Poppy season sign of shared remembrance

Trevor Campbell was excited October 20, honoured to be making the first presentation of a 2023 poppy to the 14 Wing Greenwood command team. But, not as honoured as Commander Colonel Jeff Davis and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Jonathan Proulx were to welcome representatives of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 098 Alvin H. Foster Kingston to the base.

In 30 years as a Legion

member, Campbell, currently Branch 098's second vice-president, had never chaired the Poppy Campaign before the 2022 campaign; working at Soldiers Memorial Hospital in Middleton for that year's formal poppy presentation to 14 Wing leadership, he was pleased to be in attendance this year, with branch president Sergeant (retired) Weldon Rideout and Major (retired) Carol Molyneux.

"2022 was very successful," Campbell said. "I was so nervous – it was my first, but

people were waiting to return to the poppy campaign and Remembrance Day activities after two years of the pandemic. And, last year was one of the most beautiful days of the year – Greenwood was the temperature hot spot in all of Canada."

The Kingston Legion was happy to provide poppies to the community in 2022, and has been busy through the past year turning \$28,000 in poppy donations into programs and services for local veterans.

"We don't sell poppies,"

Rideout said. "It's not about raising money for the Legion – it's all donation, and the whole campaign is about awareness, for veterans."

Twenty-two thousand poppies are now being provided to Western Kings and Eastern Annapolis county communities. A work party at the Legion in mid-October packed the poppies, and cleaned and labelled hundreds of distribution boxes, destined for retail and business locations, schools and community settings. The Legion itself, with the support

of volunteers and members of 517 Flight Lieutenant McLean Royal Canadian Air Cadets, which the Legion sponsors; will tend more substantial poppy stations and displays.

"This year's season is coming together," Campbell said.

Two thousand poppies – plus the two for Davis and Proulx – were delivered October 20 to 14 Wing. Canadian Armed Forces members will wear the poppy as part of their daily uniform from the last Friday in October, this year, October 27, through to

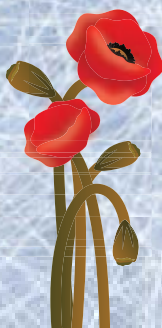
November 11.

"Thank you for coming," Davis said to the Legion contingent October 20, "and we'll see you a number of times over the next couple of weeks."

14 Wing Greenwood supports over a dozen community remembrance activities, including formal parades at cenotaphs throughout Western Nova Scotia. Members are also volunteering informally at schools, churches and community programs; and through the National Veterans' Week Speakers Program. ➔

Deep dive on Lake Pleasant

On a bright and sunny October 3, search and rescue technicians from 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron conducted a dive exercise at the 14 Wing Greenwood-owned Lake Pleasant Campground in Springfield.

This was the only serial to use Lake Pleasant and provided an opportunity to clean up some neglected litter on the lake bottom while providing exposure to the unique challenges posed by freshwater dives.

“It allows the divers a chance to work with the dive equipment and ensure that they keep their skills sharp in case it is needed for a dive tasking,” said Sergeant Calvin Slute.

In spite of the clear weather on the surface, visibility was “murky,” according to Slute.

“As soon as you pick up a piece of garbage or touch the bottom at all, the visibility that you did have goes down to zero.”

Even with the poor visibility, Slute added, “we did find quite a bit of garbage - the most inter-

esting things being a ladder and some old tires.”

As one of two required dive exercises per year, there was much more to accomplish than solely cleaning up the lake bottom. Ensuring comfort and familiarity with all of their equipment is critical to keep everyone’s skills sharp in the event of a dive tasking.

Following the exercise at Lake Pleasant, the SAR-Techs moved on to Port Mouton for two days of ocean dive training to further hone their skills. ➔

15th HFX a global look at multi-front war on democracy, civilization

HFX president Peter Van Praagh October 17 released the topical agenda for the 15th Halifax International Security Forum November 17 to 19 in Halifax. Discussions will include conversations with political and military leaders from Israel, Ukraine, Taiwan, the United States, Canada and more than 60 global democracies, together with champions of freedom from Russia, Iran, Venezuela, Afghanistan and Hong Kong.

“The October 7 Hamas terrorist attacks that intentionally targeted entire families, senior citizens, unarmed men, women, children and babies for being Israeli and being Jewish was a disgrace to civilized humanity, including all peace-loving Arabs,” Van Praagh said. “It was also the opening of a new front of a global confrontation against democracy and civilization.”

“Putin’s Russia started this violent new era of global confrontation against civilization when it attacked its peaceful democratic neighbor Ukraine on February 24, 2022. But, as a result of President Zelenskyy’s inspiring leadership,

the courage of the Ukrainian people and the generosity of the world’s democracies, Putin is desperate.

“Now Putin is working to shift the world’s democracies’ attention - and their generous support for Ukraine - to other theatres.”

Weapons in this multi-front conflict include modern technologies weaponized for malevolent purposes, social media influences on global public opinion and shocking violence against civilians. All of this is taking place while some individuals and political parties inside democracies challenge long-established democratic rules.

“At this time, moral clarity is more important than ever, and the 15th anniversary agenda reflects this important truth.”

Plenary on-the-record sessions include Make the World Safe Again: Victory in Ukraine, including several sub-topics on implications for victory for Israel, messaging for the “CRINKs” (China/ Russia/ Iran/ North Korea), Indo-Pacific possibilities, feeding the world, allies’ access to innovation and climate cooperation.

Informal off-the-record sessions include new topics, or have been chosen for a revisit from the HFX 15-year discussion, emphasizing areas that still require serious attention from the democratic community of nations: Ancient Antisemitism Arrives Again,

AI: Awesome Initiative or Apocalypse Impending?, Arctic Security in a Time of Thaw, Beyond Borders: Transnational Trafficking and Crime, A Conversation on Afghanistan, Iran: What Do We Do?, Israel Is Real, Let My People Go: Keeping Faith With Our Hos-

tages And Ourselves, NATO: Necessary, No More Loyalty Tests: A New Era for Global Democracies, Public Opinion: Mobilizing the Key Strategic Asset, Rapprochement With Russia: Post-Putin Prep, Terrorism: What’s Next?, Trade as a Weapon: The Art of Eco-

nomie Statecraft and Ukraine’s Plan: Survival, Revival, Arrival. The annual Halifax International Security Forum is hosted by Canada’s Minister of National Defence. HFX receives financial support from the Government of Canada, NATO and Club HFX. ➔

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Inherent danger not far from memory

404 Squadron marks 70th anniversary of crew loss close to home

October 6 at 10 a.m., a small group gathered at a small black stone beside the VPI building in the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum's Memorial Gardens. This stone has been hidden from casual view due to an overgrowth of greenery, which Real Property Operations kindly recently cleared away.

2023 marks the 25th year of the museum's Memorial Garden. In 1998, 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron erected an initial stone, which sits opposite the T-Bird on display outside the front gate, on the crest of the hill next to the VP International building. Since then, more memorials by all the squadrons on the wing have been installed.

In 1998, the wing was considering building a skateboard

park beside the Community Centre on Church Street, when someone lodged a complaint. Apparently, the gentleman was the son of an aviator who perished in a plane crash on the site, and he objected to the intended purpose for the area. Since the aircraft was a 404 aircraft, as the 404 historian, I was tasked with researching the accident so an informed decision could be made about the fate of the future skate park.

The first task was to find out what happened. There were many stories that came in after the request for information went out, but the best source was going to be the Flight Safety Incident Report. Fortunately, when an aircraft is retired, all documentation regarding the airframe (including flight safety reports) are sent to the National Archives in Ottawa. After a number of emails and phone calls, I was able to get

photocopies of the handwritten report. The RCAF has become much more efficient at these reports since then, but there were only hand-drawn pictures and no photographs in this report.

According to the report, October 9, 1953, 404 Squadron was tasked with a test flight on Lancaster FM115 for its radio compass. With five crew on board, just after takeoff, the aircraft experienced the catastrophic loss of engine #1 (port side). With full throttle on all remaining engines and only one functioning engine on the port side, the plane began a steep banking left-hand turn as the

pilot wrestled to get the plane back to the airfield. Witnesses claim he was able to avoid the AVM Morfee school, in the centre of the military housing neighbourhood (the Morfee building still stands today), possibly saving the young lives of those who were in class at the time.

Unfortunately, the pilot was unable to recover the aircraft. It passed over #7 and #8 hangers, clearing them by a mere 20 to 50 feet, then passed so low over the CANEX parking lot, at almost 90° of bank, the wing tip severed the power lines coming into the base, stopping all the base clocks at 1127 hours - the

moment just prior to impact. The aircraft cartwheeled on impact, spreading material over a large swath the length of Church Street, near where the outdoor pools are located, as the engines were torn from their mounts and the wings were ripped from the fuselage. Due to its remaining fuel load, the resulting fire burned so hot, responders couldn't get close enough to extinguish the flames. By the time they were able to put out the fire, the remainder of the fuselage had melted to an unrecognizable pile of metal. All the crew on-board were lost in the accident. The flight safety investigation


was able to recover the four engines, torn off their mounts on impact. Upon inspection, #1 was found to have a large amount of metal fragments in its filter, a sign of bearing failure and likely the cause of the loss of that engine, at the worst possible time.

After reviewing the facts, 404 Squadron decided, although the initial impact was likely near where the skateboard park was eventually built, the final resting site of the crash was most likely between where the playground stands today and the PMQ gate, so there was no conflict for the new skate park. The squadron decided to have a memorial stone installed overlooking the crash site to remember the aircrew and technicians who gave their lives that day in the performance of their duties. Those members were Flight Officer Pegues (pilot), Flight Sergeant Klang (technician), Corporal Guerin (flight engineer), Corporal Cardoso and LAC Green (observers).

The stone was consecrated during a VP International memorial service by the main gate and then re-located to its current position on the hill, where it now rests.

This most recent gathering re-dedicated the Lancaster memorial in its 25th year and the 70th anniversary of the accident. On hand were a small contingent from 404 Squadron and the 14 Wing command team, remembering past sacrifices and reminding all our occupation is inherently dangerous, whether deployed or at home.

As we approach the 100th anniversary of the RCAF in 2024, please take a moment to visit the museum's Memorial Garden and remember the sacrifices of those who have gone before. ➔




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Online database to make Defence conduct, culture research and policies accessible

An online Conduct and Culture Research and Policy Database launched October 5, making research and policies related to sexual harassment and misconduct, gender, sexual orientation, race, diversity and inclusion, and culture change more accessible to members of the Department of National Defence (DND) and Canadian Armed Forces (CAF), and the public.

The database is in response to Recommendation #45 in the Report of the Independent External Comprehensive Review (IECR), led by former Supreme Court Justice Louise Arbour. It lists approximately 70 research papers and provides links to 80 policies and directives. Topics currently covered in the database include sexual harassment and mis-

conduct, diversity and inclusion, military-to-civilian transition, mental and physical health, 2SLGBTQIA+, Indigenous Peoples, gender, recruitment, women in the military, early training environments and organizational culture. The database will be updated regularly.

Arbour emphasized scientists and culture experts working inside DND/ CAF should increase their collaboration with external experts. Making internal research and policies more readily available will bolster DND/ CAF efforts by enabling stakeholders and academics to collaborate with DND/ CAF on culture change and identify areas where data or information is limited or unavailable, as well as gaps and weaknesses. ➔



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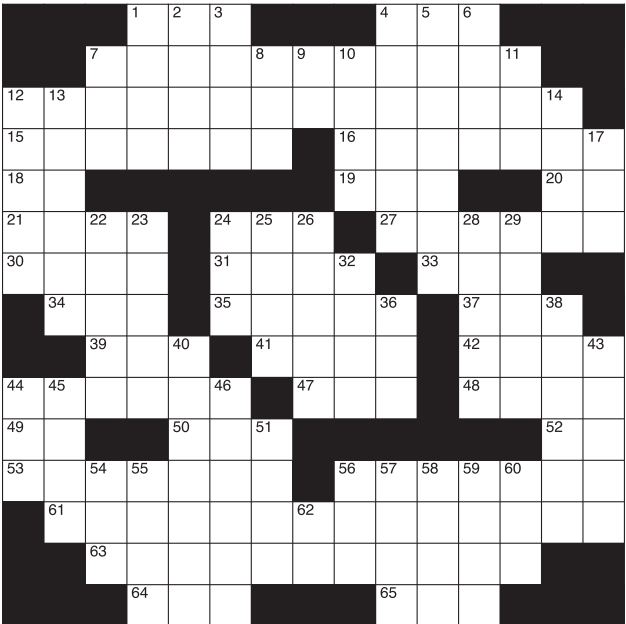

N.S. Seniors Care Grant open for applications

Seniors may apply to the annual provincial Seniors Care Grant program, which helps with expenses that allow them to stay in their homes longer and improve their quality of life. The grant has been increased to \$750 and now includes home heating as an eligible service. To qualify, Nova Scotians must be 65 years or older by March 31, 2024, live in a home they own or rent, and have an annual household income of \$37,500 or less.

The grant helps seniors cover the costs of a range of healthcare and household services, including physiotherapy, medication and grocery delivery, phone services and home repairs. The grant may also be used for home heating costs, such as furnace oil, natural gas and electricity.

Seniors who previously opted in to receive the seniors care grant when applying for the property tax rebate for seniors will need to submit a separate application for the grant beginning this year. Anyone who received a seniors care grant between December 1, 2021, and May 31, 2023, are eligible to apply for a new grant.
