as wing commander,” says Colonel Brendan Cook. “Over all that time, I have been continually impressed by Lloyd and Mary-Lou’s selfless dedication to the wing and our local community. I, and past wing commanders, often had discussions with Lloyd, seeking his advice and experience, and he was always willing to go the extra mile to assist this wing.

“14 Wing has lost a dear friend and supporter, and we extend are deepest condolences to Mary-Lou and family. On a personal note, Cathy and I will miss his friendship and mentorship.”

Former 14 Wing chief warrant officer and current 1 Canadian Air Division Chief Warrant Officer Dan Campbell, with his wife, Sonya, said Graham and Mary-Lou were two of the first people they met when they themselves arrived in Greenwood.

“Such a kind and caring gentleman is how we would best describe Lloyd. The Grams have made a long and lasting impact on 14 Wing

Greenwood and VP International,” and Graham will be sorely missed. “Thank you for your service, and for your contributions to Greenwood.”

Colonel (retired) Jim Irvine was 14 Wing commander from 2010 to 2012, and described Graham as “larger than life.

“A real story teller and an exceptional gentleman. He taught me a lot about life, the air force, our maritime air heritage, and about how to lead with integrity. The loss of a legend.”

Former commanding officer of 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron Colonel (retired) Ray

Townsend extended condolences to Graham’s family, recognizing Graham’s role from 2008 as the squadron’s honorary colonel for over four years.

“Lloyd was a wonderful supporter of the RCAF and the ‘Thundering Herd’ and, with Mary-Lou, they were a feature at any social event. He was a fine man and his character will be missed by many.”

A public celebration of Graham’s life will be held May 24 at the Annapolis Mess at 14 Wing Greenwood, and he will be interred at Beechwood National Military Cemetery in Ottawa at a later date. ➔

From Mountain Park, Alberta, Lloyd knew from childhood that he was destined for a career in aviation. He joined the military at 18 and married his sweetie, Mary-Lou, at 24. They raised their children in 5 provinces and settled in Nova Scotia after retirement.

Lloyd spent 39 ½ years serving Canada in the RCAF and dedicated an unimaginable number of hours to organizations close to his heart – Greenwood Military Aviation Museum, VP International, Lake George Property Owners Society, St. Mark’s Chapel and the Canadian Cancer Society. He spent four tours as a member of the “Thundering Herd” at 404 Squadron and considered it a privilege to be appointed their Honorary Colonel in 2008 for 4½ years. His awards include the Order of Military Merit, a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Canadian Cancer Society and the Remarkable Seniors Award from the Province of Nova Scotia. He was a legendary crud player, a remarkable whistler, a novice ukulele enthusiast and an epic storyteller. He will be missed immensely by all whose lives he touched.

Heartfelt thanks go to his team of doctors and nurses at the Valley Regional Hospital for the exceptional care he received.

**Martini épicé à l'avocat**  
Temps de préparation: 1 h  
Temps de cuisson: 10 min  
Portions: 2  
**Ingédients**

- Martini
- 2 oz de gin
- 1 1/2 oz de vermouth sec
- 1/2 oz de sirop épicé infusé à l'avocat du Mexique
- 1/2 oz de jus de lime
- 1 oz de soda nature (Club Soda)
- Tajin à la lime\* ou poudre de piment mexicain ou piment plus fort au goût pour garnir le verre.
- Quartier de lime ou tranche d'avocat pour garnir le verre, au goût.

**Sirop d'avocat**

- 250 ml (1 tasse) de sucre
- 250 ml (1 tasse) d'eau
- 1 ml (1/4 c. à thé) de poudre de chili
- 1 gros avocat du Mexique légèrement écrasé à la fourchette, non en purée.

**Méthode**

- Pour faire le sirop, mélanger le sucre, l'eau, la poudre de chili et l'avocat du Mexique dans une petite casserole à feu moyen jusqu'à ce que le sucre se dissolve et que le liquide atteigne une légère ébullition.

lition. Retirer du feu et laisser infuser pendant 30 minutes à 1 heure. Filtrer et refroidir complètement. Conserver dans un contenant hermétiquement fermé au réfrigérateur jusqu'à utilisation. Se conserve jusqu'à une semaine.

- Passer un quartier de lime sur le bord de chaque verre et tremper le bord du verre légèrement dans la poudre de chili pour l'enrober. Mettre de côté.

- Dans un mixeur à martini, mélanger le gin, le vermouth, le sirop d'avocat épicé, le jus de lime et la poudre de chili au goût. Verser dans un verre à martini et compléter avec du club soda. Garnir de tranches de lime ou d'avocat et servir.

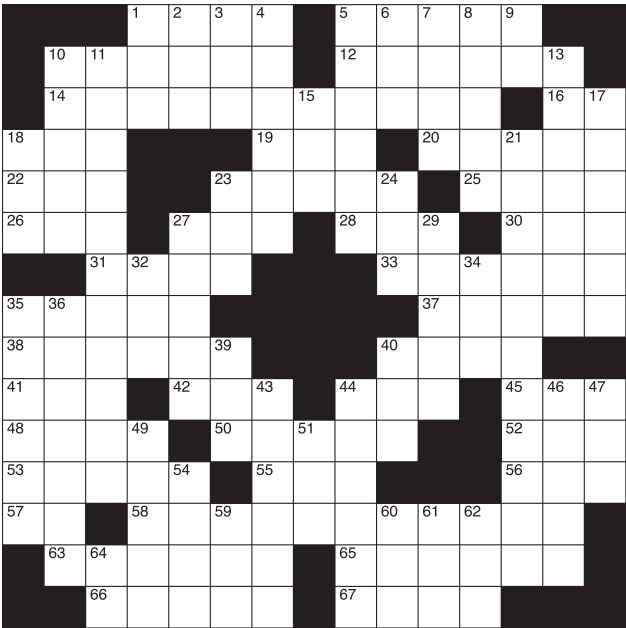

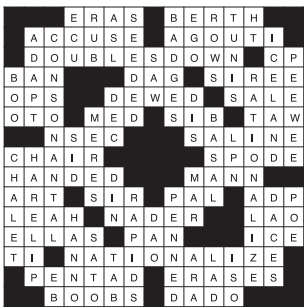
