Will she *really* relax and fly?

Cameron-Kelly clocks a milestone year in the air

Spending a year of her life in the air?

“I love it!” said Captain Mary Cameron Kelly, a pilot with 14 Wing Greenwood’s 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron.

May 30, on a late afternoon flight aboard the CP140 Aurora, Cameron-Kelly rolled the clock on 8,760 hours in the air over her military career.

“Now I can just relax and fly.”

Hah – Cameron-Kelly has had her logbook pencil sharpened and poised for over a year: in August 2022, she hit the 8,000-hour milestone, and figured she could make the year mark by the fall of 2024 if she got a crack at the pilot’s seat on as many training flights and airshows as her squadron mates would give her.

“Congratulations, Mary,” said 14 Wing Commander Colonel Jeff Davis, visiting the 404 Squadron morning brief May 31 to look at some light-hearted pictures captured on the year-in-the-air flight, and present Cameron-Kelly with a command team coin.

“We’ll have that vision of Mary with her thumbs up, engrained in our heads. Those who fly aspire to a number. When I went through here as a young lieutenant, flying with Mary, I thought about 1,000 hours was good. Never once did I think I’d see 8,760 hours – a year in the air!

“Think about everything you do on a daily basis, and how long it would take to do that for a year.”

Davis, through his own postings at 14 Wing, has seen Cameron-Kelly fly with 404 Squadron and 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron.

“There is a whole history of things Mary has done in 20-plus years in Greenwood,” Davis said, including remembering his own flying time with Cameron-Kelly as they’d be getting ready to take off from somewhere, and she’d be lugging “a few things – a few extra pounds! - for the kids” up the aircraft stairs.

“On behalf of anyone you’ve ever worked with, trained, mentored – congratulations on this accomplishment.”

Cameron-Kelly, set to be inducted into the Canadian aviation hall of fame in September, was the first female Royal Canadian Air Force maritime patrol pilot and, soon after, crew commander. When she joined the RCAF July 15, 1981, she was an airframe technician, rejected three times before she finally got into the pilot’s seat. Approaching 43 years in the military, she recognizes the “Operate as One” strength of the air crews and support personnel who made it all worthwhile.

“Thank you for your support,” Cameron-Kelly said. “I’ve enjoyed working with everyone, and the opportunity to teach new students – and I will for as long as I can.

“It’s been a wild ride, and I’ll take this moment in and have a look at everything. It’s a bit surreal.”


But – there’s a realness to the next number: Cameron-Kelly knows it’s been over 15 years since anyone flew a year in the air specific to maritime patrol. This recent milestone includes early military flying time on Tutors and Muskateers. The tight-knit maritime patrol community has it’s own “fleet thing” about a year in the air.

“I need about 300 hours more – that could be a year, a year-and-a-half away....” ➔

RCAF100 golf event a

The lucky winner of the tournament was a team from 14 Wing Greenwood's 14 Air Maintenance Squadron, with over \$7,000 presented to the GMFRC.

14 Construction Engineering Squadron Honorary Colonel Dan Hennessey organized the tournament, working for months to fill the field, line up a partnering sponsor at every hole, bring in special guests, ensure enough of the RCAF100 specialty beer was on hand, and that there were prizes, contests and lots of opportunity for fun from Hole #1 to Hole #19. A team of volunteers – including his family – helped with all the day's details.

June 7 dawned with a traditional South Shore morning fog. Golfers wearing toques and co-



lourful, striped knee socks were already early winners! Local MLAs Thanks to Becky Druhan and Susan Corkum-Greek provided opening remarks and a South Shore welcome, and the GMFRC team of staff and volunteers took to their course stations. A CC130 Hercules from 14 Wing Greenwood's 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron flew at 1,000 feet over the course to put a unique twist on



the standard shotgun start. Once in play, golfers had the opportunity to try for a hole-in-one at a marked hole, take



advantage of beverage and snack cart frequent "flybys," and meet many of the hole sponsors at display tents and

activity stations. Broadcasting legend Steve Armitage was on hand as a VIP putter, offering his services to



teams as they came up to his green. Armitage alone raised more than \$250, and participants enjoyed meeting this legend.

Pre, postnatal program keys in on unique fitness needs

"Intention before intensity" is fitness and sports instructor Tanya Brooks' motto for 14 Wing Greenwood's new Prenatal and Postpartum Program (PNP3).

The national initiative, which started as a pilot program in Greenwood in February, aims to support Canadian Armed Forces' members through their pregnancies, maternity and parental leave. As part of the initiative, the 14 Wing Fitness and Sports Centre's Personnel Support Program (PSP) reconditioning specialists have been networking with pelvic floor therapists to plan workouts that reduce susceptibility to musculoskeletal injuries, rebuild core strength and maintain a healthy and active lifestyle.

The sessions initially focus on breathing and alignment, before progressing to more intense exercises, tailored to each individual's needs.

home. They also receive a bag of fitness equipment, including resistance bands and an aerobics ball, to facilitate home workouts.

With the help of the centre's new Inbody Body Composition Analyzer, instructors measure and track members' progress throughout PNP3, and adjust fitness routines accordingly.

"Every class is different. It keeps it fun and interesting that way," says reconditioning specialist Josh Leddicote.

Adding babies into the mix has also been a fun new twist for instructors, who have learned to teach the 1.5-hour long class while, sometimes, holding a cooing or sleeping infant. Although the gym now has playpens available for the tiny tots, the PSP instructors are happy to keep Baby occupied while their parent works up a sweat. The novelty has been a great opportunity for staff to develop new skills in group - and child - management during classes.

"It's not your normal fitness class; it's very recreational," says Leddicote.

The team was lucky to have fitness instructor Tanya Brooks' experience at the beginning of the sessions.

"I've been doing mommy group sessions for the last five years. You have to be open-minded as an instructor in this class: you want Mom to have a good workout," says Brooks.

While the opportunity to work out physically is a good incentive, the F&S Centre team notes PNP3 is just as good for members' mental health. It gives new parents the opportunity to maintain their fitness and rebuild their strength, while socializing with members going through similar life stages. The program so far has been successful in bringing those members together. Current participants have formed new friendships, meeting outside of planned sessions for walks, outings and, sometimes, just to chat. Currently, 14 Wing PSP has five members enrolled in the program, approximately the number of pregnant members the wing has at a given time.

"We've learned that there's already a need," says Leddicote, "and we're fulfilling a lot of that need."

Greenwood's PNP3 program will continue beyond the pilot, and the fitness team hopes to welcome new participants during the upcoming posting season and as more members go through the changing needs of pregnancy and post-pregnancy fitness. ➔

their loved ones.

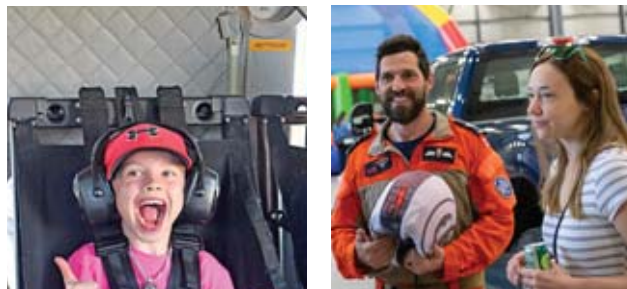
Little kids jumped in the

Dak work a 'win-win' for Greenwood museum, ACS techs

A winter's worth of work is a "win-win" for 14 Wing Greenwood heritage - and its modern day aircraft structures technicians

The Greenwood Military Aviation Museum's DC3 Dakota, a permanent static display in its airpark, made a big move across the base last September to 14 Air Maintenance Squadron's 10 Hangar. It's been in the hands of the ACS techs ever since, and the clock is now counting down to a big refurbishment reveal.

"The museum wanted a full refinishing job," says Master Corporal Matt MacKenzie, the ACS shop lead. "After 10 years sitting outside, in a salt air environment, the sun and weather, the wet and snow; we did a triage of the aircraft: a metal assessment, for deterioration, and a paint assessment.

"It's basically taking the aircraft, fixing all the trouble spots and making it all look good."

The ACS techs have been working since September on that triage list, knowing, with staffing pressures and day-to-day work, it's targeting "low-hanging fruit: areas that need the least work, but will have a big impact."

MacKenzie says that has still involved reattaching the Dak's wings, removed during the move to fit through myriad gates and fences; and familiarizing the ACS team with what lay ahead.

"IMP does all the big jobs as out contractors. We would know the basics - priming, painting, how to protect metal, add top coats; but we typically do lots of small parts in our paint booth. I'm the only one in Greenwood who's painted a full aircraft - the 2016 BCATP-themed CF18 demo jet, and I painted the 2017 Canada 150-themed

tail and three grey tails on the CF18."

The Dak restoration has allowed the techs to put training and skills into full use: painting the wings as they are attached to the plane means "experiencing how to paint in unfamiliar postures - there's no flipping the wing!

"We're going in with palm sanders, scuffing it up so the new paint will mechanically adhere. No primer. And it means a lot of one-on-one time with a tech, giving them feedback, getting the refurbishers confident in their skills, getting them trigger time with the paint gun; all with two or three people at a time in small paint sessions.

"Painting is 10 per cent of

the project; the prep work is the big part."

The 1943 CC129 Dak arrived at 14 Wing in 2006, on permanent loan from the national aviation museum in Ottawa. Back then, it arrived as wings and a fuselage, packed in pieces inside a transport plane. Greenwood museum volunteers put it all back together, and it was installed in the airpark in 2014, configured in the search-and-rescue markings of 103 Rescue Unit, based at 14 Wing Greenwood between 1947 and the mid-1960s.

MacKenzie's team has been working since last fall, scuffing surface by surface, paint-

ing very second weekend and "getting as much done as we can - it will definitely be better than it was," including a more orange paint trim than the reddish tone used a decade ago. The plan is to have the Dak ready to unveil in August, when Air Show Atlantic is on the wing - including a flying and static display of the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum's Douglas C-47 Dakota.

"Maybe we get the SAR aircraft back together - the old and the new. That sounds pretty cool.

This has, so far, been a fun, awesome experience, and everyone is learning so

much," MacKenzie says. "People will take their families to the Greenwood museum and show them what they painted - this is a win-win all the way around." →
